Northumberland has lots of quality crags, predominantly high quality hard
sandstone with a good span of grades, so great for grit aficionados, or even lovers
of sandstone: I've really enjoyed the Staffordshire variety in the past.

Camping is at Highburn House which has good facilities, electric/non electric pitches and is only a short walk to Wooler, a nice market town and one of the driest places I've noted when weather watching. Inform them that you are Oread when booking (lots of campsites were fully booked when I enquired so recommend reserving a place asap).

Its well placed to get to the best of the crags, being 15 minutes drive to the famous Bowden Doors and Kyoel and 30 minutes to the southern 5 star crags such as Simonside and Ravensburgh.

I've got the routes book but there's a standalone bouldering guide to the area too. Add to that excellent walking and lots of historic sites so there's stuff for everyone. Saturday 20 June Geo walk Fairholmes to Upper Burbage Bridge Chris Wilson

Although this section of the Geo walk will take place in perfect weather on June 20 don't forget your suncream, hats and shorts. The route is described following this link:

It's 18 km long with 530m of ascent from Fairholmes over Lost Lad and Back Tor to Moscar and then the full length of Stanage to Burbage. We need cars at the start and end, so please let me know if you're coming along. It's also possible to shorten the route by leaving a car at Cuthroat Bridge and saying goodbye at Moscar or Crow Chin. If either of these options appeals let me know and we'll try to arrange something.

If you want to be enlightened with knowledge about the route (other than its geology) I can send you a fact sheet of info gleaned from the internet.

There are no pubs, cafés, restaurants or mobile food outlets on the walk so be prepared.

The route is linear and parking at each end can be problematic, so a 9.30 **departure** from Fairholmes seems reasonable, with cars left at each end. It takes about 30 minutes to drive from Fairholmes to Upper Burbage Bridge. Could you please let me know if you are going so we can co-ordinate transport.

Wednesday 1 July Monsal Head Walk Brian Dykes

This was originally advertised as one of Peter Amour's walks, but Peter has asked that I step in and lead it for him. As per Peter's original plan, we will meet up at Monsal Head (where the ice cream van is normally parked) at 10:00. There is a large Derbyshire Dales District Council car park at Monsal Head (£6.60 - all day) but there is also some free roadside parking on Butts lane heading east from Monsal Head towards Little Longstone.

The route I have planned is about 15km and with 400m of ascent. Initially we will descend to the Monsal Trail, leaving it at Great Longstone before ascending to Longstone Moor. We will then cross the moor to pick up concessionary paths leading towards Cressbrook Dale - just above Ravensdale crag. We will then take the footpath descent into Cressbrook Dale to pass Ravensdale Cottages and to pick up the Monsal Trail again at Cressbrook.

The descent into Cressbrook Dale is steep, but was not a problem on my 'dry run' but could be a problem if it's very wet - and as such walking poles may help. Also bring food and drink for a lunch stop. Please let me know if you will be joining...

Proposed 17 October Ecton Hill Mine Visit Stuart Firth

Oread members have walked over Ecton Hill many times and observed the extensive overground copper and lead mine-workings. Some members have actually been underground and report that it is a fascinating place.

- Once one of the foremost mines in the UK
- Worked for copper and lead for 3,500 years until 1891
- In 18th Century, Duke of Devonshire made £300,000 - possibly used to fund building of Buxton Crescent
- Firsts in mining technology, chemistry, geology
- Deepest mine shaft and first use of mining explosives in Britain
- Boulton and Watt steam engine
- Site of Special Scientific Interest above and below ground

What's not to like?

Consequently, I am proposing a private Oread underground trip and would appreciate expressions of interest so that I can gauge numbers. Please would you let me know **by 30 June 26** if you might be interested; no commitment required yet. The cost is a minimum donation of £10 per person which goes towards the charity's expenses. The tour is guided by expert volunteers.

There are two underground options: Deep Ecton - easy but wellies needed. More exciting is a possible through trip to Salts level via 50m of fixed ladders. More kit is needed but can be provided. The trip will include a short presentation, an overground walk and a visit to the 1788 engine house.

There is a story to this walk. It was planned as the Spring Stride in 2020. I was going to lead it as my first duty as President (although that version had an option of a visit to The Greyhound in Warslow). We had just finished the reconnaissance and were about to drive home when the Prime Minister announced the 'no unnecessary travel' in the unfolding Covid pandemic. Now the Spring Stride may be considered necessary by some but full lock down was implemented before the walk or the AGM for that matter. I was pleased we could walk the walk after six years.

Dovedale Short Walk 21 May Rusty Russell



After the appalling conditions of the last two outings we were graced by weather which although perhaps on the warm side of optimum was at the least pleasing and acceptable. The outing took in two ascents from the level of the River Dove to approximately 300 metres with the corresponding descents of which only the one from Alsop to Milldale was somewhat steeper than the optimum for comfort.

From the lay by at Alsop Moor we started off down the pleasing dry valley

which I call "Iron Torrs " although it is not specifically named on the map. Thereafter we climbed the Staffordshire Bank of the river, opposite Reynards Cave and travelled anti clockwise to Alstonefield and then down to the river at Milldale where we consumed the second helping of our rations whilst admiring the ducks

and the former mill race and weirs. As we rose again on the Derbyshire Bank the



important landmark of Moat Low, which I can see from home (standing on tiptoe on my dustbin) came gradually in to view.
