Oread Summer Alpine Trip 2022 Gill Radcliffe

Change of date.

I had originally planned to run this meet earlier in July but due to the unavailability of some club members I now intend to run the meet from the 23rd July to 7th August.

It's likely that Chris and I will be in the area for longer so any member is welcome to join us before or after these dates.

The plan is to return to Camping Du Glacier D'Argentiere camp site near Chamonix. The club went there in 2016 but I didn't get to go so I'm putting it forward as the summer Alpine meet for 2022. I've been reliably informed that it's an excellent camp site and I'm aiming to reserve a spot for Oreads.

The Chamonix mountains are the premier alpine climbing area in Europe and there's a lifetime of adventures waiting for everyone. Whether you want to focus on multi-pitch rock routes in an alpine setting or opt for classic snow and mixed routes there is plenty to do. There are excellent walks in and around the Chamonix valley, including the Tour du Mont Blanc. I walked this excellent route in 1986 and it took me seven days, now it's run in 20 hours by elite athletes.

There are plenty of guide books out there but I would recommend the following two books by Jean-Louis Laroche & Florence Lelong for starters:
Mont Blanc and the Aiguilles Rouges / Mountaineering in the Mont Blanc Range

If you're intending to come (Covid restrictions permitting) then I would appreciate a response as I will get in touch with the campsite to see if we can camp near one another. On-line booking is now available so that will make life a lot easier for the meet leader!

Thursday 24 March 8.00 pm Annual General Meeting

The Annual General Meeting of the Club will take place at 8 pm on Thursday 24th March 2022. We will be holding the meeting virtually on Zoom.

In the meeting we will approve the minutes of the 2021 AGM, consider the accounts and officers' reports for 2021, elect a new committee, consider amendments to the constitution and consider any other proposed motions.

The officers' reports and the accounts will be circulated prior to the AGM, hopefully in the March Newsletter. Questions are requested to be submitted in advance of the AGM and the responses will be provided at the AGM. Questions asked during the meeting will also be answered.

Nominations for Officers of the club and members of the committee are welcome and must be submitted by the 3rd March to the Secretary. Each nomination must be in writing and supported by two full members of the club along with the consent of the nominee. Nominations can be made for any position. However, there are vacant positions for Vice President, Secretary and Ordinary Committee Member. In the event of multiple nominations for the same position a vote will be held.

Any motions for consideration need to be sent to the Secretary, Simon Pape, by the 3rd March 2021 and be supported by two full members of the club.

Proposed amendments to the Constitution

The AGM in March 2019 adopted a new constitution. A few improvements were subsequently suggested, these were on the agenda of the 2020 AGM, which never took place due to the first Covid lockdown. The committee would like to propose these alterations at this year's AGM.

In the amendments, below, text to be removed is struck out and the text to be inserted is in **bold**. The change to 7.6 is to formalise the good practice we operate in not allowing two, or more, people who are signatories of the Club's accounts to be related.

The change to 11.1 needs a little more explanation. In 2019 when the new constitution was written we followed the recommendation of the BMC to say that if the club were dissolved any remaining assets would be donated to Charity or an organisation with similar aims and objectives. We have since learnt, from our Inspector of Accounts, that this statement precludes us from being considered a mutual organisation. It is to our advantage to be a mutual organisation as this has implications for corporation tax liability. If we are a mutual organisation only income from non members is considered as income. If we are not a mutual organisation all income, including membership fees and hut fees from members are considered as income. We would like to be a mutual organisation, so we propose to revert to any remaining assets on dissolution be distributed to the remaining Full Members. This change should not alter the club's legal status as

an unincorporated association.

Amendments:

7.6 The Treasurer shall be a signatory of the account(s). Additionally the Committee will nominate a minimum of three elected ~~Club~~ **committee** members, **who are not related to each other or to the Treasurer**, as signatories for the club account(s) of whom at least two shall have access to see all transactions in the Club's bank account(s).

11.1 The Club can only be dissolved by a two-thirds majority vote at a General Meeting. Any liabilities at the time of dissolution, if the assets of the Club are not sufficient, shall be the joint responsibility of all Full Members. ~~The Committee will arrange to discharge any remaining assets by donating to Charity or to organisations with similar aims and objectives to the Oread.~~ **Any remaining assets will be distributed between the remaining Full Members of the club in a manner determined by the Committee and agreed by a majority vote at a General Meeting.**

Oread 75th Anniversary Nigel Briggs

The 20th March 2024 marks the 75th Anniversary of the inaugural Oread Meet. During 2024 the committee thinks it would be appropriate to run a number of events to celebrate our club and the 75th Anniversary. We are very much at the early stages of planning, if you have any ideas of events that could take place, or if you would like to be involved in any of the projects in any way please get in touch with me. The success of any of the celebrations depends on people willing to organise and help run them!

There are a number of projects we would like to see.

- An almanac type publication

I would like to follow the 25th and 50th Anniversary tradition with some sort of publication. I do not envisage producing and publishing a book. It would concentrate on recording the main events of the last 25 years (suggestions about what are the main events are welcome) and venues and highlights from 'annual events' such as the Bullstones Meet, the Alpine Meet and the Dinner etc. I also envisage contributions on members' own thoughts and reflections from the first 75 years of the club. This could be distributed as a pdf file, or printed out to order.

- Putting a photographic history together

We would like to collect 'interesting' photographs of club members and activities together on the website. Each photograph would be accompanied by a short description of the 'backstory' of the photograph, who is on it and where etc. Start to look through your photograph collections!

- **Publishing one article per year from the Newsletter from the years 2000 – 2024**

One article selected from the Newsletter for each year from 2000 – 2024 and put on the website.

- **Run a Summer Weekend Camping Meet**

The idea here is to hold a celebratory meet where members, friends and kindred clubs can come together for a weekend and celebrate the Anniversary. As the numbers could be large camping may be easier to organise than a hut based meet. There is no venue yet but the Peak District, as our 'homeland' seems an appropriate area to hold the meet.

- **75th Annual Dinner**

12 – 14 November Cwm Eigiau Cottage Janet Briggs

A fairly select group comprising of Janet and Nigel Briggs, Pippa Leach and her niece Claire, Rachel Walker and Michael Moss headed for the Conwy Valley during the daylight hours of Friday. Pippa and Rachel met up with Claire at Bodnant. Claire was somewhat delayed by a nasty accident which happened just in front of her en route, fortunately those involved emerged unhurt from the cars. At this stage Pip discovered the first faux pas of the weekend, she was in Bodnant but her lunch and flask of coffee were still in her car outside Rachel's house.

Meanwhile the meet leader and her driver, holders of the hut key, were planning to arrive in daylight and before the others. As members of the host club, the Rugby Mountaineering Club, we have been to Cwm Eigiau quite a few times before, but nearly always arriving in the dark. It is about a 40 minutes walk from the car park to the cottage and we decided it would be great to do it in daylight for once. I found the car park on OS maps on my phone, instructed Nigel to turn right at Tal y Bont and we headed up the hill. It didn't look entirely familiar, but it was daylight. We reached the car park, strange, we both thought the parking was on the right of the road, not the left. Anyway we loaded up front and back rucksacks and headed off towards the dam. Nigel remarked that he didn't remember pylons in this bit of the valley. I dismissed this since we usually walked up in the dark. 20 minutes later and having still not reached the familiar dam wall Nigel insisted we looked at the map... faux pas number two, we had set off from the wrong car park in the wrong valley, having taken the wrong road

out of Tal y Bont. Whoops! First rule of navigation: if it doesn't look right it probably isn't. Second rule for Nigel...don't trust your wife.

So after a 20 minute drive back down to the valley and back up the correct road, we found the correct car park, from which we could see the dam and no pylons. We recognised cars in the car park so knew we were no longer going to arrive first. By this time it was raining and getting dark. Nigel seemed to manage to let me set off first, maybe so that I would get the flack for being late. I hurried along as fast as I could with two rucksacks, in the dark, over rough tracks and through mud, imagining the others huddling together in the rain wondering where we were. As I sighted the cottage there were lights outside, then welcoming shouts, and it soon emerged that they had only been there about five minutes and had seen our lights coming, so they were not too cold and wet and fed up, phew!

Once inside, we found the switch for the solar powered lights, managed to unjam the door to the outhouse with the toilet in, turned on the gas and water and got a kettle on. Before long the stove was lit, food was on the go and all was forgotten and forgiven (I hope). For those who have not been, Cwm Eigiau is pretty basic with no electricity, a chemical toilet and one main room with a small bedroom below and sleeping platform above, off it. It has character!



Saturday morning dawned dry, but mainly cloudy, with some cloud around summits and quite windy. We decided on a ridge walk and got our stuff together. At this stage faux pas number three became apparent, Mike had walked up in shoes, and his boots were still in his car boot. He wasn't going back for them and his shoes were pretty wet and muddy anyway!

We went downstream to the bridge first then up a path to the old mine workings. From there it was a thrash up the hillside to the first summit of the day, Pen Llithrig y Wrach (as we later learned the hill of the slippery witch). By now the clouds were breaking and we were getting views of the way onwards. Next summit was Pen yr Helgi Du, from here we could see along the arete towards Carnedd Llewellyn, and spot routes such as Ampitheatre Buttress on Craig yr Ysfa. In the other direction we could see down into the Ogwen Valley. By now the weather was a mixture of watery sun, mist, cloud and winds, mostly all at once and quite atmospheric. Someone remarked it was a day for Brocken Spectres.



The next part involved a narrow ridge and some quite scrambly bits, possibly somewhat out of Claire's comfort zone, but aided by 'Aunty Phil' she coped admirably. We stopped for lunch above the top of Craig yr Ysfa. From there climbing up to the summit of Carnedd Llewellyn we were rewarded by several fleeting Brocken Spectres. Soon afterwards we lost the views as the clag came down. Our final summit was Foel Grach with its substantial but not very inviting shelter. The OS map showed a good path back to the valley from here. We tried

to find it, with some compass work and quite a lot of grovelling around in boggy conditions. Eventually we decided that if we headed down we were going to hit the right valley. Consulting the Harvey's map later shows the path as a 'public footpath without path on the ground'. As we emerged out of the mist we were able to head fairly directly for the hut.

After a good day on the hill we enjoyed a communal meal of pasta with chicken and mushrooms, and lots of cake and custard. Cooking was interrupted by a persistent carbon monoxide alarm which didn't seem to like the fact that the stove chimney was not drawing well until it got hot enough. Once it did really get going the hut was very warm and cosy.

Sunday morning was dry but cloudy. Claire elected to wander up the valley with her camera for a spot of photography. Pip, Rachel, Nigel and I decided to complete the circuit of the valley by heading downstream at valley level on the south side. We headed across to near the car park and then along the ridge behind the hut. Mike came with us as far as the car park, then went back to the hut to pack the rest of his stuff and head home. We had a much less dramatic walk weather wise, but very pleasant. The main difficulties were in the valley, with more non-existent paths, including one crossing the river, and another which was meant to cut a corner across a field of tussocky grass and heather. The short cut certainly didn't save us time. Back on the ridge we had good views of the lakes Dulyn and Melynlyn (on a warmer day with more time I might be tempted to investigate closer for a swim). We also encountered a friendly group of semi wild horses. The walk out was pleasantly uneventful, as was the drive down the correct road to the correct valley. The remaining five of us extended the weekend with a night (or more in our case) at Tan yr Wyddfa.

One ascent which has always caught my eye in the archives however is that of Spectre on the Grochan during which Ernie Phillips seconded Peter Harding, I am not sure whether Peter became a member but he was in circulation with Oread members at the time.

Snod writes:

Of course two great pre-war climbs were done in Wales by Jack Longland - Longlands on Cloggy and the amazing Javelin Blade on Hollytree wall but the rest of the party were not, so far as I can research, Oreads.

The most rewarding area of research was North Pembroke and there are many: The Lizard, 345 feet HVS. D. Burgess and T. Green. Libra 140 feet S. K. Hodge and D. Gadsby.

The Caterpillar 300 feet VS. Nat Allen and D. Carnell.
Great Slab 180 feet VS. same party.
Crescent Slab 150 feet VD. G. Gadsby and M. Hodge.
Ochre Slab 100 feet S. Nat Allen, D. Carnell, L. Peel.

But I think the route Rusty has in mind is Masquerade on Marsco Buttress, in the Red Cuillin, Skye. 200 feet Severe, by Geoff Hayes and Brian Cooke - because Rusty was there! The story is told in "Climb if you will" but the route is not in the guidebook because Brian never got round to reporting it.

All these routes are over 50 years old.
