Pennine Way Hike – August 2025 Nige Berry

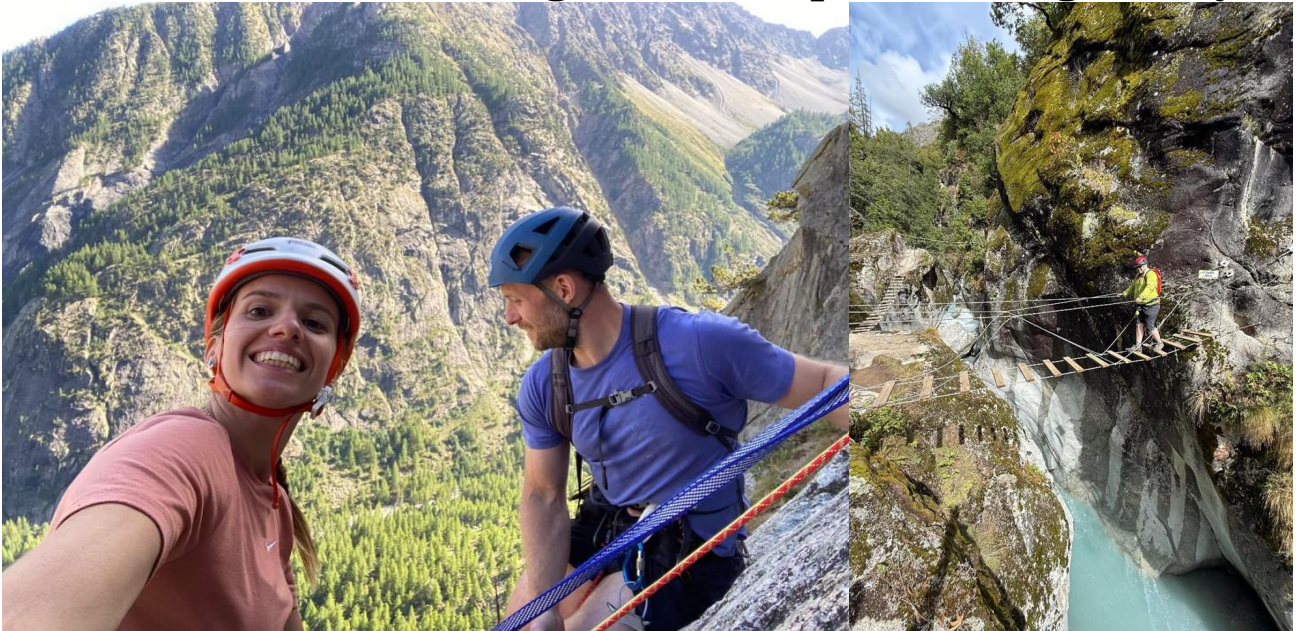


In support of those club members taking part in the section hike of the Pennine Way next year – Go For It!

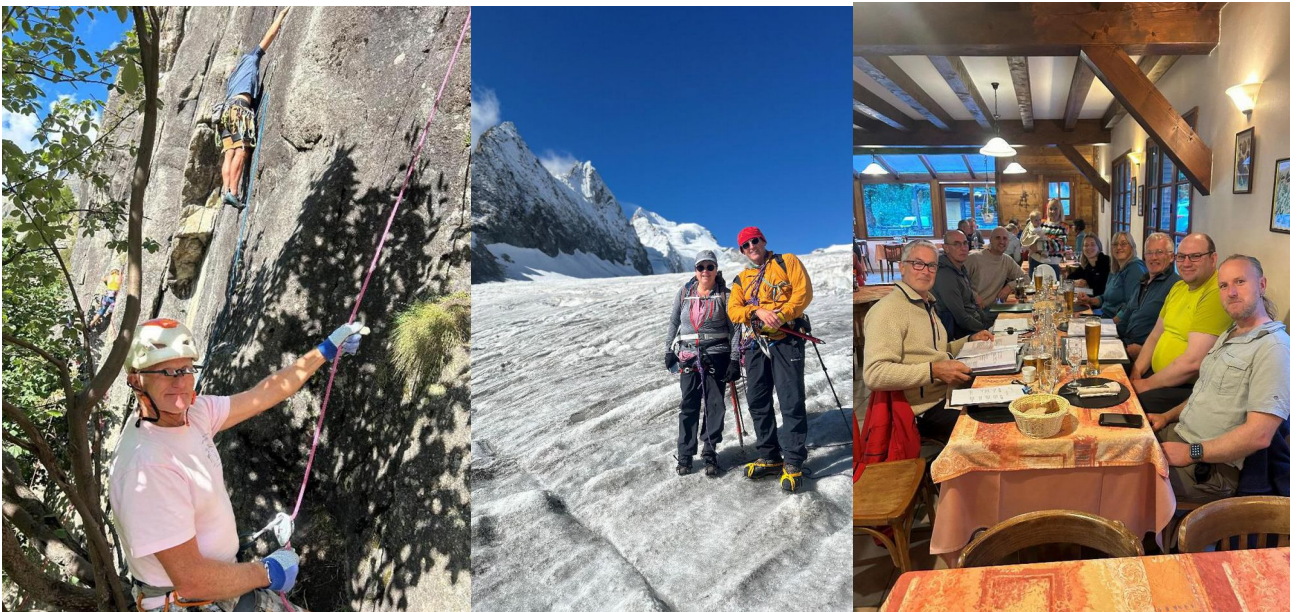
This August, after putting it off for far too long, I was lucky enough to through hike the 268 miles of the Pennine Way, over 17 days, half the time camping, half

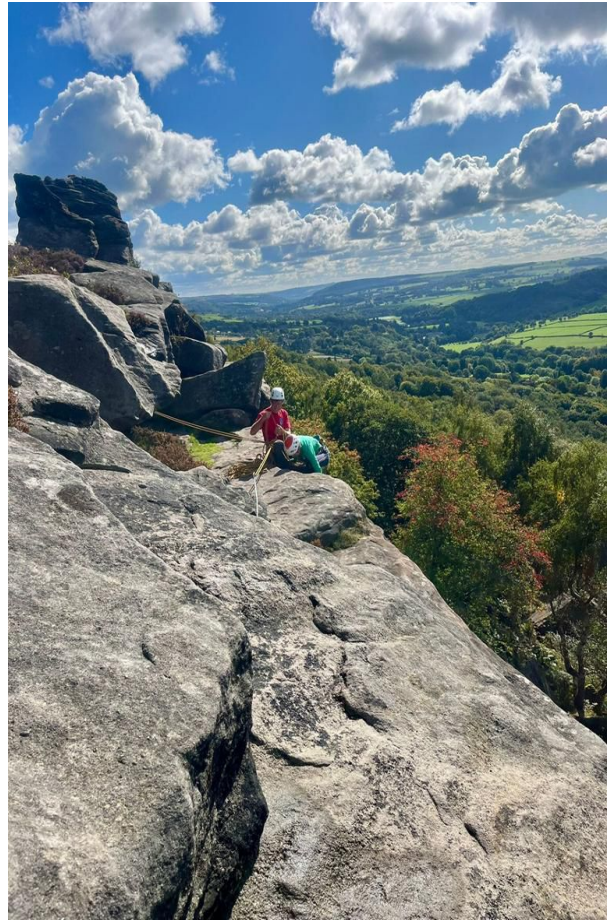
