Training opportunities

The club now has a budget to support members who wish to improve their climbing/mountaineering skills. (A recommendation of the Forward Thinking Group Report.) £500 has been set aside for the current year.

The money is available to:

- subsidise courses to improve members' personal skills eg belaying, trad climbing techniques, self rescue, navigation etc.

- support members who regularly climb with novices by bringing them up to date with current best practice.
- Set up instruction for groups of members wishing to learn a particular skill (anchor building, leading, safety and best practice etc). The club would engage a suitably qualified individual to provide instruction. This would be subsidised by the club, providing a lower cost to members than booking onto a course as individuals, but would not leave the instructor significantly out of pocket.

If you have identified a course you wish to attend as an individual please tell the Secretary, Simon, brief details for consideration by the committee.

10 – 21 October Kalymnos Michael Hayes

Kalymnos is a Greek Island situated close to the Turkish coast and is one of the most enjoyable sports climbing venues in the world. The climbing scene is perfect with over 60 crags and hundreds of routes at all grades. My 2016 guide has over 400 pages.

Most people get to the island via a flight to Kos with Jet 2 from East Mids / Birmingham or Manchester and then a boat to Kalymnos main harbour. Taxis, Bike and Car hire are plentiful, and most climbers stay around the town of

Masouri which has loads of low cost accommodation and excellent bars and restaurants.

The dates are flexible as many stay longer than one week but our plan is to fly out from Birmingham on the 10th October and book into a hotel at Mastichari on Kos as it arrives quite late. The following morning we will take the boat to Kalymnos, pick up a hire car and drive the short distance to Masouri where there is loads of accommodation if you book early!

We are booked into the Louis Apartment 6 with Airbnb from the 11th to the 21st. Come and join us for a fantastic holiday.

In order to reduce the amount of travel to the further reaches of the Peak District, it is proposed to cover two stages in one weekend in February and similarly in March. Accommodation will be arranged for the Saturday nights – and also on the Friday nights - should there be sufficient demand.

February Meet

For the meet in February, we will use a very nice bunkhouse in Greenfield (See www.boarshurstcentre.org.uk) that will cost about £20 per person per night - assuming we get twenty takers. The Club has paid a deposit and there is a minimum charge of £400 that we will need to recoup. It is proposed to have a communal meal on the Saturday evening – similar to the successful event we had on the joint PDBW / Bullstones last year.

The bunkhouse accommodates 32 so there should be plenty of room for those wishing to bring guests and / or prospective members.

In order to secure bed spaces and to reduce the risk to the Club's finances, participants are asked to let me have a deposit of £10 before the end of 2019. I would also appreciate an indication as to whether you would be interested in booking the Friday night as well.

Black Rocks Litter Pick.

Congratulations to the Derwent Mountaineering Club for organising a very worthwhile litter collecting day on Sunday 22 September. In spite of the wet weather 17 people turned out and scoured not only the paths and surrounding area but all the nooks and crannies in the gullies and chimneys. They collected nearly 30 bags of rubbish, mostly single use plastic bottles (fizzy drinks or water), followed by beer tins and bottles. Oddest finds were a very cute purplish teddy and a large plastic bottle of car wash (really?) oh and also an odd 14ft length of pipe.

Wednesday Walk 14 August – Idridgehay Stuart Firth

A select band of us – well two, actually – met at the Black Swan, Idridgehay in typical August holiday weather – cold and rainy. I had hoped that families might join us but clearly they were somewhat deterred by the conditions. Nonetheless, Peter Amour and I plucked up courage and had a coffee in the pub...

We then ventured on little used footpaths and were rewarded by the discovery of “The Mountain” – a 242m trig point at GR 267493 on OS Explorer 259 Derby. Neither Peter nor I had been aware that Derbyshire actually had a mountain and we were further intrigued by what we found. It is on what appears to be private land and has a very well constructed earth rampart and partial boundary wall. Our researches have cast no light on this piece of industrial (?) archeology so we would be delighted to hear if anyone is able to cast any light on the subject.

Having planted the flag, so to speak, we continued on our way and were soon rewarded with the discovery of “The Promised Land”. The sports team returned with tales of excellent shady routes and a great beach next to the crag. It certainly sounded tempting. The meet leader had organised things very well by handing over responsibility for a BBQ to Kasia, who having recently returned from Poland fed the campsite with Polish sausage. You probably haven't heard Kasia say how good it is.

Sunday morning felt even hotter so we all decided Winspit would be a good idea and the swim in the sea after the climbing was as good as Kasia said it would be. In the evening Jurek, Al and Gill went to Subluminal so Jurek could experience sea cliff climbing for the first time. Kasia and Lance went on a pub crawl and joined us at Subluminal, though Lance was a little mystified as to how Kasia managed to arrange a walk that missed out all the pubs.

Roger, Sharon and Ben arrived on Sunday evening via Twickenham and the beach. On Monday morning Roger was ready for some serious climbing action and luckily for the rest of us co-opted Simon for an ascent of 'Facedancin' (E3 6a) at Guillemot. Return to Torre Brunico Roger Gibbs

We'd moved on to a new, old campsite; one we'd previously visited in 2009 when Sharon was pregnant. The traditional mid-holiday rainy day had been dispatched in style with a slap up Sunday lunch and minds were moving on to further adventures. A thorough scouring of the guidebooks revealed some stonking looking lines. The walk in looked reasonable and it was only a short bike ride from the campsite. I was getting an urge as Mr Fowler would say. "Have you seen this?" I asked. "One of the classic multipitch sport routes in the Dolomites (which means in the world)." Dave had. Then he reminded me that we'd done the left hand line (Oltre la porta, beyond the door) back in 2009. I looked blank, really? I checked another guidebook and there it was. "Pretty nails and bold high up" said my notes from a decade ago. Chris chipped in:

“Well, we were never going to go for that one anyway it’s only 6c+.” Right. Ottovolante (roller coaster) it is then. How hard can F7a+ and 11 pitches be anyway? Then I inexplicably volunteered to lead the crux. Good to be committed, right?

The night before was the usual routine of checking my watch every hour, feeling wide awake, only to have to drag myself out of bed feeling like I could sleep like a teenager. I crept out of the van, hastily turning off the alarm before it can wake anyone else. I’m ready a little ahead of the others and the slowest, so I mount up. I set off pedalling uphill as golden light floods down from the cliff tops and across the valley. A mouse runs across the road looking for his breakfast or perhaps his bed. I’m really enjoying myself as I take it easy up towards the pass. I can almost see why those road cyclists get up so early. A couple of vans rush past me and I smile at the thought of cadging a lift. Then I’m struck with a worrying thought: what if the lads have scored a ride? Fortunately, both vans turn off into an hotel well short of our destination. Another road bike hoves into view but he’s several hairpins below me and I’m relieved to realise I’m not going to have to race him. A little further down I can see Chris and Dave chatting as they work their way up towards me. By the time I’ve found somewhere to stash the bikes they’ve arrived and we set off on foot.

Another very civilised walk in ensues. This had better not carry on or the Dolomites will get a reputation. I’ve got pitch one (so that I get pitch 7, the crux) and we spend a little time casting about for the exact start. The guide mentions a hard to spot first bolt at 10m and a cairn. For some reason I convince myself that the obvious cairn is the start of the left hand line. Then eagle eye Dave spots the elusive first bolt...directly above the cairn. I set off. Last night’s gear debate had concluded with a very light rack indeed. A few moves got me to a good crack and a sound wire. Just I was about to clip in, I changed my mind and clipped the gleaming bolt six inches to the left instead. Not a high first bolt then. The climbing was superb, steep and positive on perfect rock with excellent protection. I pulled onto the belay with some steep and not entirely obvious moves. I recalled having read somewhere that the route was full of juggy surprises – that was spot on. Every move required a little faith in what was above. A classic pitch, but stout for 6a. This seems to be going rather well.

As I brought the lads up, we could hear noises below and off to one side. A little later a super relaxed Euro team appeared. Oh no, did they know a cunning diversion in order to nip in front of us? It turned out they were on a different, easier line but with very little fixed gear. Their route crossed ours a few times and we raised an eyebrow at massive runs outs, belaying holding only the rope on the climber’s side of the belay device while checking mobile phones. They seemed to be enjoying themselves though.

Our route continued very directly onto more steep ground. At one stance, we worked out which pitches each of us was going to end up with.

“Still on for the crux?” asked Chris solicitously. This was my out.

“Yes,” I heard myself say. Now why had I said that? Oh well, it’s ages away yet, plenty can happen before then. Chris jumped in and led pitch 4, which scooted left and took an overhanging groove. It looked nails. It was dispatched with the usual aplomb, but there were a few shapes being thrown up there. Some puffing ensued when the seconds followed the pitch. That brought us to a semi hanging belay below a long, left leading furrow linking the two halves of the route. The

roof and headwall of the crux pitch loomed above. Dave shot off up the groove. It was easy going and our relaxed Euro friends joined us on the belay as he climbed. They looked reluctant to use the fixed gear of our stance and sketched around looking for ethical, organic belays.

Another superb, steep pitch (Chris) brought us to the terrace under the crux. Blimey it looked blank. I looked again and holds appeared. The start was guarded by a little run out section. I set off, pulling much too hard until the first bolt was clipped. Long moves between good holds and lots of fixed gear. I'm enjoying myself. Above the roof leers down. I tuck in under it, lean out and clip above then scuttle back down for a rest. It's pretty obvious what's required: undercut to reach over for a sloping gaston for the left, a poor crimp for the right, feet high and lunge for what I very much hope will be a jug. When the time comes to lunge, there's not very much lunging going on and I sag into the bolt.

Next go, the jug is as advertised, a struggle and I'm up. The pitch isn't over, with lots more pumpy climbing to come. I strap in and watch the seconds struggle up with the sacs. Chris giggles as his feet pop off, but it doesn't seem to trouble him much. (Dave actually fell off seconding, so it wasn't trivial...and I took a second rest feeling a little fried). I'm disappointed to have rested, but pleased I had tried. On we go, pitch after pitch of the highest quality. I got pitch 9, up a soaring arête, that would have been a three star route anywhere in its own right. My arms were fading now and the "one move wonder" crux move on the last pitch but one needed a bit of cunning.

Suddenly we're at the top, with only a crumbling ridge to get us back to the plateau. We elect to move together but it's easy going. We sort gear, grab some food and trudge off across the barren flatness towards the hut. Dave has had a message that the family have just left the hut and the boys set off in hot pursuit. I take a more leisurely pace, weaving in and out of the walkers and via ferrata crews. My timing is perfect as a mug of tea appears from the van just as I get down. All that's left of the day is to race the van down the hill on the bikes (cyclists 3, van 0), grab a shower and make up some war stories.
