## **PAST EVENTS**

### *The 2001 'Bullstones', Snowdonia*

It seems to me that suffering is considered by many to be an essential part of the traditional 'Bullstones' experience. Typically this includes bad weather, bleak and exposed bivvies, and route marches of many miles. My intention this year was to throw out most of the suffering and have a relatively pleasant weekend, due almost entirely to the fact that I didn't fancy planning a grim weekend for myself. The best laid plans are often said to go astray.....but in this case it all worked out fine! The weekend started well with Friday night at the Padarn Lake Hotel in Llanberis enlivened by the talents of Ms Dawn Valentine, to whom most of the party warmed after initial criticism of her massacring of sensitive songs. Her attempts to embarrass Oreads by involving them in 'audience participation' failed in one respect, but probably made some people's weekend. We were let out at closing time (not possible before that) and made our way up through the slate quarries to the appointed shed near the top (without getting lost), which was every bit as good as I remembered it. We went up Elidir Fawr and along the ridge over Y-Garn and the Glyders before the steep descent down to the Williams farm by Little Tryfan. Not far in miles, but it felt like well far enough to us all (I think. Hands up who wanted to go further!?) by the time we finished at dusk, what with all that unnecessary wet weather clothing and thermals to carry, as well as the very necessary food and drink. Unfortunately none of the drink survived the Saturday night, but we all did, many of us upholding the club's great snoring tradition. Apologies also due to all those that didn't take part in the late washing-up choir practise; we certainly need more practise... Sunday saw us taking the shortest route back to Llanberis, walking past a sadly-not-open-on-winter-Sundays Vaynol, in a valley which never thawed out all day, in contrast to the sunlit hills above. As for Saturday, again over-heating was more of a problem than being cold. If we could have weather that good every time we did a weekend of that sort, there'd be scores of people wanting to come. ### *Black Rocks meet 12 December 2001*

I thought this was merely my 25th appearance in a row on this meet but Keith Gregson assures me it was not only his as well but also the 25th anniversary of the meet, which was apparently an invention of Nat Allen. On the very first then, in 1977, I had spent all day moving my stuff down from Cumberland to West End and climbed in Hush Puppies with Paul Gardner, before enjoying complimentary pie and peas

courtesy of Alun Jones, the late lamented licensee of The Black's Head in Wirksworth. In 1979 I noted that there were six climbers in Queen's Parlour Chimney all on a single rope and with only two headtorches. In 1980 I climbed with Peter Scott and noted "usual poor attendance - four". The following year Chris Radcliffe and I failed on South Gully (!) before Chris led Pine Tree Gully in true winter conditions. 1982 was "Crowded now. Wet and windy." By 1987 we had started to meet at The Olde Gate in Brassington. After climbing in 1990, I tried to run along the High Peak Trail to Brassington, only to be defeated by deep snow at Harborough. There was ice again in 1991 and "a damp cold evening" in 1992. In 1993, I recorded that "Gwen got Chris R stuck in Fat Man's." By 1995 we were meeting at the Princess Vic in Matlock Bath. The following year must have been good because I managed eight routes, but the year after that I fell off trying to reverse Black Crack.

And so to this year, when the cold combined with several dry days before the meet produced excellent climbing conditions. Much was done at a very well attended event. Chris dispatched Birch Tree Variant in fine style, though I think the Sheffield/Burton axis were less successful on Lone Tree Groove. I did three routes with newbie Kevin who followed unhesitatingly on rock he had never seen in daylight! What a way to start and a clear indication that this meet has never been more popular.
