This circular walk is suitable for walkers of all abilities, because short cuts are available at various stages.

(See the attached map)

Friday Evening: where to rendez-vous and camp. O.S. 053207 in the grounds of the "New Kock Inn" courtesy of Mr & Mrs Moncrieff.

Saturday Evening: I propose to ferry a car load of tents and gear to Heptonstall, our Saturday night stop. Saturday will be a light weight walk of about 20 miles with a pub stop en route via Riponden, Cragg Vale, Mankinholes, Lumbutts, Todmorden, Heptonstall.

Saturday Evening: where to rendez-vous and camp. Between the graveyard and the top of Heptonstall Quarry on the Calderdale Way at the edge of the village by some garages in a rough field: either camp there or if you prefer there are some flat spots under the crag. There are public toilets and a tap about 2 minutes walk away in the centre of the village, two pubs and a chip shop.

Sunday Itinerary: Explore Heptonstall an extraordinarily well preserved Pennine hill-top settlement; thence to Luddenden Dean, Luddenden Foot, canal side to Sowerby Bridge and back to the start (a short day).

For transport arrangements phone Peter Scott 0332 842108.

The venue this year is the Devonshire Arms, Baslow commencing at 7.30pm.

Two proposals for rule changes have been notified to the Secretary.

Both apply to Rule 15 which currently reads:

15 - The entrance fee shall be £1 due on notification of election.

The subscription shall be £6.50 per annum for full members, and one third of full membership subscriptions for Associate Members, due on election, and subsequently on the 1st January each year. Members elected on or after the 1st November in any year shall be exempt from further subscription the following year. The subscription for married couples who are both members of the Club shall be £10* per annum.

Members who are permanently resident abroad may, if they wish pay a reduced subscription of half the normal membership subscription. Married couples both being members and resident abroad may, if they wish, pay reduced subscription of half the joint Membership Subscription. The last date for payment of subscriptions will be the date of the A.G.M.. Anyone failing to pay by this date will be struck off the list of members, subject to the discretion of the committee.

iv) Prospective Members shall be charged an annual fee of 50% of the Full Members' subscription.

v) An entrance fee of 50% of the Full Members' subscription shall be due on notification of election. Subscription due on election will be calculated as one twelfth part of the Full Members' subscription multiplied by the number of full calendar months remaining in the year. Thereafter subscriptions will be due on 1st January each year"




MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE OREAD MOUNTAINKINGING CLUB, HELD AT BASLOW VILLAGE HALL ON SATURDAY APRIL 26TH 1986

Present: The President and 58 members.

Before the meeting commenced its formal proceedings the President asked members to support the raffle for the Don Whillans Memorial Fund.

1. Apologies for Absence

Apologies for absence were received from Shirley Goldsmith, Ken Bryan, John Welbourne, Ruth Welbourne, Tony Smedley, Harry Pretty, Ruth Conway, Rob Tressider and Ron Sant.

2. Minutes of the last A.G.M.

The minutes of the last A.G.M. were accepted as a true record. Proposed Clive Russell. Seconded by Ernie Phillips and carried by the meeting.

3. Matters Arising

There were no matters arising.

4. President's Report

Robin Sedgwick commented on a very active year. Tim Barnett had done many classic alpine routes, and Bobby Gilbert in his first alpine season had notched up the Eigerwand. Robin Beadle had done the Diamond Couloir on Mt. Kenya. Generally members had been active with several 'E' leaders active.

Indoor meets had been capably organised by Mike Pearce to whom Robin recorded his thanks. There had been some very interesting evenings. The Journal had been started by Chris Wilson and finalised by Rock Hudson who had produced it for the 1985 Dinner. Members were asked to provide material as soon as possible for the current Journal.

The 1985 Dinner had been a great success. Arranging the Dinner had occupied a great deal of time. Feedback from the members as to what they want was critical. The club were particularly indebted to Reg Squires for organising one of the best dinners in years. Callow Park had again been booked for 1986 and members were asked to book early.

Roger Larkam and Fred Phillips had organised a very successful and eventful Fell Race in a new setting. The race was won by Rob Tressider. Robin Beadle had organised the Photo Meet which again had proved a great success with Richard Hopkinson beating a big pack of runners-up to first place.

Robin recorded his thanks to the people responsible for running the Huts - Peter O'Neill, Chuck Hooley, Keith Gregson, and Fred Phillips who was retiring as Welsh Hut Bookings Secretary. Heathy Lea was still under-used but the loss was minimal.

Robin ended by thanking all the people who worked behind the scenes and in particular Ron Sant who was indisposed with German Measles. Especial thanks were also due to John O'Reilly who was retiring from one of the toughest jobs in the club.

5. Hon. Secretary's Report

In the Secretary's absence the report was read out by Colin Barnard.

It was reported that the Club still actively supports the B.M.C. and as reported at the last A.G.M. the B.M.C. had severed official links with Climber and Rambler and now uses High magazine as its official journal. The changeover, which had been viewed with scepticism in some circles had proved to be beneficial to the B.M.C. with over £8,000 being received from the magazine between the months of May and December 1985. It could also be argued that High has also seen the benefits of a wider range of subject-matter and greater circulation.

The B.M.C. had sometimes been criticized for being too remote from the average club member, or for pandering to the wishes of a chosen few. On some rare occasions this may be true but it should be remembered that the B.M.C. put in a tremendous amount of "behind the scenes" work, particularly in the area of access. One recent, and local, example of this was their vigorous opposition to the proposed re-working of Duke's Quarry at Whatstandwell.

On behalf of the Club thanks were expressed to the Meets Secretary, John O'Reilly and the Journal Editor, Rock Hudson. On a personal note the Secretary recorded his thanks to Beryl Strike, Jean O'Neill and Colin Barnard for their help in producing various minutes.

6. Hon. Treasurer's Report

Lol Burns thanked Reg Squires for his help in producing the accounts which were distributed during the meeting.

Most of our financial concern was with the Huts. Tan y Wyddfa was solvent but expenses such as rates were increasing very rapidly. Heathy Lea was under-utilised but represented a tremendous Club asset available for members.

Lol hoped that the accounts were self-explanatory and invited questions.

Clive Russell asked about the deficit on electricity at Tan y Wyddfa and Lol replied that the incidence of expenditure between financial years was one factor. Clive asked about what tariff the Club were on and Lol told the meeting that it was "Economy 7". David Appleby asked about postage, printing etc. on the General Account. Lol replied that whereas in previous years it had been possible to get work done voluntarily, free of charge, organisations which had provided these facilities had gradually withdrawn them. Richard Hopkinson enquired about bank charges and was advised that Lol had taken steps to reduce them. Lol agreed to ask for any member who could help with printing etc. services to come forward.

Rock Hudson proposed that the accounts be accepted, Chuck Hooley seconded and the motion was carried.

7. Welsh Hut Report

Fred Phillips gave the report. Tan y Wyddfa was still well used with income of £2,100. There had been two successful work parties and painting was the priority for the new year. The refurbishment of the chimney had been a major unforeseen expense. Beryl Strike enquired if re-wiring was needed and Lol said that Ron Sant had made it safe for a period until the programmed re-wiring could be carried out. Keith Gregson reported that this was on the 1987 maintenance programme. Peter Scott asked about the costs of replacing the chimney and was told that this was £400. Fred thanked particularly Ron Chambers for his work.

8. Derbyshire Hut

Peter O'Neill reported that the net cost only worked out at £1 per week but that we still needed more use by Club members, and more support on Work Parties. One Club member had stayed at the hut and had done some useful decorating work. Again reference was made to Peter Lancaster's unique contribution, the logistics of which had been the subject of an in-depth review by the Committee. On behalf of the Welsh Hut Sub committee John Linney offered assistance. Peter reported that since part of the roof was falling in (sic) this offer was particularly welcome.

9. Election of Officers

The President stated that having received no further nominations from the body of the Club the Officers would be nominated as follows:

Proposed by the Committee. Seconded: Gordon Wright and carried by the meeting.

10. Appointment of Auditor

Robin Sedgwick proposed a vote of thanks to Reg Squires. Reg Squires was proposed as Auditor for 1986 by Robin, seconded by John Hudson and the motion was carried.

11. Request to increase subscriptions

The President again requested a mandate for the Committee to increase subscriptions if necessary and emphasized that this was simply a formality.

Robin Sedgwick proposed that the Committee be empowered to increase subscriptions if necessary, John Linney seconded the motion.

Reg Squires proposed an amendment to the effect that the Committee consider at the same time increasing the entry fee for new members to a suggested two-thirds of the annual membership fee. David Wright asked if a more demanding scrutiny of new members ought not to be made. Keith reported that the Committee had the question of the joining fee very much on its agenda. Discussion from the floor centred round the potential value to a person of full membership. In this context the present joining fee of £1 was minimal. Clive Russell seconded Reg's proposal which was carried. Nat Allen and Gail Searby commented on the level of the prospective member's fee which was not an inducement to join as a full member.

The President then referred to the question of reciprocal rights and invited Keith Gregson to introduce the topic. Keith referred to the clubs with whom we had reciprocal rights and asked for opinions of members on this issue. He referred to the interpretation of the term offered by the A.B.M.S.A.C. He also referred to the rule in the Handbook which said that one room at Tan y Wyddfa was reserved for members only. This was inconsistent with the more generous interpretation which the A.B.M.S.A.C. offered. Full discussion from the floor followed. Robin emphasised that what was sought was feedback, not a substantive motion. David Wright suggested a questionnaire to members ought to be considered and this was felt to be a good idea. Various members felt that the reciprocal rights enjoyed by the club ought to be more widely publicised. Robin said that the Committee would take account of all views and that if necessary a questionnaire would be circulated.

Keith Gregson then raised the question of competition climbing which had been aired at the B.M.C. Conference and other fora. He expressed fears that some of the climbing establishment might be prepared to countenance this development. A lively discussion from the floor followed. Keith asked for people to make their views widely felt.

Peter Scott commented about smoking pollution and noise pollution before asking whether the Hut Sub Committee had considered better utilisation of the extension. Discussion followed.

The President thanked Dawn Hopkinson and her helpers for providing victuals. He then asked that as a matter of course people help Colin Hobday by booking in in advance at the Welsh Hut.

The meeting closed at 10.45 p.m.

A Guide to the use of the Oread Huts

The huts are an important focal point of the Club's activities, and a reflection of the Club's collective responsibility. What outsiders see of our huts and the behaviour in and around them will temper their tolerance (or otherwise) of our activities. Bad behaviour, by ourselves or our guests is our responsibility. Remember that tolerance is of the essence, and in particular, at the Welsh Hut we must always show consideration for our neighbours.

All members, regardless of age or experience have the same rights and carry the same responsibilities for looking after our jointly owned property.

The following is an attempt to describe the facilities and to lay down a code of practise for their use. It may seem unnecessary to define a code of practise, and indeed most of what follows should be common sense, the major considerations being respect for other people and the fostering of an atmosphere in which everyone staying at the Hut can have as enjoyable a stay as possible.

Heathy Lea

The cottage at Baslow is available for the use of **members only**. For booking procedures and facilities contact the Hut Custodian. Otherwise the general principles as set down for Tan-yr-Wyddfa should be observed.

Tan-yr-Wyddfa

Accommodation

The Hut has four bedrooms with a sleeping capacity of 22 bunk beds. One of these rooms (six beds) is reserved for the use of members at all times. It is the policy of the Hut Sub-Committee to let the Hut to visiting clubs on two weekends per month excluding the high summer season and Bank Holidays. Mattresses are provided, sleeping bags are required. The kitchen is fully equipped with calor gas rings, mains water and all necessary utensils. Other rooms are: washrooms and showers, lounge, dining room, utility room including drying room, and toilets. In addition there is an outhouse and fuel store.

Camping is not allowed.

No animals are allowed in the Hut.

Water Supply

The mains supply to the Hut is controlled by a stop tap in the left hand of the two toilets in the utility room. The system may be drained by the use of two taps, one of which is situated next to the main stop tap and the other adjacent to the hot water tank in the utility room. The procedure for draining the system

is to shut off the mains supply, open both drain taps, and then turn on all hot and cold water taps having first made sure that the immersion heater is switched off and that the boiler in the utility room is extinguished. Leave the drain taps open.

For further details and operating instructions see the Hut notice board.

Electricity Supply

A coin meter situated above the small window in the kitchen controls the lights, immersion heater, and other general utilities. Power for the showers and the storage heaters is on a separate circuit. The drying room operates from a separate coin meter.

Fuel

Logs and coal are available in the store adjacent to the rearmost door of the Hut. Logs and coal are for use on the open fire whereas the small coal nuts burn slower in the boiler.

Hut Fees

These are displayed on the Hut notice board and in the Hut register. They can also be obtained from the Booking Secretary. Any changes will be notified via the Newsletter and the Hut notice board.

Collection of Fees

Collection of Hut fees shall be the responsibility of the meet leader where appropriate. All other groups must appoint a suitable person to collect the fees. All fees should be submitted to the Hut Booking Secretary within 14 days.

Keys

Members may obtain keys for their retention via the Hut Booking Secretary on payment of a deposit, otherwise keys may be borrowed on a short term basis. On no account should you allow your key to be used by any other person unless they are staying at the Hut with you. The only exception to this would be at the specific request of the Hut Booking Secretary.

All Hut keys remain the property of the Oread Mountaineering Club.

Booking

Members will be given priority in bookings, but where vacancies exist, external clubs/groups wishing to use the Hut may be allowed to do so at the discretion of the Hut Booking Secretary and will be expected to book the Hut "en block"; this implies the booking of 16 beds. All bookings must be made via the Hut Booking Secretary.

Reciprocal Rights

Clubs with which the Oread have reciprocal rights may book the hut on the same basis as any other external group. Otherwise individual members of such clubs may book on the same basis as Oread Members.

Club Meets

All bookings are the responsibility of the meet leader. Oread members have priority on Club meets and bank holiday weekends up to 14 days before the date. Subsequently two guests per member may be taken if beds are available. These bookings will be the responsibility of the meet leader or, in the absence of a meet leader, the Booking Secretary who must be kept informed at all times.

Individual Members

Members are advised to book in advance and should check via the Booking Secretary that the Hut will not be overcrowded. Remember that a maximum of only six beds are available if the Hut is being used by another club. Oread members may take a maximum of two guests at the discretion of the Booking Secretary. If you do not book you may have to give up your bed late at night to someone who has. In this event you may sleep on the floor, ensuring as little inconvenience to other visitors as possible and you should make other arrangements for subsequent nights.

External Groups

Visiting clubs will in general be expected to book the Hut 'en block', see above. The responsibility for the booking and conduct of the meet will lie with a meet leader appointed by the visiting club who will make all the necessary arrangements with the Hut Booking Secretary.

In the event of an Oread member wishing to take a group of visitors to Tan-Y-Wyddfa he/she will be deemed to be the meet leader and must take full responsibility for the group, in particular he/she must accompany the group.

During Your Stay

Above all the guiding principle should be that of respect for ones fellow guests and for the local inhabitants.

Keep your food together in one place on the food shelves. Do not leave items on the floor. Wash up your pans and crockery as soon as possible and put them away, don't leave them to drain. Leave the cooking area as you would like to find it, even if you didn't find it that way!

Wet clothes should be dried in the drying room (not on the heaters) and cleared away as soon as possible.

Smoking upstairs is strictly forbidden.

Keep all fire doors closed.

On Arrival

All vehicles must be parked in the area next to the Hut (see Hut notice board for details) and no unnecessary noise should be made outside. Remember that there are people living in the house next to Tan-Y-Wyddfa, how would you like twenty new neighbours moving into the house next door every weekend? You must sign the Hut Register on arrival. Members are asked to check that others are signed in. Don't resent it if you are asked, it is a legal requirement and it also deters the casual use of the Hut by unauthorised visitors.

Departure

Even if you are only leaving for the day, please leave the Hut in good order. When leaving at the end of a meet make sure that you do your share of the cleaning, and that all visitors do their share too. Remember that if the next party at the Hut finds a mess they will not be encouraged to leave the place any better than they found it.

The following is a checklist :-

- 1) beds left in order, blankets folded, mattresses on edge etc.
- 2) floors swept
- 3) toilets cleaned
- 4) washing up completed and crockery put away
- 5) perishable food removed, fridges emptied, cleaned and the refrigerator doors left open
- 6) kitchen and dining room surfaces and floor cleaned
- 7) internal bins emptied and new bags fitted
- 8) refuse left ready for collection in plastic bags in the bins by the rear gate. The collectors will not take refuse which is not in plastic bags.
- 9) milk bottles returned to place of purchase
- 10) fireplace cleaned and material available to make a fire.
- 11) complete details of your stay in the Hut Register
- 12) hut fees paid to meet leader or appropriate person
- 13) make an entry in the Hut log-book if you wish. Include details of any repairs/problems which should be brought to the notice of the Hut Custodian and ensure that they are.
- 14) immersion heater turned off
- 15) water system drained during the winter months (November to March inclusive).
- 16) appropriate switches and stop cocks turned off
- 17) ensure hut and outbuildings are safely fastened against intruders and vandals

It is the responsibility of the meet leader to organise an orderly departure and of the last persons leaving the Hut to check that the above procedures have been carried out, but please do your share.

Hut Keys

It is intended to replace the locks on both the Welsh and Derbyshire huts in the near future. In general new keys may be obtained via the Welsh Hut Booking Secretary but at present you are asked to contact Keith Gregson, either at home (address below) or at the Rowing Club. Please put your name and signature on this form and give/send it to me together with a deposit of five pounds (cheques payable to The Oread Mountaineering Club please).

It is hoped that the locks at Tan yr Wyddfa will be changed during the working weekend in May and those at Heathy Lee shortly afterwards. Members will be notified when these changes have taken place but should check before using the huts that they have an appropriate key!

When the locks have been replaced old keys may be exchanged for the original deposit of two pounds.
