Oread Alpine Meets 2025

21 June – 5 July Saas Grund, Valais, Switzerland Steve Christian

Our first alpine trip of the year will be to the lovely 'Saastal' based at Camping Schönblick in the village of Saas Grund. It is the eastern region of the Swiss canton of Valais, north of the Monte Rosa group. There is a concentration of thirteen peaks exceeding 4000 metres that include technically easy normal routes along with some classic snow and rock ridge traverses. It is a perfect venue for new or experienced alpine mountaineers alike. There are also lower altitude classic rock traverses and some good multi pitch rock climbs. Half and full day walks are possible to a number of alpine huts, lakes and cols, which can include ascents of smaller walking peaks.

The campsite should soon be open for the winter season. They have reserved 25 camping places for us and we will be able to book directly with them from mid-March onwards.

30 August – 6 September Ailefroide Ecrins National Park, France Nige Berry

The second confirmed venue is Ailefroide in The Ecrins National Park, France for the first week of September i.e. 30th August to 6th September. There is an option to extend this for a further week after the proposed finish date depending upon people's preference. It will also be possible for people to independently go a week earlier. It will be based from the campsite in Ailefroide [Camping Ailefroide \(Vallouise-Pelvoux\) | Provence-Alpes-Côte d'Azur Tourism](#)

This venue works well at the end of the season August / September (when the French finish their holidays) perfect for families, great campsite, no telepheriques to pay for and possibilities for booking huts. Conditions can be mixed for snow alpinism but still possible with the Pelvoux traverse or Dom de Neige / Barre des

Ecrin.

It has many bolt protected multi pitch granite routes, either from the campsite or in the surrounding mountains, along with many bolted valley crags in adjacent areas. There are nearby options for bouldering, canyoning and via ferratas. The local and nearby walks are also varied and extensive.

I've always fancied doing the Pennine Way (435km, 11000m of ascent), but find it impossible to get the time off from work and a busy family life to do it in one push, therefore I'm looking to gauge interest if others would like to join me to do this in stages. I enjoyed hearing of other Oreads who completed it last year and have taken some inspiration from John, Pippa and the Hayes to find a way to get it done. I have a rough plan of 5 stages, to be completed over long weekends, perhaps one stage per year starting 2026, walking in late April or May before the midges arrive. Stages have access to public transport near the start and finish and I have family in Northumberland that could help with the logistics in that sparsely populated area north of the wall. I'd be looking to mix wild camping and basic accommodation where convenient, similar to a Bullstones weekend but with better weather and more daylight (I hope). I'd plan the walks and accommodation and co-ordinate travel, lift shares etc.

1. Edale to Cowling, 4 days
2. Cowling to Horton in Ribblesdale, 4 days
3. Horton in Ribblesdale to Middleton-in-Teesdale, 3 days
4. Middleton-in-Teesdale to Greenhead, 4 days
5. Greenhead to Kirk Yetholm, 5 days

Tan yr Wyddfa 21-23 February Harriet Burson-Thomas



On surprisingly sunny Saturday, four members of The Oread Mountaineering Club—Aaron, Jae, Nigel, and I—set out for an unforgettable scramble on Sentries Ridge, a hidden gem on the southern flanks of Mynydd Mawr in Eryri National Park.

Leaving the hut, we followed forest tracks before emerging onto the scree slopes beneath the rugged cliffs of Craig y Bera.

Nigel took the lead as we made our way toward the middle ridge. Splitting into two teams, we began our ascent, with Nigel calling down, “Push, don’t pull!” Heeding his advice, we scrambled over fractured, blocky rock. Aaron’s description of the terrain as being “as

loose as an old Renault steering rack” gives you some idea of what we were up against.

Our first challenge was a five-metre gendarme. Both teams opted for a direct ascent, relying on well-placed gear and a committed move from a deep crack. Then came a well-earned photo break—what a view! The Llyn Peninsula shimmered in the distance, with steep rocky drops on either side. As the ridge narrowed, we tackled a series of rocky pinnacles—the signature feature of Sentries Ridge. Jae and Nigel pushed ahead, moving alpine-style and roped together for safety. Aaron and I followed closely behind, finding the upper sections steeper but more solid underfoot.

After about four hours of scrambling, both teams reached the grassy top-out near Mynydd Mawr’s summit. The views were breathtaking—Nantlle Ridge to the east, the coastline to the west, and Snowdon’s



iconic peak on the horizon. What a fantastic day in the mountains!

Uncommonly good conditions prevailed for the the time of year and we attended Stanage Plantation for some sun kissed trad climbing instead of the planned chilly bouldering. The meet was well attended with double figures of Oread making the most of the good weather.

Various excursions were had - water assisted rounds of High Street and thereabouts, and various tours around the Helvellyn cirque (including approaches via the Pinnacle Ridge and east ridge of Nethermost Pike). Pinnacle Ridge was seemingly the only place in the shade. Sheffield Pike was reported as boggy but close to the Travellers Rest. Cycling tours included the The Royal, Dockray. Sunday's escapades saw no let up and included Gowbarrow Fell and Beda Fell and the crags of Long Scar and Castle Rock.

Although not advertised as such, it emerged that this was a Joint Meet, subsidised by the Alpine Club. This was a shock to many of the 17 assembled company, so much so that further investigations were put in place. Witnesses were called. Explanations suggested. Motives examined. Apparently two of the

Green Tops Rusty Russell

During Christine's recent walk from Hartington there were several sightings of a distant edifice sporting a conical cap sheathed in what appeared to be weathered copper. Without the necessary thought and care several, including myself, suggested that this might be Ecton Mine building in the distance. Later on, a better sighting made it clear that the green cap was in the neighbourhood of Sheen which torpedoed the original theory.

Today I had the opportunity to explore the area again and I offer two photographs to clarify the position. The first (left) shows the "steeple" at the Ecton Mine building which is as I described but which clearly we could not have seen as it is in the steep sided Manifold Valley whereas we were in Dovedale. The second is clearly a church steeple which was seen in Sheen. (I had not been previously aware that there existed two such green capped steeples or towers in the area).

When the Station Master lived at Tan yr Wyddfa

As a result of looking at the TyW deeds, I have found some history regarding the use of the TyW property as the Station Master's house.

The Watkin Path on the south side of Snowdon was opened in 1892 by Prime Minister William Gladstone, the first designated footpath in Britain. The path is named after Sir Edward Watkin, a Liberal Member of Parliament and railway entrepreneur who financed the path's construction. It was his second wife, Lady Anne Watkin (nee Ingram, m.1892) who in 1895 leased the TyW plot ('Plot15') to a David John Jones of the Snowdon Temperance Hotel, Rhyd Ddu. This was a 99 year lease, £3 pa.

1887-8 OS 6in map shows no building on the site but the revision of 1899 shows Snowdon View. Snowdon View, latterly Tan yr Wyddfa, was thus built between 1895 and 1899, alongside the railway which had already been opened in 1881.

We have in the title deeds:

- 25 June 1906 Sir Alfred Mellor Watkin (son of Sir Edward Watkin and his first wife Mary Watkin (nee Briggs) agrees to assign Snowdon View to DJ Jones of Snowdon Temperance Hotel Rhyd Ddu (keeper & quarryman), and John Ogwen Owen (Quarryman) & Idwal Owen (Station master)
- 23 August 1906 the lease is surrendered by Mr Ellis Griffiths (farmer) to Mr David J Jones
- 24 August 1906 the lease is assigned by Mr D J Jones to Messrs John Ogwen Owen & Idwal Owen

This periodical **Welsh Heritage no 56**

<https://www.welshhighlandheritage.co.uk/wp-content/uploads/WHH-No-56.pdf>

tells us more about Idwal Owen, a railway accident he had been involved in, and including that by 1911 only mother Ellen, brother John and sister Maggie are left in Rhyd Ddu at a house called Snowdon View. Idwal has left the railway and is living in Pwllheli and working as an Auctioneer's Clerk. Perhaps the accident enquiry didn't go well?

The 1901 census records the Owens living at 47 Morgan Terrace. Today Stryd Morgan is the address of only three houses on the main road. In 1911 the Owens gave their address as Snowdon View. Perhaps they gave up estimating where all the other houses in Morgan terrace would be built.

These are The Manakarin Spires in the Kulu, Himalaya, India.
We made the first ascent of these in 1961, which, though named the Derbyshire Himalayan Expedition, was very much an Oread party.

The summit on the right was climbed by Ray Handley, Sonam Wangyal and myself, and the one on the left by Ray and myself. This was the hardest of the two, and the most difficult rock climbing I ever managed in the Himalaya. I was too engaged on these ascents to take any pictures and the photographing was done by Ray. Unfortunately he died quite young and what happened to his pictures I do not know.

However I thought, as it is the Oread's special anniversary, tribute should be made to the memory of Ray who was with me on these two important ascents. The photo is from Bob Pettigrew's collection.
