30 November Peak District Boundary Walk Peak Forest – Hayfield Dave “Snod” Helliwell

This section of the walk starts at Peak Forest. Turn right at the traffic lights on the A623, (travelling north) and park on the roadside near the old chapel - grid reference SK115 796. Daylight will be in short supply at this time of year so I

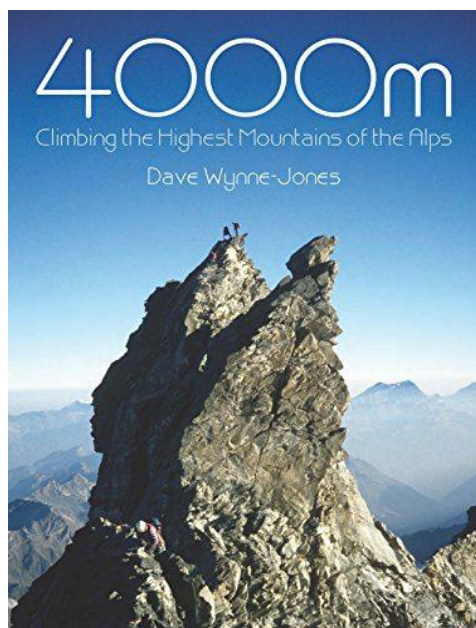
propose to set off at 10.15 am. The distance is just under 10 miles but there's quite a lot of up and down – 1326 feet of ascent, some of it very steep! It is a walk of contrasts – the first half – to Chapel en le Frith - is mainly on limestone farmland and is not well walked. When we approach Chapel I propose a slight deviation from the route as printed because there is an extremely boggy and unpleasant section to reach the A625. Instead I intend to divert into Chapel where we can buy hot bacon/sausage cobs and the like from our local grocer and have a brief pub stop. I shall be taking orders for cobs at the start and phoning the shop so they will be prepared for us. A short walk back to the A 625 will put us back on track for the second, contrasting half of the walk on the gritstone through fields and lanes to join the Pennine Bridleway, up over the moors via South Head and down into Hayfield.

We will have pre-placed cars in Hayfield to ferry drivers back, but there's plenty of pubs in Hayfield if people have to wait to be collected!

13-15 December Bullstones Snod Helliwell

This year's Bullstones is close to home and will take advantage of the newly refurbished Heathy Lea.

We will be meeting and eating in the Devonshire Arms at Peak Forest. Cars can be left on the lane to the right at the traffic lights on the A623, (travelling north) and near the old chapel - grid reference SK115 796. Last food at 21:00 hrs.

Closes at 23.00.

We will then set off up Perry Dale to bivvy in Eldon Hill Quarry with the farmer's permission. **Two important points:**

there is no water supply. Bring your own for a morning brew.

it is a quarry and there are steep drops. Plenty of flat camping space but don't step off into oblivion when you go out for a nocturnal pee!

Next morning Ruth's car will be available for dumping Bivvy gear and the route I have in mind is through Little Hucklow, Great Hucklow, Foolow to Eyam where lunch can be taken. From there round the back of Stoney to Calver and then along the river path to Baslow and Heathy Lea. Of course serious Bullstoners may think this a little tame and may want to go over Abney, down into Grindleford and along the river from there. If that's too easy up to Froggatt edge and along the edges back to Heathy Lea. Or go for it – over Mam Tor, follow the ridge to Ladybower and down all the edges! Sadly Ruth and I will not be able to join you as we need to light the fire at Heathy Lea and take cars to return the lame and infirm on Sunday!

Saturday night we will eat in the Robin Hood. I have 19 people booked. If you aren't among them you will have to try to book yourself in later or cook at the hut.

Sunday's return can be eased by a Hulleys bus from Baslow to Bakewell and, for those fit enough, along the Monsal trail. A nice return would be to get the Transpeak from Bakewell to The Waterloo at Taddington, down into Millers Dale then up Monks Dale, Peter Dale, Hay Dale and Dam Dale back to Peak Forest. 10 -12 January Waters Cottage Kinlochleven Nigel Briggs

This is the first Scottish Winter meet of the year, based at Waters Cottage, Kinlochleven. The hut is ideally situated to allow access to the hills around Glencoe, the Ben or Aonach Mor as conditions allow. If all else fails the Ice Factor is close by, so something can be done whatever the conditions!

We have 8 beds booked at a cost of £12 per night (we may be able to secure more if these fill up). To guarantee your place prepayment of the hut fee is required (£24 pp for the weekend). Currently 6 beds have been taken, however we may be able to book more, so book your place quickly.

Saturday 18 January PDBW - Hayfield to Old Glossop Sue Todd

The walk starts at Hayfield bus station, Chapel Road, A624, (GR SK 036869) and finishes in Old Glossop at the Wheatsheaf Pub on Well Gate (GR SK 041948)

Distance - 9miles (14.5K) Ascent - 1,432' / 436m

We are now in the Dark Peak area and it is a hilly stage with some sharp slopes and long pulls, but, weather permitting, the effort will be rewarded with some stunning views from Lantern Pike, Cown Edge and Whiteley Nab. The end of the stage finds us walking through Manor Park into historic Old Glossop, with its lovely Parish church, quaint houses and three pubs!

The walk will start at 10.30 at Hayfield bus station where all-day parking costs £4.80. (Toilets available). Free roadside parking may be found in Hayfield Village on Market Street or on Church Street past the Packhorse Inn. Millie's Tea Room will be open before the start for a quick cuppa and cake. Open 9:00 -4.30. Alternatively, one can park at the end of the walk in Glossop and catch the 10:00 No 61 bus from Henry Street to Hayfield arriving 10:14 - at the start point of the walk. Convenient free parking is available at Corn Mill in Manor Park at the end of the stage – 10 minutes walk into Glossop. Access by leaving Glossop on the A57 along High Street East. Take the second exit at the five-way roundabout - along Corn Street.

Or free unrestricted street parking is available on the **west-bound** part of High Street West opposite Argos – 5 minute walk to the bus stop. (Be careful to park on the correct side of this busy road.)

For the return to Hayfield at the end of the day, at least one car will be available to ferry drivers. Alternatively, there is a No 61 bus at 17:00.

There is just one pub en route - The Little Mill Inn in Rowarth - a third of the way along. Soup and bread £4.95, posh bacon butty £8.95. Sheltered outdoor seating if you buy a drink... Could be a useful stop if the weather is inclement but a packed lunch is suggested.

The walk will take place in January and is mainly on exposed hills, so warm clothing, full waterproofs and stout footwear is essential. Remember bus passes. Hope to see you all on my inaugural meet!

14 -16 February Peak District Boundary Walk Stuart Firth

Saturday – Old Glossop to Greenfield: Distance 10 miles (16k); Ascent 1576ft (480m)

Sunday – Greenfield to Marsden: Distance 10.6 miles (17k); Ascent 1959 ft (597m)

Overnight Bunkhouse Accommodation available Friday and Saturday nights.

We are now over halfway through the Peak District Boundary Walk but it is certainly not “downhill all the way to the finish”. Being in the Dark Peak and further away from home, this double section passes through some spectacular high moorland scenery and includes sections of the Pennine Bridleway and the Pennine Way.

To reduce travel time from home base, convenient overnight bunkhouse accommodation has been booked at the Boarshurst Centre, Boarshurst Lane, Greenfield, Oldham OL3 7EA. (www.boarshurstcentre.org) There are options to stay Friday night, Saturday night, both or neither. Those wishing to do only one stage are welcome and a DIY communal meal will be organised for Saturday night. Other meals – bring your own or there are local pubs that do evening meals.

The start of Saturday’s stage will be at 10:30 am from the free car park at Corn Mill in Manor Park, Glossop SK13 7SH. Access by leaving Glossop on the A57 along High Street East. Take the second exit at the five-way roundabout - along Corn Street.

The end of Saturday’s stage and the start of Sunday’s (10:00am) will be at the Boarshurst Centre.

The end of Sunday’s stage will be near the Riverhead Brewery Tap in Marsden. Good café and ice cream parlour nearby. The hourly Transpennine Express train service will return us to Greenfield in 7 minutes! (16:39 or 17:39) Or No 84 bus at 15:06 taking 27 minutes.

Facilities at the Centre are excellent. Pillows and pillow cases are provided; bring your own bedding and a mattress cover – sheet or blanket.

I need to confirm numbers to the Boarshurst Centre so please let me (or Janet Briggs) have a £10 deposit by the end of January. There are 32 bed-spaces available so this is a great opportunity to introduce friends to the joys of the Oread. I also need to organise the communal meal so please let me know if you would like to contribute some culinary expertise and any dietary requirements. Bring your own booze and packed lunches.

The walks are on exposed hills so warm clothing, full waterproofs and stout footwear are essential. Maps OL1 Dark Peak and OL21 South Pennines; Peak District Boundary Walk publisher Friends of the Peak District.

A Midweek Monsal Dale Meander 23rd October Peter Amour

In misty conditions the Wednesday Wander saw Stuart Firth, John Gwyther, John Green and myself assemble at Monsal Head. Booted and 'sacked we dropped down to the footbridge in the dale below and followed the brisk flow of the Wye's waters. As the sound of the A6 became audible the course turned sharp right to climb through coppiced woodland towards Brushfield using a combination of bridle and footpaths. A coffee stop was demanded at the pocketed old mine workings of High Field before making for lower terrain, and the historic, disreputable Litton Mill, now converted to apartments. With the Wye's swollen waters swirling by we made our way though Water Cum Jolly Dale and took refreshments by Cressbrook Mill in bright conditions. A northerly course then took to tarmac before branching off to enter the wooded southern section of Cressbrook Dale which was showing it's autumn tones.

Climbing out the dale heading for Wardlow, Stuart called a meeting of the assembled to consider possibilities and options for future Wednesday meets - should the bi monthly programme continue or be a single monthly occurrence? Should the afternoon/evening trek idea be abandoned as the aim of meeting with the club's climbers post activity had for various factors had been difficult to achieve? Views were given that split the group on the frequency question by 50/50, and that the afternoon/evening walk/pub meet up had been rather unsuccessful and may be discontinued. It was agreed that further consideration be given to the subject.

On resuming mobility we passed through Wardlow and crossed its main road to take to the zig-zagging tracks over Longstone Moor, and finally onto pasture to Little Longstone and Monsal Head.

Rusty's Puzzle Corner

Last month's puzzle solution:

Last month's puzzle with a lesser element of dogmatic right and wrong succeeded, as I had hoped, in eliciting the comments of a fellow mountain wanderer, and I felt that Roger's response merits publication as an answer.

Roger Chapman writes:

"Rusty's puzzle this month had me wallowing in nostalgia about all those half-forgotten walks back in the mists of time when I could still manage some of the harder classic walks such as the Welsh 3000s. But ranking walks against one another is a very personal thing and one that might be coloured by the extremes of weather as much as anything else. One of the most perfect solo days out I ever had was a relatively mundane Scottish ridge south of the A86 (the Geal-Charn ridge) in February 1980. A long walk-in and out more than compensated for by a blue sky, no wind and snow so crisp it squeaked and the hills to myself all day apart from a solitary 4 x 4 on a track to the east.

Anyway back to Rusty's puzzle. There must be a considerable number of ridges in England and Wales that are at least as hard as Striding Edge some of which I have not done. For a personal favourite I am torn between Crib Goch (which I once incautiously said could be done hands in pockets for most of its length) and the central rib (Hall's Fell) on Blencathra which brings you out right on one of the summits. I rather think Rusty's choice would be Crib Goch.

In terms of difficulty the Main Ridge is in a different league to all the others as it is in terms of quality. Striding Edge is clearly the easiest followed by Crib Goch, the North Ridge of Tryfan with Aonach Eagach second only to the Cuillin.

In terms of quality I would place the North Ridge of Tryfan above Aonach Eagach with the rest of the order the same."

I find myself in broad agreement, rating the Cuillin Ridge as in a class of its own, Striding Edge scenic but easiest and Tryfan and Crib Goch roughly on a par. Aonach Eagach is in my view a tough proposition in other than summer conditions, and the one I did not name, which I consider to be worthy of inclusion is Sharp Edge above Scales tarn.

This month's puzzle.

Some insulating boards had been delivered to Heathy Lea, but the delivery driver was not prepared to turn into the difficult entrance and dropped them on the other side of the road, and went on his way. Mike H. a good man as always, went to pick them up and carry them into the driveway and after a quick glance, was about to step off the kerb when he spotted one of the first electric trucks approaching, being of course silent and giving no audible indication of its presence. He dropped the board and ran like crazy, reaching the white line 10ft. out from the kerb in the nick of time. Mike averaged 10 mph (not bad for a middle aged walker from a standing start). The truck, unknown to him, was doing 45 mph. How far away was it at the instant he crossed the kerb?
