A little figure present on numerous Oread walks will sadly not be seen again. Terrier Fred died on 9 Jan after a trip to the Manifold valley. He covered 258 miles last year and was possibly the shortest legged climber ever to ascend a Munro.

PAST EVENTS

After a sharp overnight frost, we had brilliant conditions for this years Fell Race with clear sunny weather. Together with my two stalwart marshals - Jack Ashcroft and John Walters, a total of 16 attended the meet and all appeared to have enjoyed themselves. Perhaps given the limited interest in this fixture, we should consider making it a mid week evening meet in the summer?

Based on the recently refurbished Bob Downes hut, we had good amenities for the race and an opportunity to extend the race into the less familiar terrain of Padley Gorge and Longshaw. Perhaps significantly, these cheek points gave the most difficulty in location. The format was a score event with 11 check points, the first and last being compulsory, but otherwise making it necessary for a strategic decision to be made about which check points to visit, with the additional consideration of picking up bonus points by completing two climbs (on Tegness Pinnacle and Baslow Edge) or visiting two well separated check points. There was a time limit of 1hr 30 mins and severe penalties for any one more than 5 minutes late.

Handicapping was done by assigning runners into three groups, to which 1 added a fourth to accommodate walkers, with the fastest securing less points at each check point and therefore having to run further to secure points. As the fin ositions were fairly evenly spread over all the roups, this system seemed to work reasonably well.

Roger travelled further than anyone else, but chose to enjoy the fine weather rather than take the obvious turn home and hence was heavily penalised. Congratulations to Rob for a finely judged strategy which, despite the harshest handicapping, secured him first place. Thanks to all who turned up and particularly to Jack and John for your help with the marshalling.

Jun 4 (Sunday) Rivelin Richard Coghlan

This will be another foray to explore one of the Peak District's less frequented crags, using the concept of a club meet as an excuse to break away from the more usual "day trip" climbing venues of Stanage and Froggatt.

I hope this can't be any more embarrassing than the outing to Laddow Rocks last year, when I lead a large Oread party to the wettest, greenest gritstone I have ever seen. It was flourescent day-glo green all over.

We are going to Rivelin later in the year, it is low-lying and South facing, so we shouldn't have a repeat fiasco.

Rivelin is in the Stanage guide (in my 1983 Stanage guide at least). The "classic of the crag" is the three star HVS 5a Croton Oil on Rivelin needle itself, but there are twelve HVS climbs in total, eleven VS 4c climbs and more Severes and V Diffs than I cared to count.

The crag is situated just up from the A57 Sheffield-Ladybower road at Grid Ref SK 280873 (on latest Dark Peak map). "Richard,

The following quotation is taken from Hansard -House of Commons Standing Committee B, during the debate on a Conservative amendment to prohibit access to the mountains at night. The MP quoted is one Mr Gray:

"It is hard to imagine any hill that could not be climbed in one day. I accept that some ascents are more difficult than others and some might take more than a day. However, even if there are such mountains, I am not certain that it is the Government's duty to encourage people to climb them. The activities involved are extremely specialist and dangerous operations; only professional mountaineers would undertake such climbs and go bivouacking up mountains. Such people currently have their own ways of achieving access to mountains and they form a group of only half a dozen or a dozen individuals in the United Kingdom."

That is the sort of preposterous rubbish emanating from the Palace of Westminster during the passage of the Bill THAT WILL DIRECTLY AFFECT OUR SPORT! The Oread should take note of the age-old maxim "Men and women deserve the government they get!" "

Countryside and Rights of Way Bill

Access legislation update

On 3 March the long-awaited access legislation was published in the form of a Countryside and Rights of Way Bill. In addition to introducing a statutory right of access to open country, the Bill also includes new Rights of Way legislation and tougher protection for Sites of Special Scientific Interest and wildlife. The Bill is currently making its way through parliament. The Bill is good news for climbers and walkers. For the first time we look set to enjoy a right to climb and walk on open country. Also, occupiers' liability is reduced - a very significant step in protecting the freedom for people to take risks as part of their recreation. It goes a long way towards meeting the principler in the BMC's Access Charter, adopted a the AGM in 1997.

Content of the Bill

[Note: the Bill is subject to amendment as it completes its passage through parliament – this is not the final version.]

- Land affected. The right of access will be to mountain, moor, heath, down and registered common land. This may subsequently be extended to include coastal land, if so decided by the Secretary of State (England) or National Assembly for Wales.
- Activities permitted by right. These include all mountaineering and climbing activities, provided they do not infringe restrictions designed to protect nature conservation and land management interests. Note: restrictions on climbing to protect the interests of cliff-nesting birds and flora will continue to apply as at present.
- Activities excluded from the right. Listed in the legislation are activities which cannot be done as of right, but which will continue where permission has been granted, as at present. These include, for example:
 - Organised games
 - Camping
 - Cycling and horse-riding
 - Any activity undertaken for a commercial purpose

The implications of this are not serious, as most of the activities listed in this schedulof the Bill are already subject to regulation through local byelaws or other legislation. Camping, for example, is not strictly legal in most upland areas but is often tolerated by land owners and local authorities provided people are discreet. It is anticipated that this situation will continue.

- Occupiers' liability. Landowners' will not have any liability to people exercising the right of access in respect of 'natural features of the landscape'. (It is likely that parliament will clarify exactly what this means in the coming weeks).
- Closures. Landowners may close their land for any purpose for up to 28 days per year, and for further periods with permission from the access authority.
- Dogs. Dogs must be on leads in all areas between 1 March and 30 June (to protect ground nesting birds) and at all times in the vicinity of livestock.

Opportunities and threats

The Bill is currently being considered clause by clause by a committee of MPs. At this stage amendments are tabled and debated. The BMC is tabling amendments aimed at clarifying and improving the legislation. Of particular interest are:

- Identification of access land
- Sea cliffs
- Status of camping
- Rights of consultation and appeal for the public where their right of access is withdrawn

Amendments have been tabled by other organisations seeking to restrict the right of access. The BMC is actively engaged in defending elements of the Bill, including:

- Night-time access. (Amendments to exclude access at night have now been defeated.)
- Criminalisation of excluded activities. Landowners' representatives are seeking to make it a criminal offence to breach certain excluded activities, a move which would effectively criminalise trespass. If they succeed, it will be a criminal offence to bathe in an upland tarn, damage a plant or annoy a landowner (I kid you not!).

What happens next?

Timetable. The Bill is likely to complete its passage through the House of Commons by mid-May. It will then pass to the House of Lords and, hopefully, will receive Royal Assent in November 2000. However, much work remains to be done in mapping, drawing up regulations and setting up Local Access Forums. It is possible that the right of access to common land and land over 600m will be 'fast-tracked' to become law within the next year. It will probably take a further 3 years to bring the right of access into effect on all open country.

Coastal land. The Countryside Agency in England has recommended that the right of access be extended to include coastal land. (Following representations made by the BMC, it has been confirmed that sea cliffs will be included.) However, the Countryside Council for Wales has recommended that the National Assembly pursues a voluntary approach, ignoring the case made by the BMC and others.

Occupiers' liability. The new level of occupiers' liability only applies on open country. There will be advantages for recreation in pressing for this to be more widely applied to all areas and to other sporting activities. The BMC will follow up on this.

Access Forums. National Forums have been set up in England and Wales, meeting regularly to advise the countryside agencies on matters of policy. Iain McMorrin and Caradoc Jones represent the BMC respectively. As regards Local Access Forums, the membership and operation of these are currently being developed by the countryside agencies, with input from the BMC. Once established, there will be a key role for BMC Access Reps and any interested BMC members in representing climbers' and walkers' interests.

Further information to BMC members. When the final content of the Bill is known, BMC Access and Conservation Officers will run workshops around the country for all BMC areas, to brief Access Reps and any interested members on the new provisions. Details will be announced in the autumn.

Easter in France

There is even the Longdendale Trail for the mountain bikers.

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OBITUARY

Ray Handley.

Ray Handley died suddenly on May 13th. His calling was as an electrical engineer on the immediate staff of the Chief Electrical Engineer at Rolls Royce Aerospace .I met Ray in 1948 when he first started climbing. I was a member of the Valkyrie Club then, and our old friend Jack Longland had started Whitehall about that time, so we both became founder instructors there. This was when skis first became available on the market and we missed no opportunities to take them up to the Buxton area. I well remember one time when he was nursing a broken bone caused by the starting handle on his Singer Le Mans car. This didn't stop him from skiing of course, but he was guarding his pot arm so carefully that he fell over and broke the other arm. He told the Matron at the hospital that he had slipped on the pavement!

Ray and I climbed together for something like thirty years in the Peak, Wales, Cornwall and the Alps. We managed to put up the odd new route together here and there. As his ability improved he was able to join me in the Climbers Club and for a while was Custodian of Ynys Ettws. We were both, by this time of course, members of the Oread and in 1967 he became President. Our visits to the Alps always included some epic features, because Ray didn't feel that he had had a good holiday unless he experienced a forced bivouac. He also had a congenital dislike of birds and insects. At Chamonix it was a common sight to see him on the camp site sleeping on the saddle and tank of his motorbike if the grasshoppers were about.

In those days alpine ski resorts didn't boast a lot in the field of lift systems so we decided to go touring from Hut to Hut in the Silvretta area. We recruited some German friends to go with us, and they insisted that we must have a guide, an idea which did not please Raymond. He took an even poorer view when the guide wanted to tie all five of us onto fifty feet of rope to get us up a snow summit. We used our own rope.

Raymond was usually quite kindly by nature, something of a bon viveur, probably deriving from his penchant for expense-paid lunches, and he liked his wine. However, he didn't suffer fools gladly. There was the celebrated occasion in the Valais when we were staying at the Bahnhof with the intention of climbing the Matterhorn, amongst other things. Janes, who, didn't have any crampons, was supposed to hire a pair from Burgeners, but when we reached the snowline above the Solvay it turned out that Janes hadn't spent the money and we had to wetnurse him to the summit and back. Ray's address to Peter Janes was really something to be heard.

More recently anno domini started to take it's grip, and Ray took up golf "to keep me going", a game which he came to excel at in his local club. He also spent a lot of time making powered model aircraft. In the past Ray was very keen on making cine films, and at a recent club indoor meet he showed a series of climbing films from the past, made at home and abroad and which from the comments of more recent club members produced quite a remarkable impression on them.

Having never been to Norway before I intend to take 2-3 days to drive to the Lofoten and arrive at the campsite around the 2nd or 3rd of August. There is a free campsite that has toilets and water at Kalle, (grid VR 725-646) which is about halfway between Kabelvag and Henningsvaer on the Island of Austvagoya.

This is the island that seems to have most of the documented climbing along with a "climbers cafe" and therefore seems to be the logical place to start. If the free campsite is not up to much it may be that we move to a paying site, (of which the guide says there are plenty) but that will have to be decided whilst there.
