Sunday 17 March Peak District Boundary Walk - Bollington to Whaley Bridge Chris and Jan Wilson

This is advance notice of the final boundary walk of this winter. And what a pleasant surprise it was when we had a look at it on a cold January day and found it to be a lovely, worthwhile walk. It has something for everyone, even hardened mountaineers returning from the frozen north. The walk is about 11 miles long with 500 metres ascent and descent. The slopes are generally fairly gentle although a couple of steep pulls might warm you up!

We start in the "Happy Valley" (the market town of Bollington in Cheshire). Apart from a lot of free parking it offers cafes, pubs and shops. After leaving the town we head uphill towards Andrew's Knob and Bakestonedale Moor, where some gorgeous views take in the surrounding area and much of the route ahead.

A lengthy downhill section follows passing the Coffee Tavern (is this too soon for a

break?) before Adlington Basin on the Macclesfield Canal (latecomers could have used this as a short cut) and the Miners Arms. After a brief pause for lunch we follow the canal north before turning east and gently uphill to Lyme Park where cafes are available for further refuelling. We continue through the grounds and on up to Higher Moor and Dissop Head, with fine views in all directions. A slight dip follows as we head on to Whaley Moor and the Dipping Stone. Then its downhill all the way to Toddbrook Reservoir, Whaley Bridge and the River Goyt. Although parking is available here, it's not as easy as at the start (about 15 minutes drive away).

Further details will appear next month, but what I need are volunteers to help with transport, and it would be wonderful to have an idea of how many might be interested in some simple pub food at lunch (soup and chips for example). 14 July – 4 August Alpine Meet Otztal, Austria Spenser Gray

This year the Oread Mountaineering Club will be visiting the Otztal valley in Austria. Some of the mountains were featured in Chris Radcliffe's evening lecture back at the start of October. For those who were unable to attend it looks like a stunning area with a choice of snowy alpinism, rocky alpine ridge scrambles, bolted multipitch rock routes in the Stubai Alps, a range of Via Ferratas and a huge number of single pitch crags. For those who are less vertically inclined there are a number of valley walks and mountain bike rides which can be undertaken either directly from the campsite or with a short drive. As ever with the alps there are also some sizeable climbs for the road cyclists to undertake.

We will be staying at Otztal Camping Arena in the village of Umhausen, this is located at the heart of the valley. Camping will cost around 12 euros per person per night (depending on size of tent). This is one of the cheaper campsites in the area and appears to have excellent facilities (although I am yet to figure out what an Adventure Shower is...):<https://oetztalescamping.com/>

Mapping is provided by the DAV (Alpenvereinskarte) or by Kompass. I have heard good things about the Alpenvereinskarte and have previously been disappointed by Kompass maps. Alpenvereinskarte numbers 31/1, 31/2, 30/5 and 30/6.

Some standout routes seem to be the North Ridges of Wildspitze, Weisskogel and Hinterer Brochkogel, Mischbachgrat (Habicht), East Ridge (Zuckerhutl), East Ridge (Wilde Leck), NE Face (Schrankogel), NW Ridge (Ruderhofspitze), N Face (Ruderhofspitze), NE Ridge (Maningkogel), Luftballonweg (Maningkogel)

I aim to leave the UK on 14th July and return on the 28th, other people will likely be travelling out the weekend after and many of the retired members will use the

Nigel's account of his 38 year relationship with the **Piz Bernina** last month brought back memories for **Jack Ashcroft**.....

Here is a photograph I took way back in the summer of 1960 - it shows the Spalla Grat, the south approach to the Piz Bernina (4049.1 m), some two hours above the Monte Rosa Hut. It is much shorter than the Biancograt - the approach from the north - which is some six hours above the Boval Hut.

The photograph shows John Fisher, Colin Hobday and June Walker within 100 metres of the summit rock block of the Piz Bernina so clearly shown on this year's Dinner Menu card, but off to the right of my photograph. The pinnacle on the left is the junction of the Spalla Grat and the east ridge of the Seersen.

Black Rocks Night Climbing 12 December Ruth Gordon

Well, to the best of my knowledge and belief nobody actually went to Black Rocks this year - but a round dozen - maybe more - disported themselves at Harborough. It's hard to count in the dark even when a misty moon made a brief appearance. It was dry and the rock felt good underfoot - but a chill wind whistled about the top so we were grateful that the early call for pies at 8 pm forced a retreat after a couple of routes. On arrival the climbers found a large jolly party already toasting their toes in front of a magnificent fire. 18 of us sat down to eat, at a proper laid dining table no less, and the home-made pies were truly excellent. By the time we'd eaten the wimps from the climbing wall had arrived plus sundry walkers, cyclists and hell-drivers who kept on and on arriving - I think I counted 37 Oreads in this very cosy pub - fortunately not all at the same time! 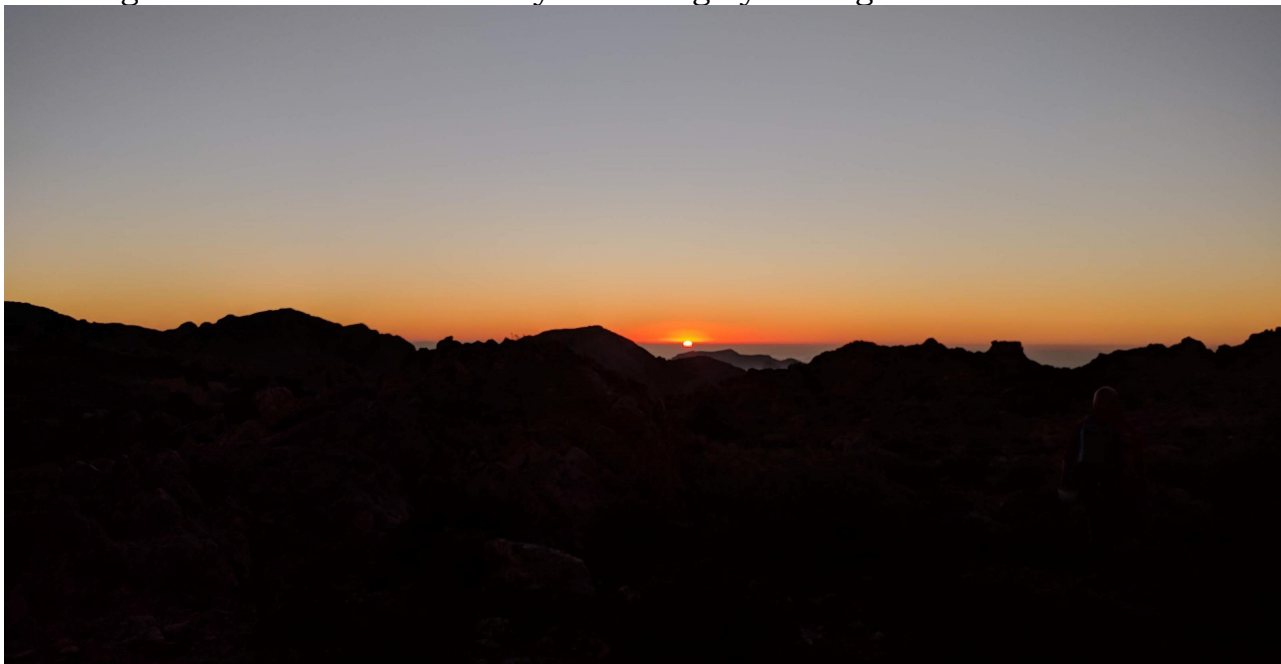

Morocco, the Anti-Atlas Spenser Gray

Shortly after I started climbing six years ago I came across this article:

I was sufficiently taken with the idea of the climbing in the area that I chose to take up trad climbing with a view to doing a trip there when I had enough experience. Cue several years of trad all over England and Wales, bits and bobs in Scotland, Spain, the Alps and a three week trip to Arapiles. There have been some fine adventures over the course of those years, however the experience of climbing in the Anti-Atlas certainly ranks highly amongst all the others!

I was glad to have five other members of the Climbers' Club (Mark Anstiss, Mark Courtiour, Harry Moss, Brian Hodgson and Geoff Der), a keen aspirant (Marcin Kruszelnicki) and Harry's Old Friend (a half rope which might well predate me!) join me on the trip. Some of whom I had climbed with/ met before and others who I had not, everyone provided good company both on and off the crag.

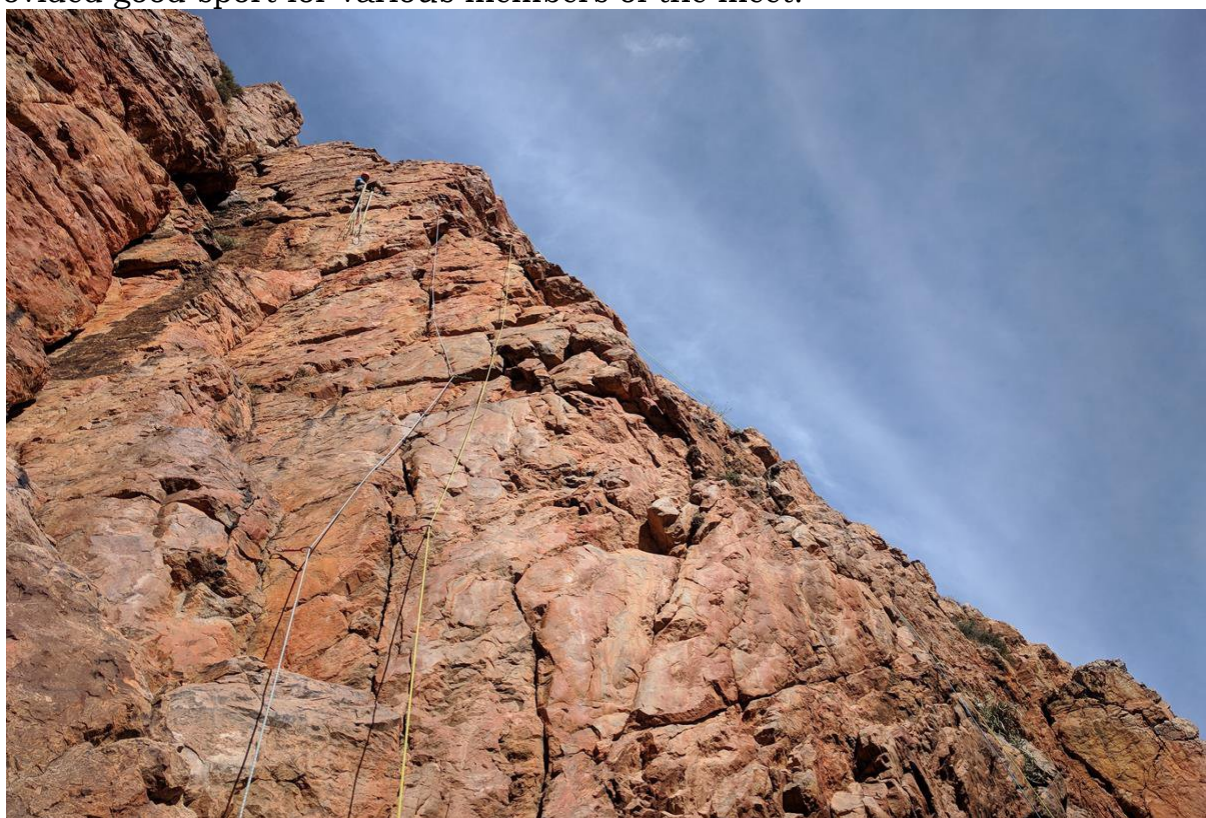


For the first half of the trip we based ourselves in Tafraout at the Hotel Argana, a low cost means of accommodation (100 dhirams pppn for shared rooms), during this time we climbed some excellent routes including Ride the Wild Wind, Flake Quake, High Sierra (bring BIG cams for these two and don't expect perfect rock), White Tower Original Route and White Tower (Slot Machine). *Mark Courtiour dispatching the crux pitch of White Tower Original.* Clearly the mountain routes are what the climbing on the south side is all about with White

Tower Original being one of the stand out routes for the year in my eyes (also having one of the least comfortable belays I have ever used!).

There are a good variety of places to eat in Tafraout, Restaurant La Kasbah is certainly worth a visit, as was a small French place on the left just after the bridge. Tagine forms a large part of the menu here, so it is good that it is quite tasty! Marcin did choose to brave a "Goat Evaporator one night", I don't think he was much more certain what had been done to the animal after he'd eaten it! The second part of the trip was spent at the Ksar Rock Guesthouse to the west of Ida Ougnidif, it's got a heck of a view from the bedroom window:

The food here was quite basic (and felt quite thin on the ground at times!), it seemed that we got the same amount of soup/ tagine when there were six meat eaters as when there were four! Geoff seemed to do pretty well as a vegetarian! Ksar Rock provides an excellent experience with easy (but slightly prickly) access to a range of 3* routes, Morocco Coco, Sahara, Pelez, Jedi Grooves, Age of Empires, Palladin, Desert Storm, Cannon Buttress Direct and Civilisation all provided good sport for various members of the meet:

We did also make the occasional foray into Ida to buy food for our lunches (also to get internet so that Marcin could attempt to find his wallet, wherever it had gone after he left it on the plane when travelling to Morocco!)

The mountain routes in the area also proved to be excellent with teams enjoying Pink Lady, Black Beauty, Inshallah, Moroccan Gold, Jaws (What a chimney!!!!), Michael Burka (my first E1 lead in about eight months, thanks for not complaining how long I took to get up it Mark and Marcin!), Crazy Mushrooms Ridge and Hee-Haw. I also snatched the opportunity to go for a walk after

climbing (mostly seconding) Otello on the Sanctuary, this took me into the valley behind Upper Eagle Crag.

November's puzzle solution

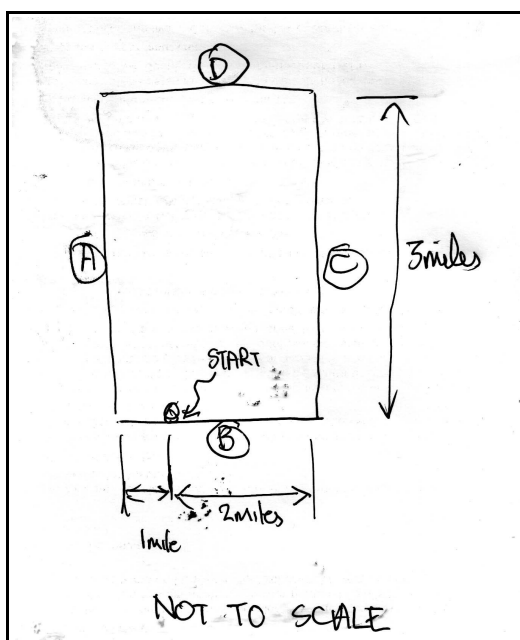

The Oread Fell Race was revived (again) and a new concept was introduced. Oread MC - Review of Status

The outcome of the review is that the Oread will remain an “unincorporated association” but this will be reviewed at regular intervals of 5 years or less.

See below for detail of how your committee reached this decision and an explanation of the insurance cover which underpins the Club's operations.

Almost a year ago the committee began developing a Health and Safety policy for the Oread. The legal status of the club was almost immediately identified as a major issue. Periodic reviews are recommended by the BMC and were recommended by the Forward Thinking Group. Concern about their financial liability was expressed by some trustees and committee members.

The Oread has always been an “unincorporated” association. This has many advantages but also significant disadvantages.

It was founded by agreement between the members and no further steps are required. It can have any aims and its rules can be whatever we choose. Our members can have a say in day-to-day decisions. Administration is simple, and there are no rules regarding the format of accounts or where they have to be submitted.

However, it is not a body corporate and does not have a separate legal existence from its individual members; accordingly it can neither sue nor be sued other than through its officers and members. It cannot hold land and investments other than in the name of officers or trustees. It cannot make formal contracts. The club does not have limited liability. The committee, trustees and sometimes the members of the club may be held liable for the debts of the club and other obligations. Members, trustees and officers can be unclear about their liabilities. In certain circumstances committee members can be held personally liable to compensate a third party for harm they have suffered as a result of the wrongful actions of the club.

The purpose of the review was to consider the current risks, liabilities and their implications to the club, the committee, officers, trustees and members and decide whether any of the many alternative structures would be better suited for the Oread. Perhaps the main object of any change would be to minimise the threat of litigation against individuals.

Several organisations (eg. the BMC and Sport England) make recommendations about what to consider. Chris Radcliffe attended a BMC training event on this topic. Our review looked at the pros and cons of the many alternative club

structures available. Some clubs have become companies limited by guarantee, others Community Benefit Societies or Industrial and Provident Mutual Societies. Charity status can sometimes be of benefit.

The risks and liabilities are linked to the insurance cover that the Oread and its members have. This is provided through the BMC. (See the article below). Its cover is extremely comprehensive and is intended to protect against any consequent financial penalties, but individuals may none the less face a harrowing experience should they be sued. The insurance cover provided is the same irrespective of status. If we were 'incorporated' and sued individuals would still have to appear in court, and could, in some circumstances still be personally liable. Claims against sports clubs however are rare and almost all are settled out of court.

Any change to the Club's status would incur financial cost and be time consuming as well as imposing additional duties and regulation. The review concluded that it would not be appropriate to change the current status of the Oread, but that this be looked at again in a maximum of 5 years.

We have however concluded that a number of steps be taken to minimise the risks. These include updating and modernising the club rules (to cover such issues as diversity and the termination of membership), reviewing the club insurance policies and ensuring that all reasonable measures are taken to minimise the risk by adhering to its Health and Safety, Fire Safety, Data Protection and similar policies, as well as complying with the terms of its insurance policies. These actions are now being undertaken, and are close to completion.

How the BMC Combined Liability Insurance protects your club and you.

The information below is taken from a document kindly supplied to the Oread M.C. by Charles Stupart, Hon. Secretary of the Alpine Club. It was written to help A.C. members understand how clubs are protected against legal liability by the BMC. Relevant parts of the document are reproduced here for your information.

One of the range of benefits that all clubs and their members gain from being affiliated to the BMC is Combined Liability Insurance. This "Master" policy has been specially developed by Howden, the BMC's Insurance broker, and protects clubs and their members against legal liability under Civil Law.

What is Combined Liability Insurance

The policy is designed to provide cover whilst undertaking activities recognised by the BMC. The main features of the Policy are:

- [i] **Public Liability** – Accidental bodily injury to third parties and/or damage to third party property. This section of the policy provides cover for: (a) member to member liability and (b) liability arising out of the sharing of knowledge.
- [ii] **Products Liability** – Accidental bodily injury to third parties and/or damage to third party property arising out of any goods lent to another person by an

Individual or club member or sold or supplied by the club.

[iii] **Libel and Slander** – Includes defamation, which is vital in relation to allegations of child abuse.

[iv] **Directors' and Officers' Liability** – Legal Liability protection in respect of negligent mismanagement.

The Policy is also extended to protect against liability arising out of the use, ownership or possession of any **club premises** e.g. mountaineering huts, and includes protection for Trustees.

How much cover does it provide?

The 2018 “Master Policy” provides the following cover:

Public Liability £15,000,000 any one event

£15,000,000 any one period of cover for products and pollution

Professional Indemnity £10,000,000 any one claim and period of cover

Directors and Officers Liability £10,000,000 any one claim and period of cover

In Summary

From the £13.25 affiliation fee paid by an affiliated club to the BMC for each UK member, £2.50 purchases this Combined Liability Insurance.

It means that all the Club's Officers and Trustees, and all the Club's Volunteers eg Meet Leaders, Lecture Organisers, Dinner Conveners, IT team, are protected from potentially being personally liable.

It also mitigates the risk of the Club's assets requiring to be disposed of in the event of paying out to cover a successful claim, or to defend a claim.

For the members, it provides Public Liability Insurance, whether on a Club event or not, when engaged in a wide range of mountaineering activities. For more information please see:
