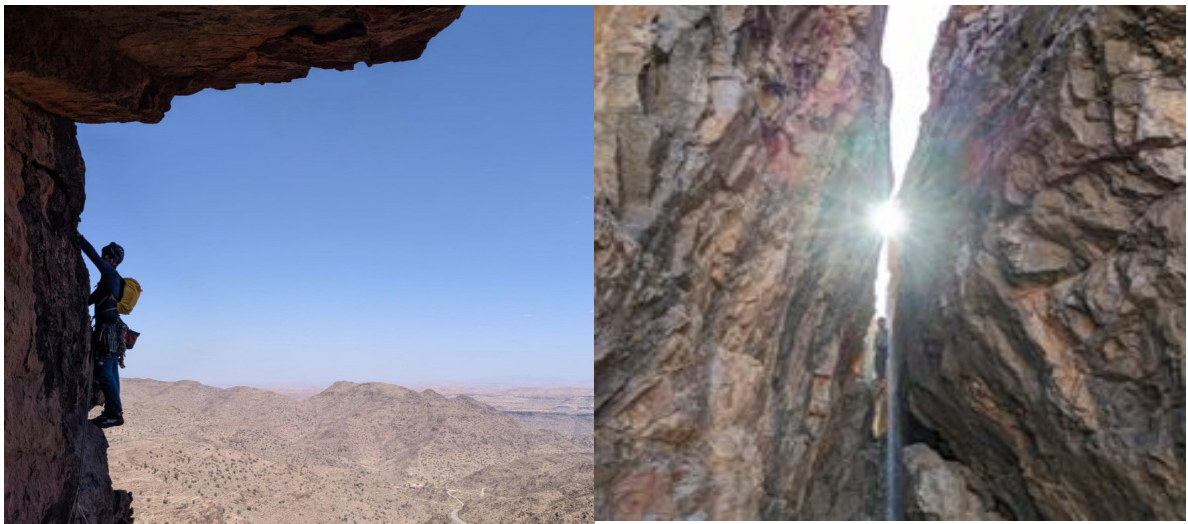
October 8-15 2023 Tafraoute Morocco Ed Bloomfield

Me and Chris Ashworth went out to Tafraoute on the 8th October flying from London Luton on a very early flight with the intention of making the 2.5 hour drive from Agadir to Tafraoute in the day light. This proved to be a good idea although we wish we had stayed at the airport the night before for some rest and in hindsight we should have stopped at one of the north facing mountain crags on the drive in.

We climbed a local route in the evening, very narrowly avoiding climbing in the dark on the first climb, only 500m from the hotel!

It's fair to say on day one we were feeling pretty intimidated and isolated. We were very aware that there was no one coming to get us if something went wrong so we tried to minimize the risks by only climbing 3* classic routes in the hope all the loose rock had been pulled down before and climbing in the shade to avoid any heat related incidents.

The next day we headed out to the Hairpin Slabs in search for a short walk in and some morning shade. We climbed a route "Scrunchie" S 4b 3*. The route was a nice intro to the climbing style - run out and holds of plenty. We had plenty of time so we went to Azumer crag on the way back where we found some other English men hiding in the shade, we climbed "Be Prepared" and "Razzle dazzle". We managed to put a new route down when trying to get off Be Prepared after misreading the descent.



The next day, on the recommendation of Mr Wilson, we went to Lower Eagle crag and climbed "Pink Lady". This route was our first longer multipitch and after some bush whacking we started up what proved to be a superb climb with some fantastically exposed positions. The Chimney and the

traverse were the best pitches on the route; the holds were plentiful and the gear was adequate.

Wednesday we went to climb a Bonnington route “Multiple Pillars of Pleasure” on Tskara East pillars but it proved too hot so we jumped on Pans Labyrinth thinking we would get through it quicker as we had more grades in hand - it proved to be the route of the week! With some really memorable pitches. Chris took the window traverse, tip toeing out under the roof before shooting up the arete, and I got the hidden chimney to finish! Back and footing with a splitter crack for gear.

That evening we ventured out of the hotel as we had had enough of bread and tagine - so we went for the obvious choice - Pizza.

Thursday we went, following again in Chris Wilson's and Bonnington's footsteps, on a route called Gamma on Greek Buttress. This was the first 5a climb of the week and it was definitely a bit steeper.

Friday we set off again for Multiple Pillars of Pleasure and arrived later in the day to have the shade in our favour.

The last day we thought we should go for the Bonnington hat trick and climb another classic that him, Joe Brown and Derek Walker put up “Space walk” in the Allemen valley, the route finding was adventurous, I think we traversed as much as we climbed vertically and as we topped out the heavens opened and we got our first taste of Moroccan rain! Although it was short lived it was still pretty surreal after baking in the valley sun all day. The evenings were short and were spent eating tagine and bread then diving into guide books to prepare for the next day...

We will be returning next autumn Oct/Nov and it would be great to go out as a bigger team!



Bullstones 9-11 December John Gwyther



Thirteen (bad start) Oread stalwarts assembled at the Norfolk Arms Ringinglow Friday night to start the Bullstones 2023. Paseo de Gracia Chulilla Roger Gibbs

The sweeping orange and grey walls of the gorge at Chulilla are a breathtaking sight. Sport climbing paradise. I hadn't been since 2019 and I couldn't help but grin as we walked across the bridge, a glorious blue sky above, the sun warming the crags on the left side. Obviously, we head right, into the shade: we weren't here to enjoy ourselves. It was Day Two, and surprisingly I'm allowed a warm up. As in an actual route that wasn't at my limit, not just flogging up the gully approach.

Now it was time for something a bit more demanding: Paseo de Gracia, a 37m monster. The start is guarded by a steep grey groove, with an obvious layback / pinch at the top. Above this is a bulge and what was hopefully a thank god bucket a little higher still. Chris had done some techy, balancey looking manoeuvres to get his right hand to the top of the layback / pinch. Then he'd fondled some general rubbishness with his left, flicked his feet around and arrived at the maybe jug. More snakehips action and he pulled over and headed on up. When it came to my turn, I crept higher and grasped the bottom of the pinch / layback. Bounce the right hand again to the top. I fondle where Chris had fondled.

"It's not very good, that left hand," floats up from the deck. I'd noticed.

Right, enough technique. I slap my feet on somewhere and jerk up for the “bucket”. It is a bucket. More technical wizardry? Nope. Match and go again. Another smaller but decent hold. Feet up and pull over onto slabbier ground and try to get my breathing under control. I can’t pant too hard as it hurts my ribs, and my lungs are full of snot. I pant gently.

Above me orange rock leans out in another little groove which curves from left to right. I work my way up, undercutting a crack at the side of the groove until I have to commit to smaller holds on the wall to the right. Chris had stepped further right here and contrived some sort of rest. I decide to push on. A little overlap bars the way, the holds not entirely obvious and everything leans. It’s all become rather pressing. I try a disappointing crimp for my left. That’s not going to cut it. Looking left and feeling under real pressure now, I spot another, slightly higher hold. My left hand stabs out and lands it. It’s good, and more importantly the extra height allows me to work my feet higher. A few more punchy moves and it relents. More constricted panting.

Below me, Chris is looking quite small and he’s really not, but I am still barely halfway up this monster pitch. The rest of the route unravels itself in a long, pleasurable flow. There are no hard moves, but no really easy ones either: I’m not sure I would use the guidebook expression “victory ladder”.

Back on to smooth grey rock, peppered with goutes d’eau, but the belay is on sight, decorated with two tiny quickdraws. Suddenly the butchness of the crux is forgotten and I’m smearing on not a lot. Teetering up and not daring to breathe (I can’t anyway), I’m level with the chains. I haul up nearly 40m of rope and clip. Now I can swing left with abandon, the smears suddenly much more secure. A silent whoop and I’m lowered back to the world. I almost remember to gaze around the breathtaking gorge on the way down.

Later I discover that Paseo de Gracia is an elegant, majestic boulevard, once a showcase for Barcelona's bourgeoisie at the turn of the 19th century. It’s now reputed to be the most expensive street in the city. Lots of modernista buildings, but I’m sure you knew that. The route seemed pretty majestic, but there wasn’t a lot of elegance on show from me.

Colin came to the Oread along with Rock, Keith Gregson and John Linney as former members of (I think) one of the Stafford area climbing clubs. I remember he teamed up with myself and Reg Squires at the Welsh Hut, probably during an Easter gathering and we went round to Tryfan and tackled some of the easy but polished and worn classic climbs on the Milestone and Gribin Facet, probably in 1983 or 1984

None of us were natural athletes and so our normal habitats were the lower graded old classic routes and mountain walking, albeit in all conditions. We became a natural partnership. Reg had the greater domestic commitments and so Colin and myself often operated as two thirds of the triumvirate. We continued thus for a number of years with Peak District walks and climbing on Sundays together with mountaineering from T.Y.W. and the Patterdale Hut during annual meets there.

He was a reserved and un demonstrative man and very stoical regarding his own problems so I think many were slow to realise his gradually increasing difficulty in maintaining his former level of activity but I remember he, Reg and myself ascending Cnicht and moving over towards the old mine workings (the Moelwyns were I think one of his favourites) when it became clear that he was experiencing abnormal difficulties Sadly it was a long and gradual downhill progression from that point onwards, we were outdoor friends not in the habit of meeting at our homes and Margaret and I last met him walking in a field in mid Staffordshire. He wrote every Christmas as his illness progressed and he will be greatly missed.

Richard Linney writes:

Colin was such a lovely, quiet man. He was a big friend of my Mum and Dad (John and Margaret Linney) and a real inspiration for me in so many ways.

I remember lots of Oread meets with Dad and Colin when I was in my teens, particularly in the Lakes - Little Langdale and Patterdale. I've got so many fantastic memories of Colin.

**Crowdfunding campaign to support Jon Shields,
Team GB, compete in para-climbing:
a message from Paul Bingham**

For those who either don't know Jon or missed his December presentation to the Oread, what an inspirational man he is. A Scottish but Belper based climber who had the misfortune of two falls, the first not climbing related, caused, amongst other things, serious head injuries and his second fall on Curbar Edge in 2018 resulted in his left leg being amputated below the knee.

Prior to the accidents Jon was climbing regularly in the higher grades and

was determined to carry on after his accidents which he did, initially indoors, and latterly back on the rock. Over time he has developed modifications to the foot part of his prosthesis to cope with different surfaces and rock types. Notable ascents with his prosthesis include The Old Man of Hoy and the Yellow Edge on the Tre Cime di Lavaredo in the Dolomites.

His indoor climbing exploits got him noticed by GB Climbing and he soon became part of the paraclimbing team achieving a very respectable 17th in World Championship held in Innsbruck last August (at 57 he is more than twice as old as most competitors!). So far, all well and good but here's the big 'however' – whilst Team GB provide lots of support by way of coaching, unlike many of their foreign competitors, members of the GB paraclimbing team have to fund their own travel and accommodation expenses whilst representing their country!!!!

This location is approximately 16.2km west of the Robin Hood, this does not mean that there is no difference between the northings of those two locations.

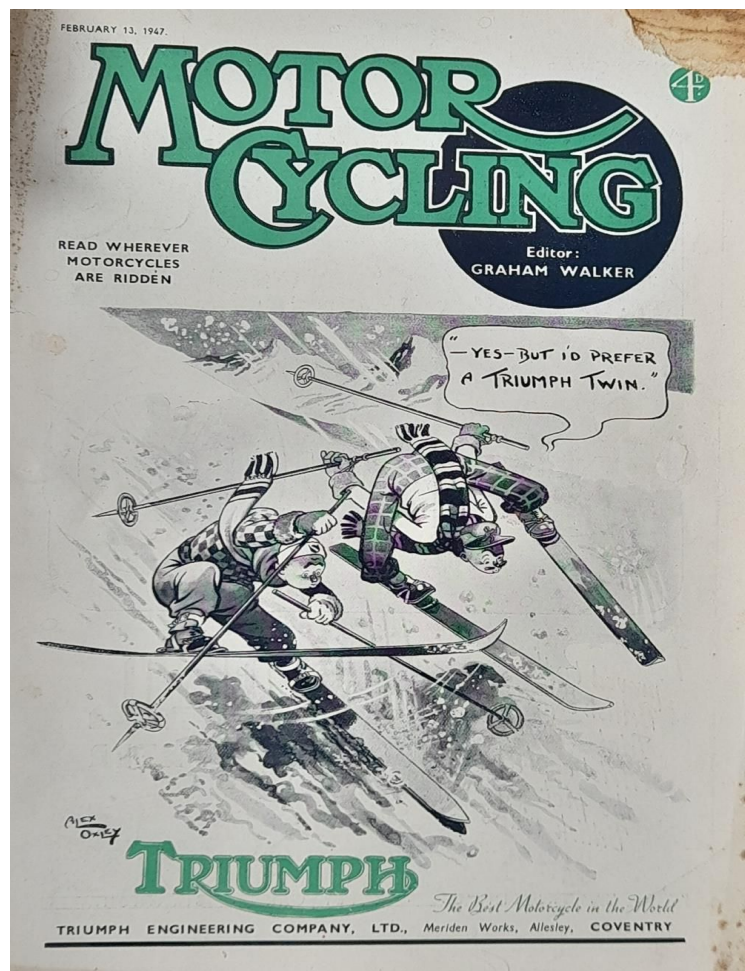
Last month's puzzle solution:
