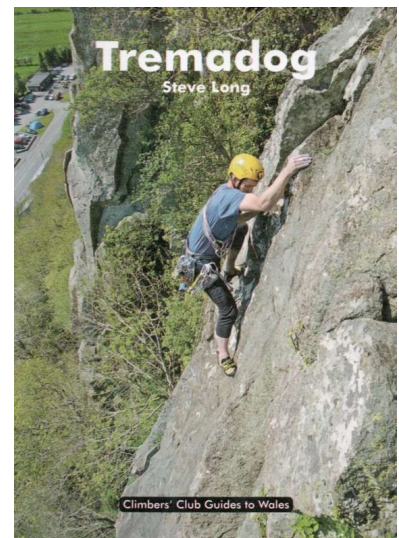
2-6 April Easter Peak District climbing

Thursday 16 April Short Walk Monyash Chris Paice

Beginning at the car park west of Monyash, near the school, café and pub. Free. Grid Ref: SK150 667. Meeting at 10.30a.m. for a 10.45 a.m. start. NOTE EARLIER THAN USUAL DUE TO POTENTIAL LACK OF SPACE IN THE CAR PAK AND ROADSIDE. The plan is to walk along Derby Lane towards Arbor Low. Whilst in the vicinity, we'll go to Arbor Low. Returning to the footpath to take us to Cales Dale, One Ash grange, then footpath towards Ricklow quarry. This brings us to the upper part of Lathkill Dale and we return to the cars via Bagshaw Dale or the road. Approx 10km (6.5 miles), not much ascent, 1760m (512 feet) but this doesn't include Arbor Low. Bring your usual supplies of food and liquid and join a happy, steady walking group of OREADS.

**Pennine Way in Stages 24 to 26 April - Section A Edale to
Hebden Bridge (3 days, 46 miles / 75 km)
Neil Weatherstone**

The aim is to complete the Pennine Way in sections over 5 or 6 long weekends over several years, using public transport to get to the start and end of the sections. It'll be a relaxed pace as we have much to carry and all day to arrive at our end point for the night.

Day 1: Edale to Crowden (18 miles / 29 km)

Starting at Edale 09:00 from the Nags Head, I'll be arriving on a train at Edale station not long before at 08:47. The first day will take us up Jacob's Ladder, up on to Kinder, across Featherbed Moss, over Bleaklow and down to Crowden where I plan to camp at the Camping and Caravan Club site (?12.75 for members).

Day 2: Crowden to Standage (12 miles / 20 km)

A climb to start the day past Laddow Rocks and on to Black Hill and across Wassenden Moor, as we approach Standage I suggest a detour to Diggle to stay overnight at the Diggle Hotel or just call in for food and drinks and head back up for a wild camp on the moors.

Day 3: Standage to Hebden Bridge (16 miles / 26 km)

Following the remainder of Standage to White Hill then crossing over the M62 to reach Blackstone Edge and hopefully a lunch stop at the White Horse. Passing reservoirs on the way to Stoodley Pike before dropping down hill into Charlestown and Hebden Bridge where I plan to catch a train back to Derby.

A few people expressed interest last year when I suggested the idea of completing the Pennine Way in bitesized chunks. Hopefully you are still up for it. Please let me know if you intend to join me and we can make finer arrangements for the accommodation etc on the OMC Whatsapp group called 'Pennine Way 24 to 26th April'.

This walk links some of the small pockets of country parks in the Charnwood Forest, a very unique landscape between Leicester and Loughborough, famous for displaying some of the oldest rocks in England where the first published discovery of Precambrian fossils took place. We will meet at the Outwoods Woodland P&D car park at 10am (OS Grid Reference SK514159, W3W \\form.signature.tripling, nearest postcode LE11 3YG) This is a large car park with cafe and toilets, £2 fee for the day. We will walk through the bluebell carpets of the Outwoods via Woodhouse Eaves to Swithland Woods, Bradgate Park, Beacon Hill and Buck Hill back to the Outwoods, 12ish relatively easy miles with 600m ascent.

25 November - 6 December Desert Rock 2026 Wadi Rum Ed Bloomfield

Due to recent events Wadi Rum may not be a suitable destination this year – but we will go somewhere adventurous – at the moment it's wait and see.....

An adventure awaits on the sandstone monoliths of the Wadi rum desert. The grading has been done in alpine grades and climbing here should not underestimated, a rescue is very unlikely and the remoteness adds to the overall seriousness of the climbing. However for those with good mountaineering nous some of the world's best rock climbing awaits. Robert Durann has a done a wonderful article on UKC see link below for more information. There is a good range of climbing from HVS-E3 and a good selection of relatively easy from a technical point of view but very committing and adventurous Bedouin hunting routes. Get in touch if interested. We will be flying out from Luton to Amman and traveling down to Wadi rum via Petra. There are many climbing and walking opportunities straight out of the accommodation in the village of Rum.

There were no snowy slopes on our Patterdale Meet this year, unlike previous year. Just a smattering of snow fell early on Friday, which melted away quickly, leaving only those tiny patches of snow on north facing slopes. However, no complaints, as Saturday was glorious, with early morning mist, clearing to a predominantly blue sky and sunshine.

Maybe an improving weather forecast had resulted in a really good turn out, with 20 Oreads turning up for the weekend. A former Oread, Peter Masters, arrived for the day by motorbike, with his visor iced up due to the initial freezing fog.

Saturday saw climbers, namely Roger Larkam and Snod, heading for Glaciated Slab, in Borrowdale, where, I hear, the south facing rock was actually warm to touch. 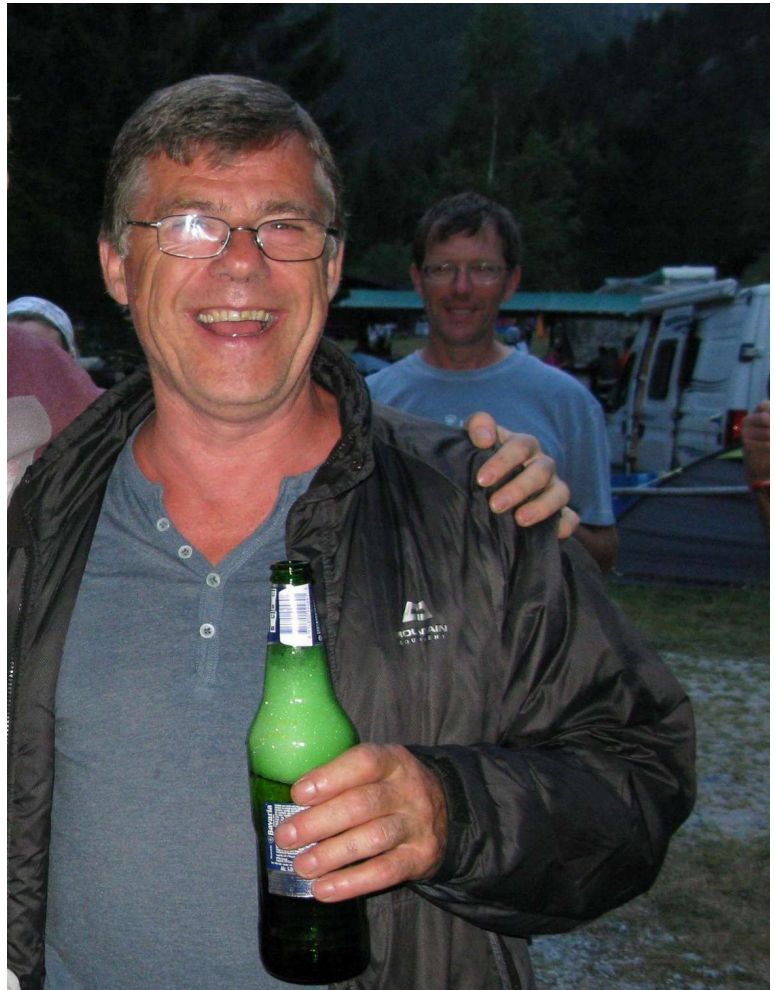
Peter O'Neill, a member since 1976, died in the early hours of 24 March. He was in his early 90s. Photographs and memories would be very welcome for future issues.

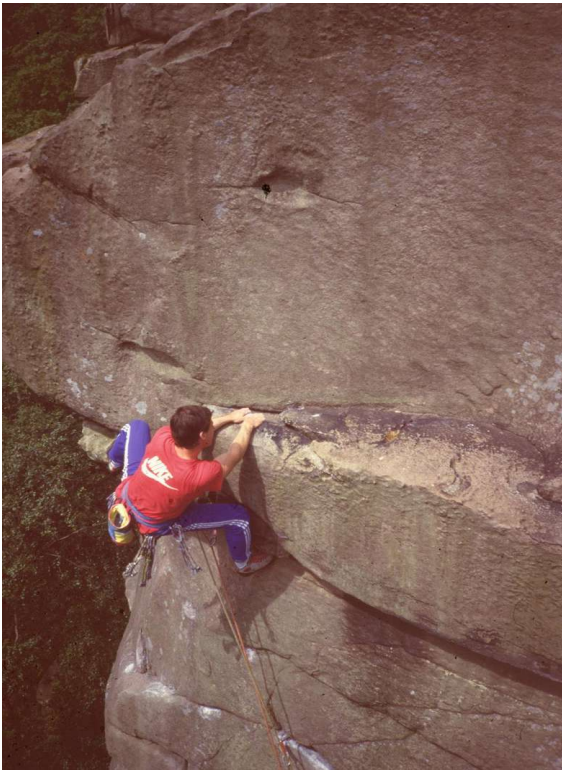


Memories of Gil - Chris Wilson

When you're asked to write a few lines about a good friend who you've known for over half a century where do you start?

How about memories of driving through France. Gil, maybe 50 miles ahead, sending ever more risqué jokes by text, typed by his very young daughter Jo and read to us by a very young and impressionable Frankie in the back of our car. Gil had a large stock of jokes for all tastes and kept them up to the end!

Gil could walk, fast. We were walking up to a Lakeland crag at a steady pace with Chris Radcliffe in the lead. Gil following quietly said "watch this", caught Chris up but stayed just behind. The tempo increased faster and faster until a worn-out Chris took a tumble. It was sad to see Gil's walking so diminished in later life – he never got the benefit he deserved from a pair of knee replacements but still enjoyed taking Andrea's dogs out.



He could also climb, incredibly well. Slabs were a speciality but he was also very strong, tenacious and competitive. He accumulated an impressive tick list. Gil was always happy to help those less gifted and just loved getting out climbing. He was active in the Burton and Nottingham clubs as well as the Oread. Gil's career included work for the Coal Board at their research establishment at Swadlicote and later as an expert specialising in fork lift trucks. Living further north near Wigan he became an enthusiastic member of the Fell and Rock before moving to Elton then Matlock.

This photo of Gil in action at Cratcliffe which appeared in the recent photo competition demonstrates his strength, skill and determination – as Richard Freestone said “Looking at it though - I haven't a clue what he's going to do next!”

He loved cricket, although playing for Elton when not a youth did result in the occasional injury. His love of fast motorbikes never left him – there was always another ride to do or better bike to get. He enjoyed cycling. One of his more amusing tales involved cycling around Ireland a few days after a vasectomy! Gil could be a little stubborn but that was easily forgiven, especially when he played his guitar and sang from his songbook.
