15-17 September Wasdale - Brackenclose hut meet Chris Radcliffe



Wasdale is regarded as the birthplace of British rock climbing, based on the first ascent of Napes Needle by W.P. Haskett Smith (solo) in 1886. It is the base for climbing on Scafell, Pillar Rock, Great Gable (Napes ridges and Kern Knotts) and therefore offers some of the best trad climbing in the UK. The opportunities for walking and fell running are equally superlative.

I have booked the FRCC hut – Brackenclose – for this meet. We have the opportunity to use up to 50% of the beds available: 9 men and 6 women, therefore it is essential that you make a firm booking with me before the meet. If we exceed these numbers, I may be able to engineer some flexibility by allowing

additional camping by the hut.

I shall be climbing in Austria for a month from August 13th, so will not pick up any mail or voice messages on my home phone. Therefore it is best to email me at chris@farfields.co.uk or text or call 07770 883259. I can also be messaged through Facebook.

The hut is in a superb position by the Lingmell Gill path that leads to Hollowstones and the Scafells. There is an immaculate view over Wastwater.

Sunday 24 September Derwent M.C. President's Meet

This year's event is based in Whatstandwell in the field at the bottom of President, Sally Newton's, garden grid ref SK333542. FB marks the spot. Come down the footpath from the road towards Whatstandwell Railway station, field on right; or across the railway and canal bridge and up path, field on left.

There is parking at SK331544 just up from the Family Tree next to the canal, or along Main Road on the right as you come up or on left past my house.

If it is raining we will adjourn to the house!!

The walk is approximately eight miles long and the treasure hunt is much easier than last year, it is all about words found around the walk. A map and answer sheet and photo clues will be available nearer the time. Also you can gain extra points by taking photos of set objects.

For the climbers: There are two small and fairly unused climbing areas along the route and one just outside the route, the CHALLENGE is to complete as many climbs as you can in these three areas -- you may need ancient guide books - Chatsworth Grit is a good one.

The climbs are on Shining Cliff, Crich Tors and in Dukes Quarry. Points awarded for each climb. If you think you would rather do something more conventional then the nearest climbs are Black Rocks, Wildcat, Pic Tor and areas along the A6. There is the usual bbq - please bring your own bbq and food/wine etc.

We can have a bonfire, AND IF YOU WANT TO BRING CAKES please do so!

I will run electric down so we can have tea.

Saturday 14 – Sunday 15 October Gogarth Dave Mawer

If you only ever visit the Sea Cliffs of Anglesey as a wet weather alternative to the mountains you may be missing the point. Gogarth offers a wide variety of climbing styles, with many of its routes the epitome of "Adventure" whatever your grade. The forthcoming meet has favourable tides with lows around midday allowing the tidal starts to dry out. However the great thing about Gogarth is that there are plenty of areas that are far enough from the sea not to be affected by tides or large swells. The bird bans are over with the crags having had plenty of time to be washed free of guano in the lovely welsh rain, opening up venues such as Red Walls and Mousetrap Zawn at South Stack as well as some of the many new areas in the new guides.

Once again we will base ourselves at the Valley of the Rocks Camp site, Portdafarch Road, Trearddur Bay, Isle of Anglesey, LL65 2LL. Tel: 01407765787. Booking isn't really necessary unless you need electric hook-up for which space is limited. Apparently the post code will lead you astray if you use Satnav. The best approach is to follow signs for south stack but then follow the coast road at its turning, then look out for Portdafarch Road on the left just before a small bay at the bottom of a hill. The campsite is about 1km on the right. Most importantly to

note is that accessible from the site is the Paddler's Return - a purveyor of fine beers and cuisine.

“Shall we do Climbers’ Club Direct? It’s not got anyone on it and gets three stars”

“It involves jamming?” Martin gives me a somewhat quizzical look, seemingly implying that as the club “Yoof” I wouldn’t be up for that kind of thing.

“And?” My mouth writes a cheque my climbing abilities might not be able to cover...

“Ok, sounds good, that last route was a bit sweaty, I’m going to pop back to the car and get some more chalk”, I begin to rack up while waiting for Martin to finish flaking out the rope before heading back to his car.

As soon as he leaves I grab my jamming gloves from my rucksack and launch myself up the crack with the aim of being at the top of the pitch before Martin comes back to make any disparaging remarks about my jamming gloves. Ben looks suspiciously at them.

“No, I’m not following you on anything you need those for!”

“I’ll chuck them down once I’ve led it”

“OK” Ben still looks sceptical, however he puts me on belay.

I move swiftly up to the roof. Leaning out on a hand jam I slot in a hex, my fist perfectly fits into a constriction above the roof. I pull on the jam and paste my feet on the vertical wall, ignoring the ludicrously polished footholds. An undignified use of my knee sees me established in the crack but very much not in balance, I easily move from one jam to the next, bridging across to a flake and loop a sling round the small tree growing out of the rock.

I greet the lady from the team ahead of us when I reach the belay ledge, fortunately the crack swallows my two biggest cams. I throw my jamming gloves out from the belay, they spiral down to earth like small frisbees, thankfully they both land on the floor allowing me to fulfil my half of the bargain.

Ben begins to progress up the crack, Ben’s red helmet pokes out around the roof, as he begins to move past the roof he appears to be struggling.

I take in some slack.

He’s off!

He’s still swinging, I don’t remember the crack traversing that much!

With relief I see Ben reach the lowest point of his pendulum before safely continuing his swing upwards.

As I lower Ben down to the floor he decides to have another go.

I feel the rope go tight as he swings across the face again.

He launches up for a third go, it’s only a Hard VS jamming crack, surely he can find some little crimp somewhere and use his vast amount of bouldering strength to get past the roof?

Third time’s the charm, Ben manages to pull past the roof and soon arrives at the belay.

Oddly, given that this, a HVS granite jamming crack, was his introduction to jamming he seems to have a grin on his face! Maybe the youths can jam after all (with a little help)!

Aside from jamming shenanigans this year’s Dartmoor meet was quite small with Spenser Gray, Alan Aslin (and wife), Vince Wilkins (and family), Ben Wooler and Martin Lancaster all in attendance. Oread Forward Thinking Group: progress report August 2017 Stuart Firth

The Forward Thinking Group has been beavering away for several months now and members might be wondering what progress has been made. We have had five group meetings with discussion ranging over a wide spectrum: membership profile; associated needs and wants; hut usage; meets programme; communications; club sustainability etc.

The principal effort in recent months has been the “Have Your Say” exercise - both in face-to-face and written form. Responses are still coming in and to-date

we have received around sixty - for which the group gives grateful thanks to the contributors. Please keep them coming!

The views expressed are both fascinating and highly divergent, as one might expect, and it is clear that the Oread is a very "broad church". It is quite poignant to read the effect the club has had on people's lives and encouraging to read how much people value their membership. Although the world is ever-changing, it would clearly be good to pass on to succeeding generations the positive and unique values and experiences gained through adventurous outdoor activity.

There are many different levels of activity within the club as members progress along their personal life cycle; and a wide variety of aspirations. Some common themes are emerging and the group will be working on these in the coming months. Key examples are the meets programme and communications. With the plethora of digital channels, it has become necessary for the FTG to form a subgroup to consider this latter topic as a subject in itself. Tony Howard will lead this with input from Pete Scott, Ruth Gordon, Mike Wren and Michael Hayes.

The group's next objective is to analyze the feedback received from "Have Your Say" - challenging in itself - and then to formulate some concrete recommendations for the Committee to consider.

Ann Kenyon 1934 - 2017

Ann Kenyon, wife of the late Bill Kenyon, passed away on the 14th of July at St. Oswalds Hospital in Ashbourne after a lengthy stay at the hospital.

Anne was a keen mountaineer in her younger days and an amazing long distance walker. As Bill used to be a guide for the Ramblers Association in the Alps, Anne always accompanied him on these trips. Bill's account of their experiences on the John Muir trail (in the 50th Anniversary Journal) leaves one in no doubt as to her toughness and determination.

She organised all the food for their three week trek and she set out carrying a 38lb pack. It soon became much lighter after a third of their food was stolen by bears - but Ann insisted they could, and would continue - on iron rations. Their adventures included the crossing of a severely damaged bridge, "listing at a crazy angle, 500 feet above the river, entailing a precarious vertical scramble"; the fording of "a treacherous creek with glacier-rounded rocks underfoot and a waterfall 60 feet below". While climbing up the Forester Pass, 13,200 feet, Bill found himself "lagging behind my racehorse wife." As Bill was legendary for his fitness, this really demonstrates what a very fit and able walker she was.

She has been a long standing member of first the Derby Nomads and later also of the Oread and she actively encouraged her beloved grandchildren to become Oread members.

The following appreciation of her life has been kindly provided by her son in law, Neil Bennett:

Ann was a passionate walker and mountaineer who travelled in many of the wildest parts of the world during her long life. She was a committed member of the Oread and the club enriched her life a great deal.

Her interest was kindled and sustained by her husband Bill Kenyon, and she was his partner in countless adventures over the years. It is fair to say that there was rarely a weekend that would find them at home. On Friday night the rucksacks would be packed, the boots Nikwaxed and they would be away to the Lakes, Wales or Scotland. Summer would find them in the Alps or the Pyrenees, where Ann was capable of cooking a three-course meal for the family on a campfire in a pressure cooker.

As they grew older their travels became ever more adventurous and she walked and climbed in the Drakensberg mountains in South Africa, the Himalayas, the Rockies, and even New Zealand. During these many expeditions Ann would put most party members to shame with her cheerfulness and steadfast endurance.

Her expeditions are too numerous to list, but two stand out. The first was when she walked the John Muir Trail, the 211-mile route from the Yosemite Valley to Mount Whitney in California that spans some of the remotest regions in the USA. She and Bill had been warned about the risk from bears before they set out and had rigged up a system to hoist their supplies into a tree each evening. Alas, they woke in the night and looked out of their tent to find that a baby bear had climbed onto its mother's back to rip open the sack and feast on the contents. This left them both perilously short of food, but it was Ann who rationed them effectively to ensure they reached civilisation.

The second great adventure was her ascent of Mount Parchamo (20,575ft) in 1994. On that expedition the party had already climbed Mount Ramdung (19,438ft) and were understandably tired, but they had one chance to summit Parchamo. The sherpas said they would only take a party if three climbers agreed to take part. Bill and Ann immediately put themselves forward but couldn't find a third. It was only after some hours of gentle persuasion that evening that they found another volunteer. A glorious day of climbing and a successful ascent followed.

Ann's quiet determination and deep appreciation of the natural world and her long list of achievements are an inspiration for every climber and walker.

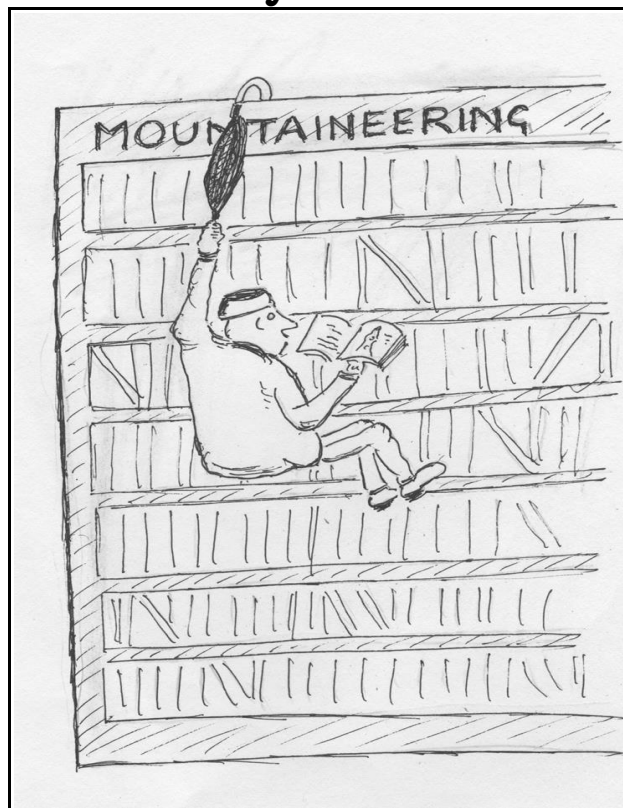
