Wednesday 1 October Bamford Walk Chris Paice

The starting point is Heatherdene car park just off the A6031. 9.45 for a 10.00a.m. start. A Severn Trent car park so cash and card payments are available as are toilets. Map ref: 203 860.

Steeply upwards through the woods to moorland and Bamford Edge. Hopefully, after seeing some good views, at Bole Hill we take the paths that drop us onto Hurstclough Lane and through the golf course. This drops onto the main road, A6013 which we cross and head along for a short stretch to the bridge to cross the Derwent. Lanes and woodland walk going in a northerly direction, parallel to the Derwent, take us to the dam. Here are the sink holes. Personally, I find these interesting and quite awesome but maybe not so with the recent drought. Over the dam to return to the cars.

Just over 11km (just under 7 miles). Total ascent 390.4m (1281ft), highest point is 424.8 m (1394ft)

Saturday 18 October Tideswell to Edale Geo Walk Rob Tresidder

You are warmly invited to join me on section 9 of the Peak District geo walk. Many of you will be more familiar with these outings than I am. I did a section with Chris Wilson which included the Middleton incline, way back in...

By way of introduction to this section, I can do no better than quote from the online guide: "A truly magnificent walk, starting with a level stretch out of Tideswell that passes through areas on the limestone plateau that were extensively mined for lead. Then there is an attractive descent through Cave Dale, a dry valley at the edge of the limestone plateau that ends up in the village of Castleton. The limestone margin is revisited during the steady pull up Winnats Pass and then younger shales and sandstones are seen along the Great Ridge, before descending to Edale. Along the way there are also interesting exposures of volcanic rock and a traverse across the 'Shivering Mountain', one of Britain's best-known landslide features."

Tideswell provides excellent facilities for walkers with a range of accommodation, shops and watering holes. It is easily accessed by car or bus and the fourteenth century church, known locally as the ‘Cathedral of the Peak’, is well worth a visit before you set off.”

The walk is 16k long and includes 490m of ascent. It is one of the harder to reach parts of the Geowalk so the transport logistics will be more awkward than some others.

The walk will start from Fountain Square when the 65 bus arrives from Bakewell. That is scheduled for 0940.

Trying to shuttle between Tideswell and Eyam via public transport is impractical, so those choosing to drive to Tideswell will need to arrive there at 0900 to give time for a couple of drivers to travel from Tideswell to Edale and back. I might be able to arrange a minibus from Edale to Tideswell which would eliminate that element. In the end the easiest way might be to do it all via public transport without shuttling. I intend to leave Wirksworth at 0740 and be home by 1840. Please feel free to join me for all or part of that journey. I can give advice on schedules if you give me your location.

Egyptian Bizarre Roger Gibbs

I love the intricacies of Peak limestone sport. The way they always feel desperate on first acquaintance and easy when you can do them. Well maybe not easy. The process of dragging a route down to my level would have been anathema to the teenage me but the old fart me loves it. Maybe the teenage me didn't fancy the hard work. There's even a hint of sadness when you tick the route. What are you going to visualise as you're dropping off to sleep now? How do you answer the question "what are you on today?" Well, I suppose I'm project shopping again. It's rather a contrast to the soaring lines and elemental splendour of Pembroke, but they have their own beauty.

It's also a joy to pinch something from the weather. It had rained pretty hard overnight and early morning, so a leisurely start meant we could walk in in the dry. The Cornice stays dry pretty reliably once the winter is over unless the rainfall is properly biblical and we needn't have worried. There was a team of three already there with some familiar faces and we stopped to chat. After a too brief exchange, I'm chivvied along to the easy routes. Egyptian Bizarre has long ceased to be a trad route but it still sports a rotting ring peg which is roundly ignored in favour of the shiny bolts. Progress? I'll let you decide. I'd got pretty close a couple of days ago and should really have ticked it then. On my best effort, I'd had the tip of the middle finger of my right hand on the finishing hold before dropping it.

Today the warm up run feels solid even though there's a fresh breeze blowing and my fingers aren't 100% ready to fire. I do the crux in two bits and lower off satisfied. After a quick belaying session I'm ready to go. A quick run through in my head of the beta. Let's go. The start is fairly amenable and I'm soon at the bulge. I launch into the crux section and casually roll over to the sharp crimp.

Missed. I'm instantly airborne. Too casual? A short rest on the rope and I repeat the key section.



There are really only eight moves that matter on the route. Some would say there are only two. But there's a definite degree of subtlety required if you're as weak as me. We'd been chatting about flow state and a positive inner monologue. Right, let's have a bit of that.

"Pace, move efficiently, don't rush," says the inner voice. "Relax, but mean it when you need to."

This time the roll over move is much better and I stick the sharp crimp.

"Oh no, I feel really tired." Not in flow state then. I tell myself to shut up and lurch to the big sidepull. Clip. A big hold. I decide to chalk up. Both hands. What the hell am I doing? The inner voice reminds me there are two more moves to do yet.

This time there is no mistake and I clip the belay with a subdued whoop. I'm lowered off, gabbling with excitement.

Chris reminds me that I'd been about 5mm off exactly this outcome 48 hours ago. "Ah, yes," I say, "but that would have meant less time to enjoy the journey."
