May 4-6 Baggy Point Rob Tresidder

As spring spreads into full blown summer, come and have a sunny time in Devon! Most of the climbing action over the weekend will be centred on Baggy Point, but for those in need of something more demanding, the Culm coast at Blackchurch is not far away. More subtly charming routes may be found in the Valley of the Rocks (R. D. Blackmore's "Doone Valley") near Linton. Those overcome with weltschmerz (or is it schadenfreude, or perhaps just plain homesickness) could climb on the gritstone wall near Combe Martin. The truly adventurous may prefer to tackle the 30000 feet of the Exmoor Sea Traverse. Non-climbing attractions include the incomparable surfing in Croyde Bay and on Woolacombe Sands, the cliff top walks of the SW coast path and the literary cum wildlife Tarka Trail. 2.5 inch mapping bisects Baggy so Landranger Sheet 180 is the best bet Route descriptions in the CC North Devon and Cornwall guide (1988) or Pat Littlejohn's Southwest Climbs.

Camping will be at Bayview farm, Braunton Rd. Croyde (SS442387). The site is within walking distance of the crag. The farmer does not accept reservations. Charges are £5 for a car and tent + £2.50 per person, all charges per night. Let's ease the pressure on the environment and our pockets just a little and

see into how just few cars we can squeeze this hugely popular meet. (note the Churchillian avoidance of the preposition as the last word of the sentence -Ed.) May 11-12 Shining Clough Roger Larkam

Shining Clough Rocks (GR SJ 098986) is the main objective of this meet. The crag is in a superb position on the edge of the moor overlooking Longdendale and has over 90 routes of all grades.

I recommend an expedition to Laddow, Tintwhistle Knott or Crowden Great Quarries on Saturday and camping at Crowden. I shall definitely be there on Sunday and depending on various factors might even be there on Saturday! Final plans can be discussed on 01773 820260 or at the Brunswick or Princess Victoria the preceding week.

May 18-19 Tan Yr Wyddfa Julia Stowell

June 9 Agden Rocher Ron Sant

It's a good few years since the Oread last visited this crag and whilst it may not be at the forefront of climbing development the location is second to none. For those who may not be familiar with the area the crag is situated to the NW of the village of high Bradfield (GR 268925) and overlooks Agden Reservoir. It may be approached either from Sheffield via the B6077 or from Bamford and heading for Strines Reservoir.

At the moment I intend to be in the area on Sunday only but there is (or used to be) a campsite at Bradfield and a pub which goes by the name oh "Old Horns" (I think this is the correct name but maybe I'm just getting mixed up with some ageing Oread Characters). Solutions To April Problem

4.863

From map ref. Rock was 1300m. E. and 700m. S. of Keith, 1476m. overall, bearing 118.3 deg. From triangle of velocities, Keith's speed relative to Rock was 4.863 mph, 7.825 kph. Time to close would be 1.467 over 7.825 or 0.1886 hr., 11.32 min. After 9 min., 20.5% of the distance, .3025 km. remained when Rock turned away. With a straight 1mph. or 1.609 kph. differential this would take 11.28 mins. so overall time was 20.28 mins. No solutions were offered.
