I have booked the campsite for myself, Sally and Tom at Saas Grund for the dates June 21st to July 5th via this link:

The campsite has reserved 25 places for us. If you enter Oread MC - Steve Christian in the comments field when booking they will keep us together in the same area.

Camping Schönblick in the village of Saas Grund is in the eastern region of the Swiss canton of Valais, north of the Monte Rosa group. There is a concentration of thirteen peaks exceeding 4000 metres that include technically easy normal routes along with some classic snow and rock ridge traverses. It is a perfect venue for new or experienced alpine mountaineers alike. There are also lower altitude classic rock traverses and some good multi pitch rock climbs. Half and full day walks are possible to a number of alpine huts, lakes and cols, which can include ascents of smaller walking peaks.

This year's Fylde hut swap meet is at the spacious, modern Stair Cottage near Keswick, which, unlike Little Langdale, has ample parking and 21 beds. (You must bring your own pillowcase). The hut is ideally situated for lots of crags and great walking in Borrowdale and the Western fells. As a hut swap the cost is only £5 a night for members.

The long days at this time of year allow access to the high crags - Scafell, Gable, Eagle Crag and even Esk Buttress are within reach. The valley crags, Shepherds, Black Crag, Bleak How, Sargeant Crag Slabs, Goat Crag and the wonderful (though I think now rather overgrown) Great End Crag, home to two of the best routes in the country. There is ample opportunity for ticking routes in Hard Rock. And back at the hut – after a long day on the hill or crag - Botty will be there with his guitar so we can have a Saturday night sing-song. Southerly to Abney, Cockey farm, crossing Bretton Brook to Nether Bretton picking up the Sir William Hill track. This takes us east to Ladywash farm. At this point we go south (not past the YHA) but taking a track to lead us back to the start point.

Some steep ascents but also the more level areas across the fields and moor and easier track walking. Should be good views and may be a glider or two.

Saturday 19 July Flash to Brierlow Bar Geo-walk Chris Paice

I look forward to seeing participants on another interesting Geo-walk-in some stunning countryside. Being a linear walk car sharing will be essential to make things work.

Start point at A53 lay-by 1/2 mile south of Flash Bar Cafe (grid reference SK675 029). Please don't use Flash Bar Cafe lay-by.

After dropping off their passengers at the lay-by, car drivers will need to drive to the walk end point parking (£5, cash) at Shallow Grange Campsite near Brierlow Bar, SK17 9FW, where a ferry car(s) will pick them up and return them to the start point for a 10-00am walk commencement.

All drivers should drop their passengers off at the A53 lay-by allowing sufficient time to deliver their cars to Shallow Grange and then be ferried back for the prompt 10-00am walk start.

It's essential that I know ASAP, but no later than Thursday 17th June, if you are joining the walk to enable co-ordination of required cars, and timings. Timings and car details to follow when confirmed to me.

It has many bolt protected multi pitch granite routes, either from the campsite or in the surrounding mountains, along with many bolted valley crags in adjacent areas. There are nearby options for bouldering, canyoning and via ferratas. The local and nearby walks are also varied and extensive.

North York Moors 28 - 30 March Chris Wilson

The newsletter advert had mentioned cafés, pubs, walking, cycling and climbing in a lovely setting. It was not wrong. 14 of us turned up in Osmotherley: Jan and I, Chris Radcliffe, Steve Booth, Cathy Luffman, Sue Todd, Stuart Firth, Rachel Walker. Mike and Cathy Moss, Derek and Joan Pike, Nigel and Janet Briggs.



Activities started on Friday. For some a pleasant visit to Scampston Hall Walled garden whilst others took to cycling over Scarth Gap, a loop to Stokesley and Rudby and back over Scarth Gap. Derek did a 9k walk from the campsite along the ridge of Arncliffe Wood to Scarth Nick returning to the campsite via Cod Beck reservoir. In the evening all 14 of us sauntered down to the Golden Lion for a meal. We originally booked a table for two (to celebrate Jan's birthday) but gradually increased the number 14. The pub did us proud, fitting everyone onto one table (apart from the two eating foreign food – beef bourguignon!).

On Saturday the cold wind was blowing pretty hard. The guidebook mentions that Scugdale gets all the sun going, but also offers little shelter from the wind. So Mike and I got a lift from Derek and Joan and went climbing there.

We got blown up Beta on Beginners Slab,

Zoot Route on Parsons Nose and Blaeberry Butress on Scot Butress and can confirm that there is no shelter from the wind. Fortunately our transport was close to hand when the rain began and before long we were drinking tea in the Rusty Bike Café at Swainby. We were soon joined by Stuart and Sue who had cycled from the campsite to Great Ayton and back. From the café they had the pleasure of the “stonking hill” to re-ascend to Scarth Nick and the campsite.

Chris Radcliffe tells his own story of Saturday: “I had planned a longish ride out to Helmsley but a malfunction on my ebike forced a change of plan. From Caw Beck it was off-road to Square Corner, then delightful quiet roads with some steep climbs to Hawnby.

I stopped for a coffee and flapjack at Hawnby Bridge, but when I set off again I found that I had an overvoltage sensor fault and no power. Without too many options at this point I struggled up a 17% gradient to Murton Grange and followed the Peak Scar Road to a junction with the Cleveland Way. I followed this off-road route relatively easily back to Caw Beck so rescued the day with a reasonable ride. I never really found out what caused the fault, but eventually it went away.

Nigel and Janet started Saturday with the Flatts Lane park run and then observed the partial eclipse of the sun. A walk up Roseberry Topping and up to the Cook Monument followed. The day ended by seeing how many people could fit in their VW T4 for Nigel's birthday cake eating fest.

It was then a hasty march back to the campsite via Cod Beck Reservoir to ensure they were in time for the birthday cake. An enjoyable 13 mile walk.

On Sunday lovely sunshine saw six of us walking up on to Osmotherley Moor from the campsite, then south on the Cleveland Way along the edge of the moor stopping near Whitestones for a drinks break. After this it was a steep descent to Kepwick Moor and on to Nether Stilton with the promise of lunch in the Gold Cup Inn. Unfortunately it didn't open until 4 pm (Steve's third closed pub!), so we sat outside to eat our lunch. Over Stilton followed, then Thimbleby Bank Plantation before Oak Dale and on to the welcoming Golden Lion and the drive home. 12.5

miles and 500 m of ascent. Sue and Stuart walked with the Mosses to Square Corner and back with Mike and Cathy extending their walk. Radders abandoned his plans and went home.

Upper Hulme Geo-walk 26 April Peter Amour

The day began well. When dropping the finish point cars off at Flash Bar lay-by Oread car owners got a roasting from Mrs Flash Bar Stores Cafe. Our crime; occupying public highway spaces which she uses for her visiting cafe users. This misdemeanour was delivered to me by Mr Firth, along with a second tightener, the start point car park charges had gone up by 150% since the last Oread visit, two months ago, which I put down to Trump's tariffs.

An earlier than normal start time (9-30am) saw us enjoying the views from Hen Cloud, and observing the geo features of synclines, anticlines and the local Roaches Grit, from which the local crags are comprised, with nearby Chatsworth Grit, which could have been moved on by the US president due to being alien.

Heading generally north along the Roaches the guide notes clarified the distinctly differing strata angles of Roaches Grit outcrops. One being bedrock sediments, the other creations of suspended geo-grains being carried by water flows when once an estuary. Further into the walk an obligatory call at Lud's Church clarified it as the result of Roaches Grit which had split, and migrated due to sitting on unstable shales.

Following a mid day scoff the journey skirted by the C18 Gradbach Mill, and onto the youngest carboniferous geology in the Peak District. Oddly, it was categorised as Rough Rock, which is softer than adjacent gritstones, and had allowed the Dane to carve its water course deeply into the terrain nearby. As we moved north, and towards Three Shires Head the guide sheet explained faint signs of bell pits where shallow coal reserves were once exploited. North-east of the point of the three counties lie yet more areas of deeper, extensive coal extraction. Lying amongst the heathers was the former Buxton Coal Field, exploited in the local

production of lime, the latter being put to various uses. Thank you to the ten members who joined me, and especially to the taxi service car drivers who made things possible. I look forward to joining the next stage.

Cornwall 2-10 May Ed Bloomfield

An Oread Cornish granite retreat - we were treated to calm seas, sunshine and possibly the best ice cream in the world from Newlyn! Eight of us made the trip south for the bank holiday weekend and some stayed until the end of the following week, others left midweek. The campsite was relatively busy the first couple of days but then we had the place to ourselves near enough. The tides where not always favourable but we found many ways to pass the tide, French bowls, coastal runs and walks, cycling and most importantly pasty shopping! And with the sea being relatively calm there was always somewhere to climb.

Mike Moss arrived late Saturday and we did a coastal walk from the campsite to Sennen while the tides drew out then climbed Double Overhang at Sennen before retiring to the pub.

The rest of the team arrived in drips and drabs on Sunday, after watching the show of Roger erecting his tent we formed a plan for Chair Ladder in the afternoon the next day. We were two rope teams, after the initial abseil me and Tom Larkam made our way up South Face Direct, it's a four pitch route with a true summit finish which is quite unique for a sea cliff. The four pitches are quite contrasting but all with interest, the third pitch is good value pulling through a roof on big jugs, Tom was attacked by nesting seagulls on the second pitch just as he was pulling over a ledge to the belay but the real entertainment was provided from below as Doug, Mike and Roger went bare foot, rolled up their trousers and dithered getting round the crashing waves trying to reach the base of a different route, inevitably they got wet!

The next day we headed to Bosigran and repeated "Oread" a line put up by E Byne from the club in 1955. Alisons Rib, Picnic and Simon were the other routes

climbed. On Wednesday Doug and German Mike set off for an evening assault on Commando Ridge, they returned successfully by 20:30. Thursday saw a three man team go to Lands End and complete Long Climb, a route made up of seven short pitches. The star pitch on the route is the chimney pitch five and topping out at the Lands End hotel makes for a short walk back to the car. Will be looking to return next spring so keep an eye on the meets list!
