The Route In M6 - Lakes - Wrynose - Hardknott. Two E points for each car successfully over the two available (handbrake on counts as a rest; stalling counts as a fall). The track up Eskdale starts at the bottom of Hardknott (NY212012). Head NE for 2 miles to Lingcove Bridge, across this and NW for a mile to the boulders which teams should reach shortly after Be warned: the boulders are just N of a very boggy midnight. patch of ground. COMMITTEE MEETING 15 May at The Brunswick

Eight members attended the meeting. After the usual formalities, there was lively discussion and some decisions were taken. A \not 55 cancellation fee has been paid in respect of the barn dance. was reported that Dennis Gray had offered to come and speak to the club as part of the promotion of his forthcoming autobiography. He would charge £ 100 plus expenses. A French cragging meet in the early autumn was mooted as was a trip to "the greater ranges". It was decided to re-vamp the list of members to omit titles and include first names and dial codes. It was reported that there had been a successful working party at Tan-yr-Wyddfa but the painting work scheduled for the next WP was in some doubt on account of the poor state of some of the external render. The meets secretary reported a very healthy attendance and outlined his plans for 1991 which include retaining treasured traditional occasions and at the same time bringing in some new venues. Huts have been booked for two winter meets in Wales and two in the Lakes. He felt that there were too many formal walks in the summer and that the autumn might be a better time for some of these. Rock also reported on the BMC's plans to end club membership (see separate note and fill in and return questionnaire). It was decided after all these years that the club's profile is too low so the local authorities will be reminded of our existence and we will insert a notice in the biannual clubs list published by the BMC in High. Discussion of the application by Rob Tresidder and Robin Beadle for support for their Nilkanta expedition was deferred to the next meeting which will be held on 12 June.

The price reduction varies from item to item, which complicates the procedure, but some suppliers do not rquire a minimum order. For such suppliers ordering in the name of a club rather than an individual is sufficient to obtain the discount.

Before proceeding further I need to know the level of support from Oreads. If you are planning to buy a piece of gear in the next month then phone me on Derby 753807 or see me at the Brunswick. I shall compile a list of requirements and, based on the total cost and nature of the goods, choose a supplier. The supplier should then give a quote for each item on the list and I can get back to the members concerned to see whether they wish to go ahead. Up to this point there will be no committment required of members.

A really big order, \not 2500 plus, might give me the power to negotiate further discounts, but the order list must be compiled quickly. The list will close on 19 June.
