24 May – 1 June Skye Michael Moss

We are going again to Skye for the late May bank holiday, the weather has been good to us for this week in most years. Dates are Saturday 24th May to Sunday 1st June.
Skye has great opportunities for climbing, scrambling and walking. There is scrambling on the Black and Red Cullins, a range of classic mountain routes at all grades and sea cliff climbing.
Climbing includes many long ameanable classics, including the Dubhs Ridge, Pinnacle Ridge and routes on Sron na Ciche including the Cioch.

The classic Cullin ridge can be tackled in one long push, or broken into a few enjoyable days.

For a great day out I can recommend the boat from Elgol to the isolated Loch Coruisk, a scramble up the Dubhs ridge and over the Cullin ridge and the descent to the campsite at Glenbrittle.

For more relaxing days, walks along the shore and cliff tops watching the otters, dolphins and seals.

We will be camping at Glenbrittle, a beautiful spot on the coast, adjacent to the best climbing in the Cullin, and with good access to scrambles on the ridge.

The facilities there are good. Booking at the campsite is only necessary if you want an electric hook-up.

The campsite has reserved 25 places for us. If you enter Oread MC - Steve Christian in the comments field when booking they will keep us together in the same area.

Camping Schönblick in the village of Saas Grund is in the eastern region of the Swiss canton of Valais, north of the Monte Rosa group. There is a concentration of thirteen peaks exceeding 4000 metres that include technically easy normal routes along with some classic snow and rock ridge traverses. It is a perfect venue for new or experienced alpine mountaineers alike. There are also lower altitude classic rock traverses and some good multi pitch rock climbs. Half and full day walks are possible to a number of alpine huts, lakes and cols, which can include ascents of smaller walking peaks.

27 - 28 June Stair Cottage Snod Helliwell

This year's Fylde hut swap meet is at the spacious, modern Stair Cottage near Keswick, which, unlike Little Langdale, has ample parking and 21 beds. (You must bring your own pillowcase). The hut is ideally situated for lots of crags and great walking in Borrowdale and the Western fells. As a hut swap the cost is only £5 a night for members.

The long days at this time of year allow access to the high crags - Scafell, Gable, Eagle Crag and even Esk Buttress are within reach. The valley crags, Shepherds, Black Crag, Bleak How, Sargeant Crag Slabs, Goat Crag and the wonderful (though I think now rather overgrown) Great End Crag, home to two of the best routes in the country. There is ample opportunity for ticking routes in Hard Rock. And back at the hut – after a long day on the hill or crag - Botty will be there with his guitar so we can have a Saturday night sing-song. It was so good last time Pip got up (or was it the noise?) and joined us in her P.J.s!

This venue works well at the end of the season August / September (when the

French finish their holidays) perfect for families, great campsite, no telepheriques to pay for and possibilities for booking huts. Conditions can be mixed for snow alpinism but still possible with the Pelvoux traverse or Dom de Neige / Barre des Ecrin.

It has many bolt protected multi pitch granite routes, either from the campsite or in the surrounding mountains, along with many bolted valley crags in adjacent areas. There are nearby options for bouldering, canyoning and via ferratas. The local and nearby walks are also varied and extensive.

I've always fancied doing the Pennine Way (435km, 11000m of ascent), but find it impossible to get the time off from work and a busy family life to do it in one push, therefore I'm looking to gauge interest if others would like to join me to do this in stages. I enjoyed hearing of other Oreads who completed it last year and have taken some inspiration from John, Pippa and the Hayes to find a way to get it done. I have a rough plan of 5 stages, to be completed over long weekends, perhaps one stage per year starting 2026, walking in late April or May before the midges arrive. Stages have access to public transport near the start and finish and I have family in Northumberland that could help with the logistics in that sparsely populated area north of the wall. I'd be looking to mix wild camping and basic accommodation where convenient, similar to a Bullstones weekend but with better weather and more daylight (I hope). I'd plan the walks and accommodation and co-ordinate travel, lift shares etc.

1. Edale to Cowling, 4 days

2. Cowling to Horton in Ribblesdale, 4 days

3. Horton in Ribblesdale to Middleton-in-Teesdale, 3 days

4.Middleton-in-Teesdale to Greenhead, 4 days

5.Greenhead to Kirk Yetholm, 5 days

Change of sequence of Geo – walks Peter Amour

You may have noticed that the Geo walks later in the year are out of sequence – there are several reasons for this:

- 1) There has been a DCC statement saying that they may have to close Snake Pass permanently. The terrain is unstable and spiralling in maintenance costs. This may be political in a plea for funding, but if it does close that stage will be very difficult to complete as a linear walk.
- 2) Short daylight and the drive distances make for difficulties.
- 3) In December the party could visit the Christmas decorations in St John's Church in Tideswell on the Brierlow - Tideswell walk
- 4) In August Mike will lead members over in-bloom heather from Edale – Birchen Clough Bridge.

The over-riding reason is the risk of the DCC statement becoming reality, hence let's get it out of the way.

Steve Clegg Memorial event 20 August 2025

We have now finalised arrangements for Steve's memorial event. The venue will be the Fell and Rock Climbing Club property, Rawhead Barn and Cottage, Langdale, Lake District. The date for this auspicious occasion will be Wednesday 20th August 2025. This will be an all day gathering, come and go as you please.

In anticipation that there will be a great gathering of the clans and as there is limited parking at Rawhead I have arranged for any overspill parking to be accommodated at the Wayfarers RLH hut (Robertson Lamb Hut) which is directly opposite Rawhead and at our neighbouring Achilli Ratti hut Bishop's Scale directly next door to Rawhead (on the left as you face Rawhead from the road). Anyone making use of the parking at either the Wayfarers hut or the Achilli Ratti hut should please put a note on their car dashboard explaining the situation, i.e. Attending memorial event at Rawhead.

In the event that we require further overspill parking we can use the National Trust car park adjacent to the New Dungeon Ghyll Hotel (parking charges apply unless you are a NT member) further up the valley and then ferry folk back to Rawhead.

We shall be providing food from around late afternoon into the evening and beyond! It would be helpful if you could let me know of any particular dietary requirements, i.e. vegetarian or gluten free, which we shall do our best to accommodate. We shall also have some local beer on tap and if people prefer other drinks, wine, soft drinks etc. it would probably be best if you bring your own.

If anyone wishes to stay overnight at Rawhead on the 20th August there will be accommodation available at both the barn and cottage, both of which I have booked for the whole day and night, so we have Rawhead completely to ourselves and any accommodation costs will be provided for at Rawhead barn and cottage.

There is also accommodation available at the Old and New Dungeon Ghyll Hotels, camping at the National Trust campsite at the head of Langdale and also YHA Langdale near Elterwater as well as other accommodation in the Elterwater and Chapel Stile areas. Should you require any of this alternative accommodation it would be wise to book it sooner rather than later.

Steve Clegg joined the Climbers' Club in 1984, however, he had been a member of the Fell and Rock Climbing Club since 1974. Steve served on the CC committee from 1989 until 1993 and as Membership Secretary from 1993 until 1998. Latterly Steve became assistant Archivist with David Medcalf from 2020 until the present time. Steve was an active member of the club attending many meets over the years, he loved climbing history and was an avid collector of old guide books. I first met Steve half a century ago in 1975, I was in his bed! What happened was I had gone up to the Lakes with my good mate Terry King looking for ice to climb in the days when the Lakes was a winter climbing destination, sometimes with conditions better than in Scotland. Climbers used to meet in The Pack Horse in Keswick in those days and we somehow ended up dossing at Chas Macquarie's house where Steve was living at the time. I then ended up sleeping on Steve's bed and he came home in the middle of the night only to find his bed occupied by myself. I had completely forgotten about this incident until Steve reminded me years later. Steve knew the Lakes very well and the next day he took us round to Buttermere to show us a huge ice sheet on one of the high crags which Kingy and I duly went up and climbed.

Steve was weaned on the Bridestones locally known as the Kebs near Todmorden, West Yorkshire and was one of the Burnley Lads.

The mid-seventies were a frantic time of hard climbing development in the Lakes with the likes of Pete Whillance and Dave Armstrong, Jeff Lamb, Rob Matheson and Yorkshire raiders Livesey, Fawcett, Gomersall and Berzins. And Steve was at the forefront of all this development with his good friend Pete Botterill. Pete was a pharmacist in Keswick and Steve used to go out during the day and clean and prepare a possible route they had eyed up ready for when Pete had finished work and then off they went to do the route. They have a clutch of hard Lake District routes to their credit most of which are classics. On one of their routes

"Creation" on Raven Crag Thirlmere I had what I can only describe as an out of body experience and I can still visualise that moment and the move to this day. I didn't see Steve again until the early nineteen eighties when he was working for Rolls Royce in Derby as a draughtsman a position he held for over thirty years, I don't remember exactly how we hooked up again, however, the next five years or so were a rollercoaster of climbing. In the summer months at the weekend we would alternate between North Wales and the Lakes and in the winter months it would be Pembroke, Bristol and Swanage, we never bothered looking at weather forecasts in those days, we just went away and were rarely disappointed. We did a lot of climbing, life was fast, free and an enormous amount of fun. I remember so many amusing incidents with Steve, the time we were racing along the A5 to North Wales and ended up in the middle of a roundabout almost up to the axles and Steve just calmly said "who put that roundabout there" and then racing through the Bettws bends for the mandatory beer stop at the Bryn Tyrch in Capel Curig and getting stuck behind a Porsche. On another occasion we were outside Stoney Café one Sunday morning and Bob Berzins was there in a tracksuit with paint splashes on it. Steve says hello and asks Bob what he has been up to, to which Bob replied "a bit of decorating" and Steve responds "we can see that, but

try using a brush next time"! Or the time we were walking up to Cwm Glas Mawr it was raining and I had a new girlfriend, Steve stopped by the ruin on the left on the walk up and cried "oh no the roof must have blown off in the wind last week", the poor girl was mortified and then the time we arrived at Ynys Ettws and the last entry in the book was Sue Preston Jones, not to be outdone Steve signed himself in as Steve Clitheroe Clegg! I could go on ad infinitum.

After we both got married and had children there were many holidays together and the family meet at The Count House was always a favourite. I kept in touch with Steve regularly and during the pandemic used to call him most weeks for a natter, we could be on the phone for an hour or two discussing everything from politics to some of the great old times we had together.

I last spoke to Steve on Saturday 7th December he was at the hotel at East Midlands Airport ready for his annual foray to Calpe the following day and the winter gathering in Spain, we were on the phone for an hour and fifteen minutes! I still have an entry in my diary from the 19th December to "Call Cleggy" at 19:00, I was going to congratulate him on a talk he did. For some reason I never made that call and the next day he was gone, there is a moral there somewhere.

Steve was a legend, always great fun, a brilliant wit and he will be very, very sadly missed by many people and indeed many of us here tonight.
