This walk links some of the small pockets of country parks in the Charnwood Forest, a very unique landscape between Leicester and Loughborough, famous for displaying some of the oldest rocks in England where the first published discovery of Precambrian fossils took place. We will meet at the Outwoods Woodland P&D car park at 10am (OS Grid Reference SK514159, W3W \\form.signature.tripling, nearest postcode LE11 3YG) This is a large car park with cafe and toilets, £2 fee for the day. We will walk through the bluebell carpets of the Outwoods via Woodhouse Eaves to Swithland Woods, Bradgate Park, Beacon Hill and Buck Hill back to the Outwoods, 12ish relatively easy miles with 600m ascent.

It's got it all basically, served up in a single venue. There is little below VS but for those operating at that or above there is quality galore.

Located in Northern Ireland near the Giants Causeway (nearest town is Ballycastle) this is a beautiful area with plenty of scenic walks.

Ferries can be taken from either Holyhead to Dublin or Cairnryan to Belfast. Similar total trip time.

Saturday 20 June Geo walk Fairholmes to Upper Burbage Bridge Chris Wilson

This section of the Geo walk will take place in perfect weather towards the end of June (wear your shorts and bring a sun hat and sun cream!). The official description is available online following this link:

The walk is 18 km / 11¼ miles long with 530 m / 1,750 ft of ascent, strolling (actually, it's steep) up from Fairholmes to Lost Lad and Back Tor. Fortunately it's then more or less downhill all the way to Moscar before a more gentle ascent follows to High Neb on Stanage. It's then on to Burbage Bridge. To quote the guide, "you will feel well exercised" by the end! There is one 500m section of unpleasant road walking near Moscar which could be avoided by a fairly lengthy detour – something to be decided when we get there.

Apart from the geology and the fabulous scenery there are lots of other points of interest along the way. Coal mines on top of Stanage, evidence of Bronze and Mesolithic age settlements, old turnpike roads, Roman roads and wonderful rock climbs to name a few. I hope to have some notes prepared that you can read in advance, just ask! Unfortunately apart from the start nowhere along the way serves refreshments, so unless you can persuade someone else to share theirs you'll need to bring your own.

The route is linear and parking at each end can be problematic, so a 9.30 **departure** from Fairholmes seems reasonable, with cars left at each end. It takes about 30 minutes to drive from Fairholmes to Upper Burbage Bridge. Could you please let me know if you are going so we can co-ordinate transport.

Toubkal Alpine Walking / Climbing: 12-17 March **Summitting the High Atlas Mark Hipwell**

The Approach: Life on the Avalanche

Our journey began in the village of Imlil, but it was Day 2 that provided our first lesson in Atlas geology. We moved up to Aroumd, which sits on the largest debris

field in North Africa. 4,500 years ago, a massive earthquake triggered the collapse of the northwest face of Mount Aksoual. This rock avalanche sent millions of tons of debris tumbling down a 2,000m cliff, creating a vast plateau of boulders. Today, the local Amazigh (Berber) people have integrated their lives into this chaos; the gaps between boulders serve as goat pens and gardens, while the rocks themselves form the structural walls of their homes.

After dropping bags, we went onwards to 2,538m for acclimatisation. After a sunny lunch among the goats (and a brief snooze), my fancy watch informed me we had gained a 20% acclimatisation advantage, although, given my tech-savviness, it may well have been a 20% chance of rain. Either way, we felt ready.

The Ascent: Neltner Hut (3,207m)

The trek to the Neltner Hut (Refuge du Toubkal) took us past the snowline, and into more serious terrain. The hut itself was packed with novices who seemed to treat ice axes and



crampons as indoor fashion accessories, frequently threatening the eyesight of fellow trekkers in the dining room. Between the lack of mountain manners and the midnight chatter, sleep didn't really happen that night.

Summit Day: Jebel Toubkal (4,167m)

The Alpine Start saw younger teams sprinting into the darkness clad in full down jackets, tactical ski goggles, and balaclavas. Drawing on the collective high-altitude experience of our team, we adopted a more sustainable mantra: a mix of *Pole Pole*, *Paso o Paso*, *Bistari Bistari*, and *Doucement*. It was with some quiet smugness that we soon overtook them as they were stripping off layers and gasping for water and air.

The climb wasn't without its trials. Altitude sickness is ever present to some extent, and for some, the final push was an exercise in grim determination.



However, the reward was a 100% team summit success, with a spectacular Atlas sunrise - purple hues bleeding into the black night, followed by the first warmth of the sun on our faces in the biting wind.

Recovery: Souks & Secret Gardens

Descending from the mountains, we transitioned to the sensory overload that is Marrakesh.

- **The Souks:** Navigated with Nigel's expert guidance, culminating in a dinner of "Blue Burgers", a culinary mystery we are still processing.
- **The Secret Garden:** An oasis in the centre of the city, with its Islamic garden of scented orchards and aromatic hedges.



100% summit success!

This expedition struck that perfect balance between relaxation and genuine challenge. We had a great team of diverse ages and backgrounds, and it was the laughs and the chat in between the main events that made it memorable.

Special thanks to Nigel for his expert guiding and to the whole team for the camaraderie.

Peter O'Neill 14. 6. 1931 – 24. 3. 2026

Peter O'Neill, a member since 1976, has died at the age of 94. A good number of Oreads attended his funeral and many happy memories were shared – but there was much we didn't know – Pete's passion for the outdoors and climbing began at an early age – with the Scouts and he met his beloved wife, Jean, at the age of 13 – drawn together by their shared passion for climbing. They married in 1952.

During his National Service with the R.A.F. he learned his lifetime trade as a joiner – but he had many skills beyond a single trade. Pete could turn his hand to anything practical and, having bought some land on Spencer Close in Ashbourne he built his own house, from scratch and lived in his own creation to the end of his days. Even in his 90s he set to and built a stand for his new television.

Not all his creations worked out as planned – he once remodelled a pair of metal candlesticks Jean was rather fond of to make a couple of ice tools. Sadly they were not up to the job and wilted at their first test on real ice.....Jean smiled. A fiercely independent and self – reliant man he was hugely proud of being the first Englishman to climb the Matterhorn without a guide.

After retirement he and Jean travelled all over Europe – anywhere there were lovely mountains to explore. Her death in 2020 was a huge blow, followed by the untimely death of his son, Simon in 2023, aged only 64. Pete battled on, with the support of his daughter in law, Helena and managed, in spite of increasing ill health, to remain in his own home to the end.

Every now and then he would forget to pay his Oread subs – but there would soon be a phone call to Michael Hayes or your Hon. Ed. Saying that he really wanted to keep his membership – in spite of being housebound it really mattered to him.



For me, your Hon. Ed. I remember so many happy, carefree meets and holidays in his company, Simonds Yat, Pembroke at Easter in caravans, May and August in tents, drunken post Dovedale Dash gatherings at the George, Alstonefield. Blue skies, sunshine, surrounded by laughter and friendship – he is present in my memories of so many of my happiest days with the Oread.
