The George has the most accommodation for the seasoned drinker, only the route can be varied. We shall meet at the Manifold Valley visitor centre just West of Hulme End on B5054 at 10 30 am. ready to move off shortly afterwards, (car park £2 per day), and stroll up to the George via Manifold Way, Ecton Hill, Gateham Grange and Narrowdale. BRAIN TEASER

Last Month's Solution

Last month's brain teaser strategy was to disguise the simple nature of the arithmetic with irrelevant waffle, and although I succeeded there I should hang my head for insufficient care in wording the question. My intended solution was O1 Whether the team had an instrument A1 yes (correct), Q2 was the land over 10000ft? A2 No (incorrect based on an incorrect reading.) The approximate, as distinct from exact feet to metres conversion was a red herring. Jamie Fisher 1971 - 1999

Oreads may wish to share my sadness at the death of Jamie Fisher on 29 January in a bivouac on the Brhche des Droites. Many of us were present at the Oak in November to enjoy his enthralling lecture on an attempt to climb the E face of Savoia Kangri. Preferring then to let the man speak for himself, I was perhaps a little coy about his relationship with me and my family: he has been a very dear friend to all five of us. My earliest memory is of him as a two

year old taking his afternoon rest in the little cave below Kelly's Overhang at High Neb. He always loved gritstone which he used to attack with a brutal directness. Early last year I did the three unconquerables with him - he never lived in the area so there were big gaps in his climbing record! While at Edinburgh University, he became president of the mountaineering club and had just returned to a full time job in the city with Dr Barnardos at the time of his death. Although he had two Himalayan expeditions to his name and was an accomplished Alpinist, Scotland was his real He coped especially well with the love. uncertainties and snatched opportunities that are the hallmark of winter climbing. His ascents included the rare prize of a winter traverse of the Cuillin ridge. He developed a real affection for Skye returning again and again and making at least four traverses of the ridge. The most recent, in less than five hours, was at the end of his Classic Rock round which he accomplished by bike while raising money for the John Muir Trust. Jamie had a rare gift for relating to people of a huge variety of background and irrespective of age or ability. This was most apparent in his work with the disadvantaged and in his enjoyment of climbing with me! Rob Tresidder

4WD Vehicles

The only action which could be taken, were the authorities willing would be closure of unsurfaced roads to vehicles. We could also ask for restrictions on any planning consent for the use of private land for trials etc. where this could generate hobby use of nearby lanes. 





BRAIN TEASER

If those present were easily able to do the sums it could be inferred that the trigonometry involved "3,4,5" triangle for which a pythagoras' equation can easily be solved in the head (three squared plus four squared equals five squared). The forty metres from promenade to the water line would form one of the perpendicular sides of a right angled triangle, and the path taken by the cyclist would be the hypoternuse, i.e. at an angle to the shore line . The distance cycled would therefore be either five thirds or five fourths of the perpendicular distance, and since the wind was described as a breeze, the former option, leading to a lesser wind speed, is the more likely. The cyclist was therefore 53.33 metres along the shore from Digger and rode 66.67 metres, which took, at 9 mps, 7.407seconds. The cap therefore travelled 40 metres in 7,407 secs, and so its speed, and that of the wind, was 40/7.407, or 5.4 metres per second

There may be some readers of this 'preview' that aren't at all sure what a 'Bullstones' meet is, so here's a quick introduction.
