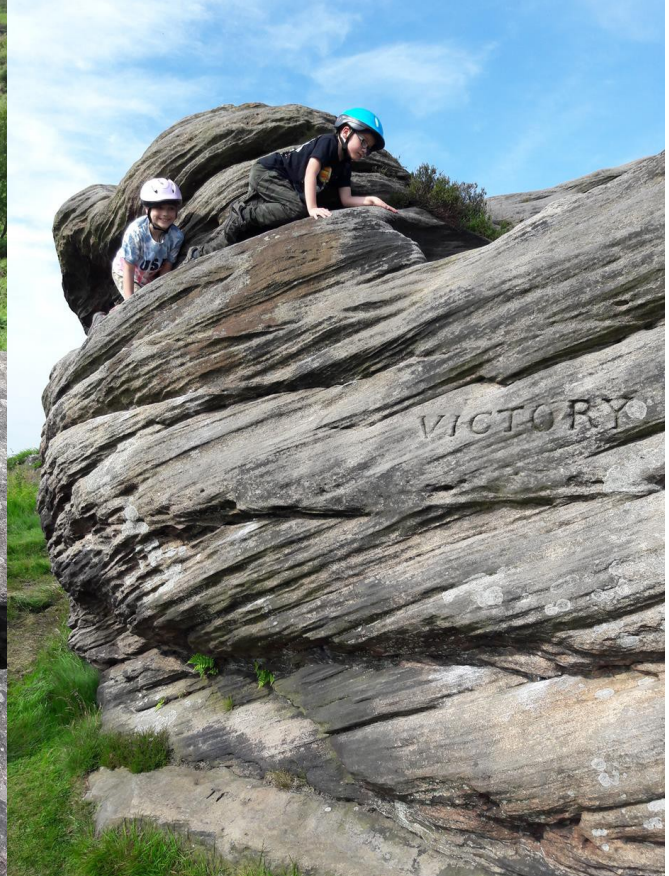

The BMC AGM: a report from Spenser Gray

Pete Lancaster and I both left the remaining members of Snod's Little Langdale meet prevaricating on the subject of the best course of action for an enjoyable day out to drive over to Kendal for the BMC AGM. The break in the recent run of fantastic weather meant that the attendees didn't feel too hard done by while looking at the rain lashing against the windows. Dave Penlington put in a surprise appearance, ensuring that we had representatives from three generations of the club's membership in attendance. He brandished a copy of the newsletter at me and thanked me for providing some long overdue clarity on the matters presented to the membership, it's always nice to have a positive introduction to one of the club's founding members!

All of the yes/ no motions were passed (including the Item 8 Ordinary Resolution seeking to provide the BMC with a mandate to go forward with the remainder of the Organisational Review Group's recommendations). The Tier 3 compliant

articles (Item 9a) were accepted by 92% of the voting membership (7000+ votes or roughly 8.5% of the membership which is far higher than other similar organisations which apparently receive votes from approximately 0.5% of the membership).

A short interlude followed the vote (four hours into the meeting might I add) at which point an Earl Grey and Lemon Cake duly appeared from under my chair, Les Ainsworth was reassured that I had not laced it with Novichoks in an assassination attempt, and an orderly queue formed to devour the not quite big enough cake (there was enough for maybe 20 people, there were 130 in the room)! The meeting continued, Lynn Robinson was elected President, John Roberts Vice President and all of the existing members of the executive were reelected to their existing positions.

Over the next year the BMC will undertake the necessary detailed work to implement the new articles and to improve its engagement with members (8.5% of the membership voting may be better than other representative bodies but our community can do better than that), if you feel that the BMC does quite a lot right (as I do), or believe that it has lost its way, this work poses a significant opportunity to improve the organisation to be better able to represent the interests of its members and of the wider mountaineering community within the UK. If you wish to get involved in a constructive manner I will be delighted to see this happen, as would Pete Lancaster.

I was firmly assured that some climbing happened on Saturday afternoon, however am far from convinced that it could have been an enjoyable experience!

Rusty's Puzzle Corner

Last month's puzzle solution:

Rusty's original answer was as follows:

Main party will be at summit in 2h 30m so XXXXXXXX needs to do the ascent in 2hrs to be 25% faster and so must wait 30 mins.

In the first five minutes coffee starting off at 150 deg or 90 above room temp loses 48 degrees to 42 above room temp.

Next five minutes, since rate of cooling is proportional to temperature above that of surroundings

coffee cools by $48 \cdot 42 / 90$ or 22.4 to 19.6

10 to 15 mins $48 \cdot 19.6 / 90$ or 10.45 to 9.15

15 to 20 mins $48 \cdot 9.15 / 90$ or 4.88 to 4.27

20 to 25 mins $48 \cdot 4.27 / 90$ or 2.28 to 1.99

25 to 30 mins $48 \cdot 1.99 / 90$ or 1.06 to 0.93 deg

our hero should therefore start off when the coffee is at 60.93 deg (0.93 above room temp.)

Strictly speaking the rate of cooling changes continuously so a check at 5 minute intervals is an approximation, but a rigorous mathematical check using a continuously varying function gives virtually the same result (Not sure about the grammar of that last sentence but Ruth will put me right).

Snod, having a sneak preview of this, challenged the first sentence: 25% faster is 37 ½ minutes, not 30. Rusty explains his reasoning – Snod disagrees – the parties are rapidly heading for a pistols at dawn conclusion to the matter!
