Those Oreads who will not been put off will be meeting on the Friday night at the Triangle Inn Llansantffraed Cwmdeuddwr [G.R.SN 968678] there is parking very close by, about ten yards. After the usual topping up of alcohol levels we shall step out into the night to bivvy i.e get cold and wet somewhere near a large dam. The following day will see us making our way over the hills via somewhere or other to Beilli Neuadd [G.R.SN 994698] our accommodation for the night [sleeps sixteen]. To save unnecessary hassle to the owners all gear etc. to be brought to the Triangle Inn and then transported to the bunkhouse in one trip, I hope. The bunkhouse is only ten minutes or less by car. Those that still have use of their legs on Sunday morning will make their way back to the Triangle Inn and eventually depart for home.

Bookings for the dinner and or breakfast direct to me and I will try not to foul it all up.

This event was omitted from the meets list this year for the first time ever. Let's put it back, meets sec!

Glimmerings from a failing headtorch: last winter's Night Nav. revisited.

The DMC invite the Oread their Night Navigation evenings, three events held monthly, January to March 2012. The format is:

Flags are positioned on the moors and grid references/instructions given to teams. Usually takes 2 - 3 hours of blundering across the moors in the dark with the only reward being a pint at the individual's expense and being ridiculed in the pub afterwards. Any incompetence in not finding flags is totally down to the teams taking part and nothing to do with the setter getting it wrong. Usually kicks off between 6.30 and 7.30 pm with teams of 2 or more forming and setting off as they arrive at the start. Headtorches, maps, compass and thick skins essential.

Round One: 25th Jan. Foxhouse carpark.

Forecast is rain: "Oh goody, what larks. 6.30 sharp. Wellies and souwesters."

"Do you two actually intend to leave the car tonight?"

“Not if we can help it.”

An hour later, clinging to a slippery pine trunk balanced at an alarming angle over the roaring Padley Brook, your Hon. Ed. wished she had not.

Nonetheless eleven intrepid teams blunder around Longshaw for hours finding the appointed spots with ease but never the wretched flags which are so small and insignificant as to be barely visible to the naked eye. One, our noble setter confessed to placing in the wrong location. Another just refused to be found in spite of three teams combining and, by the light of the Radcliffes' super head torches, scouring the Burbage Brook for hours until the lure of the pub became overwhelming. Most flags found was four. One team went home in a sulk having navigated impeccably for two hours finding none. Six figure grid references meant that, even if you were lucky enough to arrive exactly at the given spot, areas of 10,000 square metres had to be scoured in search of the fag packet size markers.

Round Two: 22 Feb. Robin Hood carpark.

But faint heart never won a Night Nav: word has got out, more Oreads are being tempted from the seductive delights of Wirksworth Wall.

“Jan and I spent many hours meandering through the bogs of Gibbet Moor on Wednesday night – pretty awful for a while, but we were warned! Finding the flags was the easy bit, getting off the moor was a nightmare: tripping over tussocks and landing in yet another bog and when we finally made it the Robin Hood was long closed. Chris W.”

In the Devonshire he was just cashing up but did the decent thing and served us an urgently needed pint. The course setters, counting their teams back in, missed last orders which served them right.

Round Three: 21 March. Big Moor.

“Getting lost time again: visiting some of the most God-forsaken moors even the

Peak District has to offer. Start time to suit yourselves - BUT - since it doesn't get dark until 7.00pm anybody starting before this will get a really nasty extra point to start with, 'cos it'll be daylight. From 7 o'clock onwards normal rules will apply. It's night navigation, not an afternoon tea dance. I'll be there from about 6 o'clock.

Format- you'll be given an 8-figure Grid reference which will be the first point to find. It will be marked with a flag, which may be one of Tony's lovely fluorescent ones, or a more rugged affair carved out by me. The marker, flag or whatever, will have an 8-figure Grid Reference on it, which is the next point to aim for. There will be 8 points in all, or 9 for unethically early starters. You'll have realised by now that failure to find any point will result in you having no idea where the next one is, and the only option available is honourable suicide. However, since we can't afford to lose members, you will be given the GR of point number 5, so that if you get totally lost you can go there and re-group, and salvage your damaged pride by doing the rest of the course. And if you decide to end it all in Barbrook Reservoir - tough, it isn't there any more, so don't use it as a navigational aid.

"If you're still lying awake at night and worrying about your inability to find the last flag, then sleep easy - I've been back today to collect the remaining flags and somebody has obviously nicked it. "Well that's a relief! Having successfully navigated to CP 8, but wet and muddy from falling into a bog and with a failing head torch I was a bit fractious when we couldn't find it. Tan yr Wyddfa Work Meets Summer and Autumn 2012

One: in early August a small group of Hut Sub-Committee members went down & carried out some technical repairs & cut the grass. Graham & Margaret Foster delivered our new fridge. Colin & Tony Smedley discovered the dry rot fruiting body in the kitchen.

Two: Over the weekend of the 15th & 16th August Pam Storer led a work meet, which was also attended by Pete & Ali Kennington, Pam & Nodge, and Joan Pike. In addition to *a lot* of 'spring cleaning', the chimney was swept; bushes & small trees were cut down at the north end of the garden and along the lines of our main plot fences. The grass was cut, the hedge was trimmed, gutters cleared & the John Shreeve bench was treated.

Dry rot was also identified on the first floor landing. Pete Kennington identified a roof leak & suggested it might be the driver for the dry rot. Unfortunately, to add to our woes, an extensive growth of Japanese knotweed was found below the car park.

Three: the scheduled work meet took place on the 21st – 23rd September attended by Pete & Ali Kennington (again), Stuart & Andrea Haywood, Chris Jonson, Pete Lancaster, John Green & me. A lengthy section of dry stone wall was repaired and a lot of trees were cleared from below the car park. All logs around the site were split & cut to a size suitable for burning on the lounge fire. The grass was cut yet again, and the hut was prepared for the forthcoming dry rot treatment and building work.

Four; over the 9th to 11th November and immediately after the builders had completed their work indoors, another meet took place to bring the hut back into service. This was attended by Colin Hobday, Tony Smedley, Stuart & Andrea Haywood, Ruth Gordon & me. On our arrival we found water running in from above the lounge north window – enough to warrant a bucket to collect it. This is now being dealt with.

Also four one-day visits were made over this period, to witness progress on the building work and to discuss the Japanese knotweed problem with an ecologist from the Snowdonia National Park. Do other clubs have this much trouble with their huts?

We walked to the base of Craig yr Isfa and used the climbers' path to ascend to the col, after a little scramble we arrived at our first summit and second highest in Wales, 1064 mtrs high Carnedd Llewelyn. Next on the list was Yr Elen a kilometre or so out on a spur to the west. The light and views were excellent and well worth the extra effort.

The hut is back in service and open for use. However, there is still a problem; during prolonged heavy rain we still get a water leak from above the north lounge window (faces the coal bunker). We had expected that repairs to the roof would have eliminated this leak, but it's not so. A thorough inspection and testing with a garden hose on all the likely places did not reproduce the leak. We are currently in discussion with the builders regarding what to do; one option being to re-set the window ledge on the bedroom above. So, for the time being it would be convenient for you NOT to use the north east (Snowdon side, rear) bedroom, as we have not re-laid the carpet tiles or put back the curtains.

In the meantime, you can help me: if you are down at TYW during a period of heavy rain please have a look for signs of water coming in above this window. Then let me know what you see, whether you observe a leak or not.

I will tell you about our progress next month.

* You are eligible for **senior membership** if you will have reached “state pension age” on 1 January 2013. This applies to:

- Ladies born on or before 5 August 1951
- Gents born on or before 1 January 1948

§ Two ordinary or senior members living at the same address are eligible for **joint (family) membership**.

Prospective members who have been in the club since January 2011 will discover that your subs for 2012 becomes the same as the ordinary members’ rate, so you might as well get on with applying for full membership now. If you live at the same address as another ordinary member, you will be eligible for joint membership, which will cost you no more anyway.

All of the above rates include £11.75 (also unchanged from 2012) in respect of your BMC club membership. You cannot opt-out of this arrangement, but you can get a refund from the BMC if you are paying through another affiliated club. If your permanent address is outside the UK you are not a BMC club member and your subs will be 50% of the standard rate set out above.
