He took the tents of those with more 'relaxed' ethics back to Clapham for onward motor transportation.



The main group assembled and headed into the mist towards Ingleborough passing Gaping Gill main shaft, where I tried to describe the cave below. As we approached Ingleborough's summit plateau the cloud seemed to be thinning and taking on a blue hue. On the summit the clouds parted, the sun broke through and views were enjoyed. However hopes of the day being a glorious winter's day with sun and fresh snow were short lived as the clouds regrouped and that was about 'it' for the rest of the day. ## The Youlgreave Yomp 21 January Pip Leach

#### **Ruth Gordon writes:**

I first met Tom in 1976 through the Derwent Mountaineering Club but soon after he left the area and I only met him again in 2020 after he had moved back to Matlock. Climbing and mountaineering had been a life-long passion for him – even a heart attack and subsequent bypass operation had not been allowed to end his Alpine adventures! Closer to home, his explorations led to the publishing of the Cicerone guide to Scrambles in the Dark Peak, co-authored with his friend, Terry Sleaford. Tom told me he greatly missed being part of a mountaineering club but with the state of his knees could no longer participate in most activities. I said I thought there were others in just the same situation and that it would be worth offering a regular gentle-paced walk for the less physically fit.

Tom was delighted to become a member of the Oread in 2021 and really got stuck in to developing the Thursday short walks programme as soon as Covid regulations permitted. The walks were advertised in my name but it was Tom who planned and led most of them, entertaining us with snippets of local history and personal stories of his childhood adventures and working life. We had many interesting conversations about art and music as well as mountaineering. On our last meeting in November he told me he was being treated for depression but he talked of his plans to start researching his family history and the Thursday walk he would lead in January. So it was a terrible shock to read that his body had been recovered from the River Derwent just before Christmas. I am deeply saddened by the loss of a lovely, kind man who had so much to live for.

**Pete Amour writes:** I am really saddened to hear about Tom, I had only met him a few times, that last being the walk from Ashover, three or four months ago, he really was a nice man. Depression is such dreadful affliction, often misunderstood, stigmatised and under communicated. I hope his family find peace in good memories of Tom, he came across as a kindly, caring and interesting man, may he rest in peace.

### **Rusty's Puzzle Corner**

#### This month's puzzle:

A senior Oread member completed a sensational ascent, the first by a club member, and in the course of this he, in his own words, "was obliged to chastise his climbing companion."

What was achieved during this tour de force and what occurrence led to the admonition?

#### Last month's puzzle solution:

I received two responses this month. The first, from Rob Tresidder, as follows arrived immediately after the newsletter was sent out: "Going with the setter's curious definition of a chain as 14.7 perches, then the postgrads were set equidistantly at 20 chains or 400 metres. If each of the four postgrads is equidistant from all of the other three, then they are at the vertices of a tetrahedron. Most famous tetrahedral mountain in the world? Weiβhorn? Slope angle of each face of a regular tetrahedron is 71° (too steep to avalanche). This is far steeper than any of that splendid peak's faces so I can't think of any mountain (we are a mountaineering club) that would fit Rusty's very precise measurements. My solution then has three of the students standing at the vertices of an equilateral triangle, side 400m, in a large very flat, horizontal area on a still windless day. Each of the students is holding one end of a 400m rope. The other ends of the three ropes are attached to the basket of a hot air balloon containing the fourth student, which is fired up and ascends until the ropes are taut. No allowance has been made for the curvature of the earth.

BTW there are only four perches (rods or poles) in a chain, not 14.7"

The second, from Snod arrived a month later!

The students are spacially arranged in a regular tetrahedron (or 3 simplex). The equilateral triangle's sides are 293 perches. They couldn't do this in England or Wales as the vertical height of the conical hill / mountain is 239 perches so they have gone to Scotland or further afield.

The geometrical figure required to equally position the four measuring positions is a tetrahedron. The move to three dimensional thinking was intended to be the main point of the puzzle.

I apologise for my error in the definition of a rod pole or perch but in spite of this it will be clear that the height of the apex point exceeds that of any uk mountain, and so far as I am aware there exists no mountain on the planet offering the necessary steep gradient on three lines set out 120 degrees apart. It therefore follows that the exercise can only take place using a tall man made edifice such as a tower block, I am told such things are prolific in a place called London which I do not propose to explore.

Snod rightly stipulated a tetrahedron. Mr Tresidder's solution was unassailable in all respects,

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
