We have 15 places booked at the Fell and Rock Hut in Kinlochleven in the western Highlands. The hut's in a great position with close access to all the main climbing areas including Glen Coe and Ben Nevis.

With longer daylight hours March is an ideal time to make the journey north in search of snow and ice.

A lovely walk along the river to Beresford Dale. At the weir we go through the wood and then over the fields and return to the start. A relatively easy walk, Biggin Dale is a little rocky in places but otherwise good paths and tracks. A few places of interest along the way. Three dales, one river and tea shop at the end (if open). Sunday 23 March Spring Stride Curbar Gap Peter Amour

Following on from Chris Paice's *pre-AGM* Saturday walk I'm offering a *post-AGM* stint over mainly moorland and wooded terrain from Curbar Gap on the Sunday. I advise car sharing to ease parking spots demand, and on environmental grounds.

Start time :- Assemble 10-00am - depart 10-15am.

From :- Pay & display (NT and RSPB members free) at Curbar Edge car park SK 2625 7471.Should the car park be full :-

a) Seek parking either in Calver Village by the church/school, and liaise about a shuttle lift to the car park, or

b) Use the limited lane spaces approaching the aforementioned car park. If a plan to co-ordinate a shuttle is required my mobile number is xxxxxxxx The route will head off anti clockwise to take in the Eagle Stone (bouldering options available). Passing Wellington's Monument and Blackstone Edge we'll cross the Baslow - Sheffield road and trek onto Shillito Woods using a stint on asphalt. Veering north the feet will tread onto Car Lane under Hewetts Bank, and through Smeakley Wood. 28 – 30 March North York Moors Chris Wilson

A venue with a lot to offer, from trips to the café, a pub crawl, walking, cycling, climbing. All in a lovely setting. The days will be long and the weather, whatever it chooses to be, will enable you to have a great weekend.

Climbing. There are over 100 crags in the area, although some are rather small and somewhat esoteric. Others are excellent. Hard sandstone crags, soft sort of limestone crags, perfect rock, adventurous rock. Bouldering and trad climbing prevail. Fantastic views abound.

Driving times from Osmotherly to some of the better known crags: 10 minutes to Scugdale ("great quality, sunny setting"), 30 to Wainstones ("extensive repertoire of excellent climbs, superb views"), 25 to Whitestone Cliffe (allegedly formed by a landslip and has the feeling at times that this is still happening, but well worth a visit if only to do Nightwatch).

There's White Stones Crag, giving lonely moorland bouldering in an evening suntrap, described as heaven! Or Tranmire with over 165 routes (on good rock

and you will be the only climbers there). How about Roseberry Topping, the Matterhorn of Cleveland, or Clemitt's Crag with around 400 boulder problems.

Walking. Osmotherley has been famed for the walking in the area since the early 1800s. Wonderful short and long walks abound. Circular walks and long National Trials – your choice.

Cycling. Lots of mountain biking trails in the area, some short, some long. How about a 10 km circular moderate route (3 hours) from the village, or an 8 hour circular from Black Hambleton. If that doesn't grab your attention, there's plenty of road cycling on quiet lanes.

Other activities. Abbeys, castles, a White Horse, museums, farms. It's all there in abundance.

We are staying at Cote Ghyll Campsite, Osmotherley. Make your own booking via their web site. There are various camping options from £29.00 per night, a cottage sleeping 8 with hot tub etc, and the hostel (shared rooms or en-suite private rooms) from £40 per night. It's a 15 minute walk to village centre.

The lovely village of Osmotherley caters for many tastes. It has three pubs, a newsagent, a village convenience store and an antique shop as well as a yoga centre, at least three churches and a few B&Bs. If you're planning on coming along let me know.

Oread Alpine Meets 2025

21 June – 5 July Saas Grund, Valais, Switzerland Steve Christian

Our first alpine trip of the year will be to the lovely 'Saastal' based at Camping Schönblick in the village of Saas Grund. It is the eastern region of the Swiss canton of Valais, north of the Monte Rosa group. There is a concentration of thirteen peaks exceeding 4000 metres that include technically easy normal routes along with some classic snow and rock ridge traverses. It is a perfect venue for new or experienced alpine mountaineers alike. There are also lower altitude classic rock traverses and some good multi pitch rock climbs. Half and full day walks are possible to a number of alpine huts, lakes and cols, which can include ascents of smaller walking peaks.

The campsite should soon be open for the winter season. They have reserved 25 camping places for us and we will be able to book directly with them from mid-March onwards.

30 August – 6 September Ailefroide Ecrins National Park, France Nige Berry

The second confirmed venue is Ailefroide in The Ecrins National Park, France for the first week of September i.e. 30th August to 6th September. There is an option to extend this for a further week after the proposed finish date depending upon people's preference. It will also be possible for people to independently go a week earlier. It will be based from the campsite in Ailefroide <u>Camping Ailefroide</u> (Vallouise-Pelvoux) | Provence-Alpes-Côte d'Azur Tourism

This venue works well at the end of the season August / September (when the

French finish their holidays) perfect for families, great campsite, no telepheriques to pay for and possibilities for booking huts. Conditions can be mixed for snow alpinism but still possible with the Pelvoux traverse or Dom de Neige / Barre des Ecrin.

It has many bolt protected multi pitch granite routes, either from the campsite or in the surrounding mountains, along with many bolted valley crags in adjacent areas. There are nearby options for bouldering, canyoning and via ferratas. The local and nearby walks are also varied and extensive.

The photo was taken by Douglas Gardiner looking up on the final part of the Fiacaill Ridge up to the Cairngorm plateau. It shows - from top to bottom, Michael Hayes, Kasia Sajdok, Steph Jimenez, Emma Hayes, Luke Marshall.

Conditions were poor with lots of unconsolidated snow so we chose this route as a safe option to give the group some more experience of mixed climbing in Winter.

Great day out wading through deep snow to get to the bottom of the ridge then a steady climb up sticking to the very crest of the ridge whenever easier options opened up on the right.

For the final 100m the six of us tied two ropes together and moved together with a few running belays up the grade II climb. Lots of scraping the loose snow which covered everything to find good axe placements in the rocks.

Our descent took us around the top of Sneachda and then down the Fiacaill a' Choire Chais back to the car. By the time we got back to the ski centre it was just below freezing and the wind was getting stronger (it had been -15 Deg C on the way up this morning).

The fickle UK weather was changing again but we had managed a fantastic day out!

We were fortunate on this day that the winter weather was in temporary remission. After establishing that the whole of the car park could not be seen from each end we managed to assemble a team comprising of Sue, Richard Freestone, Stuart Firth, John Green, Peter Amour, Chris and myself. The steady ascent to Hazelton Clump and the ruined Musden Farm was comfortable, I was a touch disappointed at needing to consult the electronic map to locate the alpine style zig zag path passing left of the summit of Musden Low, it would seem that some of the masonry walling of yore had been removed. Thereafter progress to Calton and Slade House. Here, climbing the stile the masonry came adrift resulting in a backward flip through 180 degrees. It was not the effect of this impact which led me to offer to stand drinks for the team at Throwley Hall should they be open, but a desire to discover who knew that the building was an ancient ruin.

After a pleasant rest there but consuming our own picnics We then drifted comfortably down to Ilam Tea rooms and thence back to starting point.

mini mountain ridge with three pitches of excellent bolted climbing at 4+ and a ridge scramble to finish. Mountains in one direction – olive oil factory on the other. (*photo Simon Pape*).

Chris complained her early start home was before breakfast – and scored a picnic box of ten random items, mostly edible! I dropped Snod's "nearly new" Helly Hensen jacket – disaster -but lo and behold, someone had hung it up on the fence. All well – it was too young to die - only 12 years old. Snod and I found a lovely short ridge walk for our last day with stunning views in all directions.


Low points – Kev and Janice fell off a pavement – don't ask; The sat nav didn't

An English Ski Tour Ian Ferguson

In the week of January 6th FOMO was severe. Snow and settled high pressure aligned perfectly with inescapable family commitments. But Saturday could work... what to do ? WhatsApp reported tempting conditions in Eryri, North Lakes or the North York Moors. Traffic mayhem appeared widespread. Reports from the Scottish Avalanche Information Service were best summarised as "it's complicated." Tension built as the day approached...

I kept it simple. The further destinations would be three hours, plus complicated roadhead parking, plus the uncertain return journey on top of, with luck, the fatigue of a good day out. Blencathra summit pictures made it no more appealing than my extrapolations from webcams in the Peak. A circuit from Castleton could raise the chances of skiable snow by permitting access to slopes of different aspects, with only a short carry. Remembering the awkward parking in the area, I set the alarm for an alpine start.

Gratification was not instant. The Buxton road was slick and twisty. Unloading skis at 6am in the westernmost parking spot in Castleton felt lonely and eccentric. It's always great to skin from the car, but Winnats Pass was dark and damp with high-speed fog. The full moon would have been ideal but had set an hour earlier, so occasional bursts of head-torch were needed to clip in or see what new joy the ski-tips had struck... never anything good.

Morale rose as the sides of the Pass revealed skiable snow accumulations. Approaching the farm, some snow was deep enough to allow five-bar gates to be surmounted without removing skis. Hip flexors were massaged as Mam Tor itself started to show.

Once having skooshed across to the first road crossing, I was starting to feel slightly less like an out-of-place incompetent. The place was humming with cars everywhere and more arriving. I focused on the ascent of sparse, patchy, hard snow and busy paths, trying to avoid tripping anyone (primarily myself) and thinking that Winnats would be a nicer descent.

The pre-dawn summit was a cheery place. About fifty people, a couple of tents, and an enthusiastic welcome for my incongruous over-equipment. "You gonna ski off that ? Can I watch ? Can I take your picture ?" – but most folk were appreciating the exquisite view.



After a LOT of photos and a glug of water, skins off, boots switched from "stun" to "kill" and no further avoiding the first turns of the season. The noise of eyerattling iced sastrugi seemed to upset a small dog very badly, but it couldn't catch up. Let's not pretend the route to Hollins Cross was wide groomed piste, but it was very satisfying choosing precise easy lines on or beside the path, spreading the minimum possible terror amongst pedestrians.

I breakfasted as the sun rose, at the base of the ascent to Lose Hill. The summit itself would only have won me a sharp, constricted descent clashing with the path, so instead I took the chance to review the face of the Tor. The wide ramp of the east face tempted – but snow cover didn't look generous and my main encouragement was a single set of tracks from earlier in the week.

It was a lovely easy skin back up to the top of the Tor, with Winnats in the back of my mind as the descent to look forward to. The sun was up, the light was spectacular, I was stopped a few times for photos and to have my skins fondled and there were no small dogs.

Two climbers (not Oreads) were very smug at having climbed Blue John Rib. They're welcome to it – my past esoterica include a few pitches of southern chalk, but a line must be drawn somewhere. I reset the boots and drew my own wiggly line down the east face, over pillows of soft drift, hard shaded patches and grassinfested thinness lower down the face. I can't claim continuous linked turns top to bottom, but I stayed upright.



Mam Tor gully itself was full of folk wielding axes, then mighty rocks. A couple of skiers had appeared and were tackling the steep entry 50m below the summit, but an extra climb to get three mid-high-consequence turns didn't appeal to me, so I contoured around back to the Winnats path. Fifty ewes had just been let out to pasture (grass could be found...) so I crossed behind them to modest cheers from some lively folk walking up from Treak Cliff.

Treak Cliff was a joy. I fell in behind three van-deposited skiers who had skied the slope once already, so I scowled down the fall line once more and had at it. Decent snow, the occasional noisy shady bit or loop of chicken wire or random couple of housebricks, but ... it was so good I skinned back up and did it all again and internet browsing records show that I may have reviewed the symmetry of my turns on Strava a couple of times since then...



I've probably ski-toured 30-50 days in Scotland over the last 15 years, but this was my first English summit on skis, and as a day out it matched any I've had in the UK. Once-in-a-decade conditions, a bit of judgement and I didn't miss out. Crampons, axe, harscheisen and blizzard bag stayed in the sack. The Edale road parking mayhem made the national papers.

Saturday 11th, 13km/750m ascent, 5h45 out of which 3h eating, photographing, faffing with skis or posing for photographs (but only when people asked me to...)


