Oread Subscription Renewal 2024

Although BMC subscriptions are increasing to £23.90 the club will cover this increase so subscriptions will remain at £45 for ordinary membership, £35 for senior members (those in receipt of state pension) and £35 for provisional members. Honorary members, of course, pay no subscription.

In 2022 we started to collect our subscriptions in a different way, by direct debit. **If you signed up last year you will not need to do anything**, we will automatically collect them in late January. However you will always get notification in advance of collection so you, or we, can cancel the direct

debit if you no longer wish to continue your membership.

If you have not yet signed up but would like to do so this is what you need to do. Please sign up if you can because it saves a lot of work for both Treasurer and Membership Secretary.

Log into the member's area of the website, click on MY PROFILE, and check

- that the information we hold about you is correct and up to date, and that you still agree to the consent options and statements. **See the reminder below.**
- If you are having difficulty logging into the members area, but know your username there is a password reset option.
- Your username is your initial and surname, all lower case and no spaces.

You will then be asked to enter some personal details and your bank account number and sort code. The appropriate subscription will be deducted from your bank account in late January 2023. It will appear on your bank statement as GoCardless, and a reference which will in many cases refer to Oread, but this seems to vary from bank to bank. You will be notified before the payment is taken and your payments are protected, so you are guaranteed a refund if a payment was ever taken in error.

GoCardless is the UK's leading Direct Debit provider, processing over £5 billion in payments annually for more than 30,000 organisations, and your payments are covered by the direct debit guarantee:

'Membership of the Oread Mountaineering Club is only open to adults, i.e. those aged 18 or over.

Members must acknowledge the British Mountaineering Council Statement of Participation: 'The BMC recognises that climbing and mountaineering are activities with a danger of personal injury or death. Participants in these activities should be aware of and accept these risks and be responsible for their own actions.'

Members must have an awareness of their own capabilities and limitations, and as a result always take part in activities in a way which does not endanger themselves or others.'

I would also like to remind you that our health is can change and we should keep this in mind when we assess our participation in our chosen activities.

Keep yourself and those around you safe and have a great time. I look forward to seeing you out in the hills in the near future.

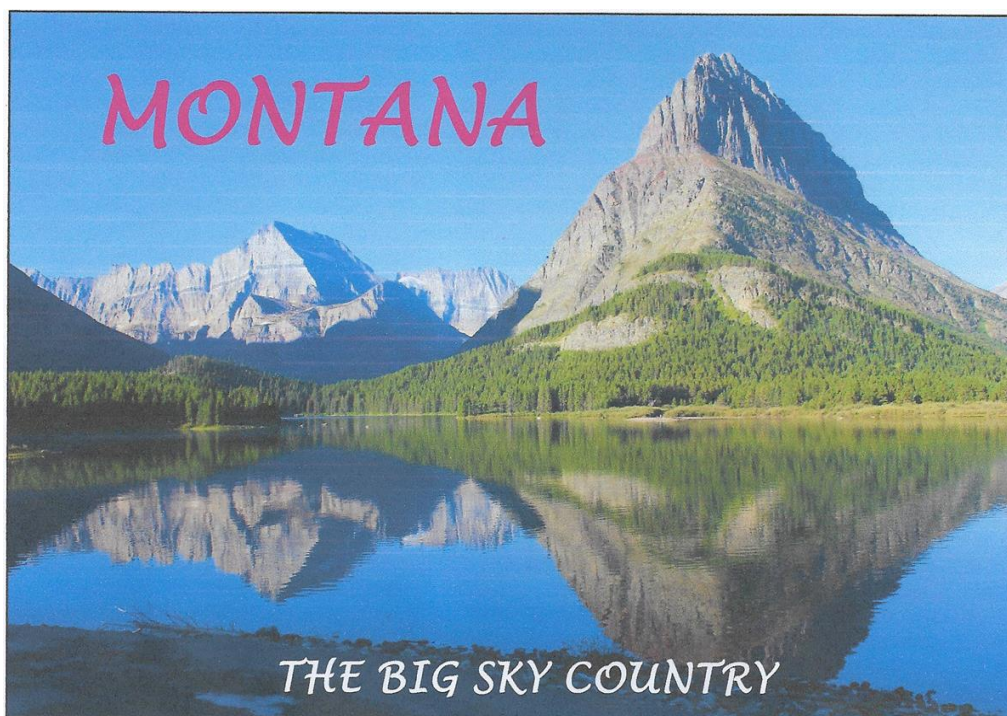
26 December Boxing Day Walk

18 January Short walk Codnor Park Chris Paice

Codnor Park Reservoir will be our meeting point for this walk. It is on the Coach Road - NG16 5PX is the post code, O.S. Explorer 269, 513 435 map reference. Leaving from here at 11.00am we have a short road walk, uphill, on Monument lane. From a distance you can see the Jessop monument but when walking you can't! The road turns into a track eventually passing Codnor Castle. Continuing on the track (technically Castle Lane) we pass the golf course and we are now on Aldercar Lane. On to Maggie's Den. This is primarily a café for Aldercar Fisheries but will provide a tea/coffee stop. It's seems fisherman don't have cake (there is flapjack) as there is none!! Hot food is available until 1.30 and I'm sure they are used to people eating their own food outside.

Moving through the fisheries, under the railway line, we begin our journey back. This includes the River Erewash, Erewash Meadows, lots of birds to spot, maybe! This has the potential to be quite boggy (in October the Erewash flooded around this area). Ultimately, we walk along the Cromford canal back to the cars. Approx. 4.96 miles. It can be extended another 1 ½ miles to walk around the reservoir and visit Golden Valley, a small place but lots of history. After the initial short uphill, it is gently downhill then flat. Very few stiles.

15km, 270m ascent, medium grade.

The Peak District GeoWalk is a new multi-section walk offering a broad and deep insight into the geology of the Peak District – and hence also its many rock-climbing opportunities. It was developed by Albert Benghiat and Martin Whiteley who have described it all on a freely available and excellent website: www.peakdistrictgeowalk.org.

Much of the territory will be familiar to members of the Oread but those who undertook the previous project – the Peak District Boundary Walk – will vouch for the many surprises we found along the way. I am hopeful that this latest venture will render similar satisfaction. The idea is to walk a section every other month with different leaders and hopefully some input along the way from the rock climbers amongst us.

Our first section (officially No 14) will start at Heathy Lea / Robin Hood Inn and progress to Matlock via Chatsworth Edge, Hob Hurst's House and Two Dales. We will encounter Crawshaw Sandstone, Chatsworth Grit, Ashover Grit, Carboniferous Limestone, Carbonate Mud, Bowland Shale and Millstone Grit.
