Information on the disease and how it affects climbers (oops!) can be found on the BMC's website at www.thebmc.co.uk Their information is that there is no climbing in "The Midlands". The ban in the Peak Distict is a lot less total. Black Rocks and the High Peak Trail are closed. High Tor is open for climbing, but please do not use the Pic Tor Lane approach (do we ever?). Wildcat is open, but the footpath we use for descent from the top of the crag is closed. Please rope off the top. The situation at Willersley seems to be unclear: worth a try! Stoney Middleton is open if you can get through the crowds.

The real treasure that leaps out of the web page is new Mills Tors. If you have felt it hard to justify the long drive, now could be the time. Not long ago this was the most awful tip reminiscent of the Breck in Wallasey. It has now been cleaned up and the spectacular gorge is further enhanced by the much praised stainless steel bridge which ends the Midshires Way (now closed because of FMD). I don't know normy Oreads who have been there, but I'm sure Dave Helliwell will have been and I've had an excellent day there with Roger Larkam. It's steep, long, quarried gritstone. The good climbing starts at around HVS.

The first mile will be on the Wirksworth - Derby road, thereafter on narrow rural lanes. This year's innovations (traditional on HLFR) will be: 100% tarmac, almost no navigational skills required (just keep turning left!). Starts from 1100 from the car park adjacent to the Wheatsheaf PH in Wirksworth. Coming from Derby, go straight over the new mini roundabout near the centre of town and take the second, oblique, turning on the right. Entrance to the CP (party cards NOT required) is through first opening on the left.

May 25 Glencoe Steve Bennett

After speaking to the campsite official and also with a local Scottish Information Bureau I have been assured that access to the hills around Glencoe and Lochaber will be returned well before the date of this meet, however I intend seeking regular updates during the next few weeks.

All being well, camping will be at the National Trust for Scotland campsite in Glencoe. GR112577. This is the best campsite in the area (not at all like the Red Squirrel). Facilities include toilets, free showers, laundry room, cooking shelters for campers, electric hook ups for caravans, a well stocked shop and most important after a day on the hill, a 10pm 'no noise' curfew. Camping costs £3.50 single, £6.00 double and £9.00 per 4 persons sharing one tent.

The attractions of the area are fairly obvious with much walking, mountaineering and cragging available in Glencoe whilst other ranges are close by and an ascent of Tower Ridge is not out of the question.

Lofoten Meet 2001 Graham Weston

The 2001 "Alps" meet will take place in the Lofoten Islands which are located just off the NW coast of Norway. I have never been there before but having studied the guidebook, and seen the video I am convinced that there should be plenty to entertain even the most enthusiastic of Oreads.

Having never been to Norway before I intend to take 2-3 days to drive to the Lofoten and arrive at the campsite around the 2nd or 3rd of August. There is a free campsite that has toilets and water at Kalle, (grid VR 725-646) which is about halfway between Kabelvag and Henningsvaer on the Island of Austvagoya.

This is the island that seems to have most of the documented climbing along with a "climbers cafe" and therefore seems to be the logical place to start. If the free campsite is not up to much it may be that we move to a paying site, (of which the guide says there are plenty) but that will have to be decided whilst there.
