Saturday 26 September Weaver Hills Trig Point Brian Dykes

Plan A is to start from the Parish Hall Car Park, Church Lane, Upper Ellastone (GR: 116434, PC: DE6 2HB) at 10:00. Bring along some cash to make a voluntary contribution to parish funds for use of the car park. But note: parking may not be possible if the car park has been reserved for other events, such as for a funeral - as it was on the day of my reconnaissance walk. In that case see Plan B below.

The objective of the walk is to take in the views from the Weaver Hills Trig Point.

The route will follow some of the "Weaver Walk" taking in Stanton village and the Thorswood Nature Reserve on the outbound leg and Wootton village and Dalton's Dairy - for ice cream / coffee on the return leg. Overall the walk is about 14k with ~ 320m of ascent.

[Plan B: If Upper Ellastone, Parish Hall Car Park is unavailable, drive further along the road towards Leek and park at Wootton Village Car Park - situated on the left of the road immediately on leaving the village of Wootton, heading towards Leek. This is a small car park with room for about 10 cars, if parked neatly. If this is full, then there is some roadside parking in Wootton village].

17 October Ecton Hill Mine Visit Stuart Firth

Oread members have walked over Ecton Hill many times and observed the extensive overground copper and lead mine-workings. Some members have actually been underground and report that it is a fascinating place.

- Once one of the foremost mines in the UK
- Worked for copper and lead for 3,500 years until 1891
- In 18th Century, Duke of Devonshire made £300,000 - possibly used to fund building of Buxton Crescent
- Firsts in mining technology, chemistry, geology
- Deepest mine shaft and first use of mining explosives in Britain
- Boulton and Watt steam engine
- Site of Special Scientific Interest above and below ground

What's not to like?

Consequently, I am organising a private Oread underground trip. **Please let me know if you would like to come and I will add your name to the list.**

(Saturday 17 October 26)

The cost is a minimum donation of £10 per person which goes towards the charity's expenses.

There are two underground options: Deep Ecton - easy but wellies needed. More exciting is a possible through trip to Salts level via 50m of fixed ladders. More kit is needed but can be provided. The trip will include a short presentation, an overground walk and a visit to the 1788 engine house.

- Distance: 10 miles (16 km)

skidding on grass and flying down half the first pitch of Black Spring HVS (and only dry once in every 50 years).

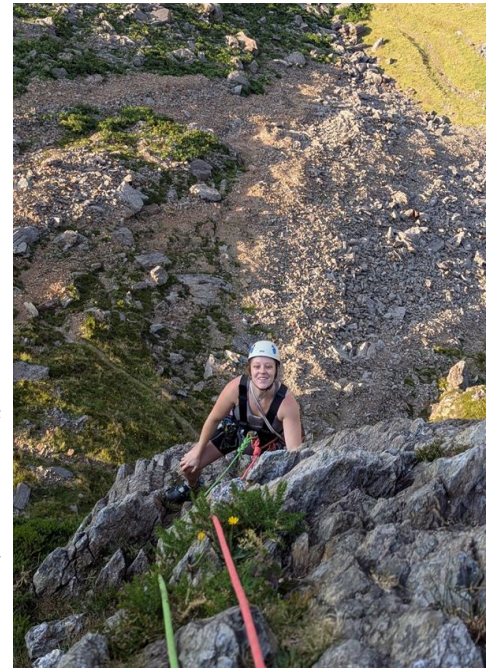

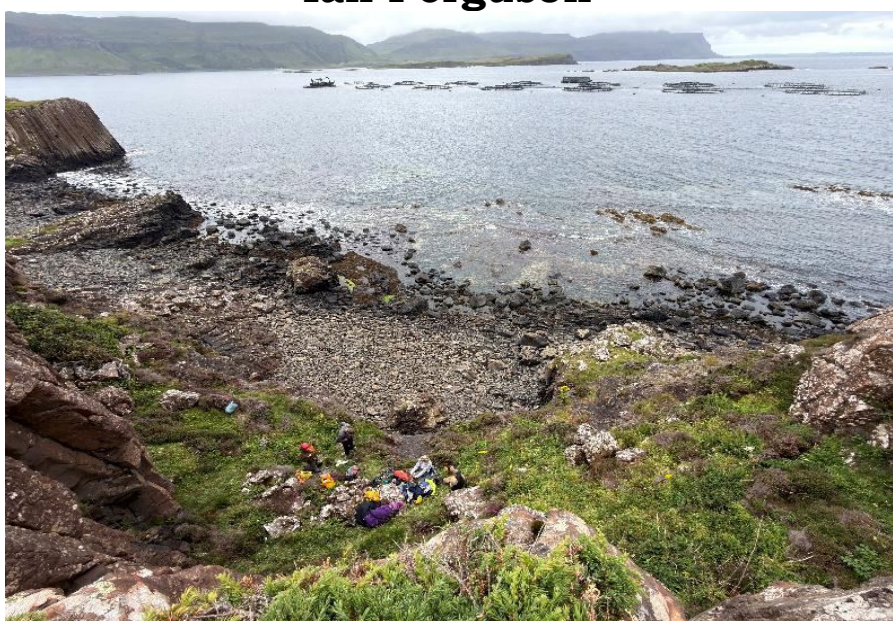

Mild Exploration in the Hebrides August 2026 **Ian Ferguson**



Inchkenneth and the Ardmeanach peninsula; boring but climbable columnar basalt (like Fingal's cave on Staffa 10km away).

An island separated from Mull by around 100m of water, Ulva is a rare thing – a relatively unexplored UK climbing location. Over its history it's been the subject of

projections of all sorts of idealistic plans from Lairds local or distant, with a community buyout in 2017 being the latest chapter expecting to bring prosperity and growth – from a base of around six permanent inhabitants. Historical subsistence farming gave way to a decade of kelping (for glass production as readers almost certainly know...) before brutal poverty and sheep. Latterly TV production may be the main growth engine with a charismatic couple of roving Australian interior decorators bringing publicity to the island (and to the superb seasonal seafood pub “The Boathouse.”)

From a climbing perspective it's not entirely unexplored, appearing in the SMC 2014 Inner Hebrides guidebook and with about 80 routes noted in the UK Climbing Logbooks. Perfunctory research suggests Colin Moody has made most efforts at recording ascents on the island, but plenty of other brief forays are known to have been made.

My family and I made a brief foray ourselves in July, top-roping a handful of fine routes in a scenic location on the south side of the island. I wasn't overexcited by the prospect because I'm a miserable grouch, recalling volcanic rock as crumbly black and slippery and columnar basalt as tediously repetitive. (Colin Moody's online topos do look... tediously repetitive!)



Our party of six braved prodigious bracken and passed a sunbathing slowworm (we named him “Centimetrekeneth”) to reach a cosy Harborough-style outcrop on a terrace well above high water mark - ideal for picnics and a snooze. Indeed my eyes brightened as steaks were mentioned, but this was a grave misunderstanding and I was required to gibber my way up an “Easy Gulley” and assist in pounding them into the grassy meadow as belays.

The rock was excellent. Lots of character, good friction and a nice angle below vertical but not slabby.

Centimetrekeneth, a sun-seeking slow worm. Not far from Ormaig, “Place of the serpents.”

We were careful to base ourselves away from the foot of the climb. Although there were some good-sized loose blocks, they were no surprise to the wary. They were restricted to the undercut base of the climb and the topout, with safe and rewarding middle sections of bare rock to play on (and no need to destroy habitats.) Considerably more interesting than columnar basalt, although



my son took off to explore some of that on the sea-level headlands wearing Crocs, supporting the definition of adventure as being an outing in inappropriate footwear...



The routes we climbed are a few hundred metres to the W of the routes noted as “Basalt Columns” on UKC – not as far W as the notably incut bay with the fort on it or “Twin Headlands”; but there’s plenty more high-quality rock to go at. An adventurous attitude to bracken and drizzle and up-to-date knowledge of tick procedures (Lyme’s, not logbook) are warranted.

Visitors who are tempted to pursue their own exploration will find a warm reception from the custodians of the Ulva Hostel, as they are old friends and veterans of shared alpine, ice and crag-rat adventures from Guildford MC

pre-children. In the season they’ll be busy, but without a doubt happy to direct to where more recent University and other groups have been active. Get there before the bolts, wildfires and polish!
